PICNICS AND SOCIALS.

The Festive Season has Arrived and Some Good Days' Outings on the Program.

The picnic season is about to commence. Next week the first picnic of the season will take place on Tuesday at Central Kingsclear. This is what is known as the annual French Village picnic. The usual games and amusements, which have always helped to make this picnic so popular, will be put on. Refreshments, dinner and supper will be served on the grounds. The usual arrangements will be made for those going up from this city.

On the following two afternoons and evenings, Wednesday and Thursday, the Methodist church bazaar and tea will be held on the lawn adjoining the Methodist church. A HOUSE COLLAPSED.

Dwelling on York Street Owned by David Munroe, was Badly Damaged.

A house on York street, belonging to Mr. David Munroe, settled into the ground about five feet this morning, and was quite badly wrecked.

Workmen have been engaged during the past week putting abutments under the house, with the intention of building a cellar. The heavy rain of this morning washed the earth and sand away from the supports, and about eleven o'clock, without any warning, the building partially collapsed. Two families live in the house. Mr. Thomas Troop lives up stairs and Mr. David Munroe, the owner, occupies the lower flat.

The building was badly wrecked, windows were broken, plaster torn from the walls and ceiling, and the boards of the floor broken. The furniture, including pictures and chairs, belonging to both families, were also damaged to a considerable extent.

The families who occupied the building were very much alarmed and ran into the street. A number of neighbors living in the vicinity were soon on the scene and considerable excitement prevailed. Dinner was being prepared by both families, and good fires were going both up stairs and down, but while the stoves were demolished, it is fortunate that no fire resulted.
