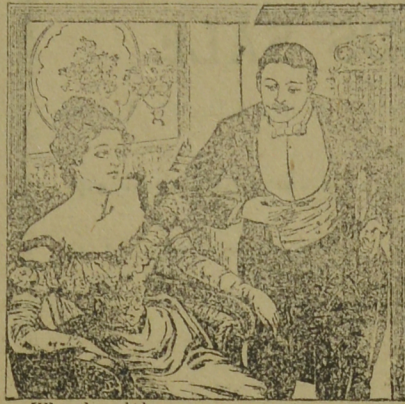

LIVINGSTONE RELICS.

Thousands See Missionary's Property at London Exhibition.

Judging by the number of visitors who crowd round Mr. and Mrs. Livingstone Wilson's court, the most popular exhibit at the Orient in the London Exhibition, held in the Royal Agricultural Hall, are the relics of the famous missionary and explorer, Dr. Livingstone, many of which are priceless by reason of the mine of romance which lies behind each article. And what lends additional interest to the exhibits is the presence of the noted Doctor's daughter, who is never tired of speaking about her father's love for exploring Africa and his desire to help the natives.

An unusually large collection has been brought together for the occasion, many articles of which have been brought home by his faithful attendants when he failed to return from the last of his marvellous journeys which made his name world-famous.

"From morning to night," said Mr. Wilson, "my wife and I are besieged by crowds of interested people who are eager to inspect for themselves the personal belongings of the man whose influence was instrumental in creating an interest in this country for the natives of Africa."

"Which relic has been the most popular? Well, I think the section of the trunk of the tree under which the natives buried Dr. Livingstone's heart after his death has had the lion's share. As you will see, the trunk bears an inscription which was carved by his native followers, but as the tree showed signs of decay it was cut down by the Royal Geographical Society, and is now one of the most cherished possessions of that society."

"His diaries, of which we have seven, come in for an equal share of interest. Dr. Livingstone was always careful in regard to his diary records."

As you will see, he used to make notes of his geographical soundings, and, in fact, everything of interest, such as curious peoples, animals, plants, and fishes, was noted in his diaries and frequently accompanied by sketches. The last entry in his diary was made on April 27th, 1873, two or three days before he died.

Under the circumstances, marking, as it does, the close of a glorious career, it is of pathetic interest: "Knocked up quite, and remain—recover, sent to buy milk goats."

"When the natives found their master in the morning on his knees, dead, they embalmed his body as best they could, and carried it amidst the greatest perils to the shore, where it was placed in a crude coffin and brought to this country on a British battleship. On arrival at these shores the coffin was substituted for a more elaborate one, and the body buried in Westminster Abbey, whilst his heart still lies in the centre of Africa. The shell in which he was brought home is still preserved by the Royal Geographical Society, and, draped by a Union Jack, is in the Relics Court at the Orient in London."

"Among the other relics of interest are the boxes which were brought home by Stanley, one of which still bears grease spots from the candles made by Livingstone; the model of the hut built by the natives for the doctor to die in, and a piece of bark in which his body was wrapped; a map of Central Africa designed by himself, and his sextant and rulers, watch, box compass, field-glasses, surgical instruments, two spears, and were thrown at him by warlike tribes, and two four-barrelled revolvers, which he used for procuring food and protection. It is surely a remarkable testimony to Livingstone's influence among the natives when we realize that, in the face of many temptations throughout their nine months' journey, they safely brought the body to the coast, and handed all his belongings over to his friends."

THE LATE JUDGE MCALLUM.

After Hot Political Meeting He Changed Before Those Who Stayed Late.

Archibald McCallum was stumping South Grey for the late Senator Landerkin, and the place of meeting was Drewery's school-house. As is well-known Archie was always chosen to stump the constituencies where the Highlanders were numerous, and at this meeting were the McQueens, McNairs, McEacherns, McFadysens, McDonalds, McDougalls, McPhes, Curries, Campbells, Keiths, and Buchanan.

Gaelic and English political oratory poured forth as it could only when McCallum was the medium. No reporters were present, and so many unprintable arguments were set forth. After the meeting the crowd tarried long, as is the custom after any rural gathering. It was a cold night, and it was a long drive to Durham. For a space Archie felt a little uneasy, but after a while, turning to the writer, demanded:

"Are these people going to stay here all night? If they are I may as well do it first as last."

So opening his valise he took out a heavy undershirt which he changed right there in the small auditorium for the wringing wet one he had on.

CANADIAN INDIANS.

Hon. Frank Oliver Speaks of the Difficulty of Making them White Men in Habits and Occupation.

OTTAWA, Feb. 13.—Yesterday in the House of Commons one of the things that was talked about was Indian education. The government spends about \$400,000 a year to enlighten the aborigines. When the vote was called Hon. Mr. Foster wanted to know what progress was being made and what results were being obtained from the education of the Indians.

Hon. Mr. Oliver was canny in his reply as he has lived in the neighborhood of wigwags for many years, and inclined to take a very unemotional view of the red man.

The Minister of the Interior said that it was not possible to give an answer that could be considered satisfactory. The difficulty of making a white man of an Indian was not thoroughly appreciated at the time the work was undertaken through the medium of the schools. Grave difficulties had developed in working out the process that were not anticipated when the work was begun.

While great responsibility had been assumed and a long and consistent effort had been made to discharge that responsibility, Mr. Oliver said that it had to be admitted that the expectations entered into at the inauguration of the present system had not been realized. This was not due to the fact that the Indian was disinclined to receive education, but his environment and condition of life is a great majority of cases were such that what he took away from the schools was not of the benefit to him that was hoped and expected.

Mr. Oliver said that it appeared in the light of twenty years' experience it would be in order to make a readjustment of the conditions surrounding Indian education with a view of lightening the burden and achieving better results and improving the conditions of the Indian, rather than to continue the attempt to make a white man of him. The blood Indians were a fair example of what it could not be done with the aborigines. They had been found to take rather kindly to stock raising and farming and follow those occupations with reasonable success. They could be taught trades as well, but they would not follow them.

Mr. Foster suggested that there should be an investigation and report by a special commission on this problem.

Mr. Oliver said that Canada was not alone troubled by this problem. The United States had been for many years and met with little success struggling with the Indian question. All countries had found it difficult to make over the natives so that they would fit into the new conditions created by the arrival of the white men. It was the desire of the people of Canada, he thought, and certainly it was the desire of the government, that the Indian should be fairly dealt with and it was time to see if anything better than the present system could be devised.

Replying to Mr. Daniel, Mr. Oliver stated that they were 1,861 Indians in New Brunswick.

Mr. Oliver said it was probably due to the fact that medical officers were sometimes called upon to attend Indians from reserves other than those for which they received fixed remuneration.

THE SURRENDER OF CUBA.

Bits of Inside History of the Spanish American War.

MADRID, Feb. 12.—Following the publication of certain cablegrams exchanged between the Spanish Government at Madrid and General Blanco at Havana, relative to the surrender of Cuba to the United States in 1898, it is now learned that fear of an American attack upon the coast of Spain and a subsequent revolution in this country was the official reason for Premier Sagasta's decision to make peace with the United States. Moreover, this decision was reached before the negotiations for the surrender of Santiago were concluded. These facts have been disclosed by the further publication of the correspondence between General Blanco and Premier Sagasta, at the instigation
