ST. JOHN ON DECK.

Large Delegation Here to Oppose Assessment Bill--
The Tobique Dam.

The lobbies of the House are very busy today. Those interested in the Tobique Dam bill are still hovering about, awaiting the call to hear what the Dominion fishery export, Finlayson, has to say concerning the effect of the dam on the fisheries of the river. Mr. Slipp, the chairman of the committee, has decided that after this gentleman has been heard, public discussion of this bill will stop. There has now been about five hours talk over the provisions of the bill, and the committee are of the opinion that as there is other business quite as important still to be dealt with, they cannot give more time to it. Col McLean, who arrived here this morning, says that the prevailing opinion among the fishery officials at Ottawa is that if the facts have been correctly stated, the erection of a forty foot dam across the Tobique would not only kill the fishing in the river itself, but as it is the only tributary of the St. John where the fish can go to spawn, it would eventually kill off the harbor and bay fisheries at St. John. It is the intention, he says, to ask that the matter be delayed until the federal authorities have time to fully investigate the conditions and

report thereon. The feeling is growing that, if the facts are as represented regarding the possible extinction of the St. John fisheries because of interference with the spawning beds, that arrangements should be made to set aside certain tributary rivers for the spawning, and complete protection afforded.

St. John is strongly represented here today. The civic delegation consisting of Recorder Skinner, Alds. Baxter, Pickett, McGoldrick and Elkin appeared before the Municipalities Committee in support of the city bills. Daniel Mullin is here to oppose the junk license bill promoted by the city. The St. John Railway Company is represented by Col. McLean and A. W. MacRae. Mr. W. S. Fisher represents the Board of Trade particularly with reference to the Assessment bill. Mr. Fisher says that the opinion of the Board of Trade is that unless the bill is a complete measure, it should be withdrawn and be introduced when it had been completed. Several minor bills from St. John were passed upon by the committee and the Assessment bill taken up just before adjournment.

This afternoon the house will do routine work and later the Municipalities Committee will meet.

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS.

The public accounts committee of the legislature held the first meeting this morning since the Easter holidays. Expenditure in connection with the crown land department were gone over and passed. In going over the public works accounts the interesting discovery was made that Hon. J. K. Flemming had made a sale of lumber to the old government for the Hartland bridge. The price paid for it was \$59. The committee will meet again tomorrow morning.

A GRAVE OMISSION.

BRIEFS FROM THE WIRES.

The Lady Grey has arrived at Montreal and reports the river free of ice to the sea.

The trial of Capt. Peter Hains, who is accused of murdering W. E. Annis, began at Flushing, L.I., yesterday. It is proposed at Washington to break the Patten wheat corner by admitting Canadian grain free for a time.

Two hundred lady teachers arrived at Guelph to take a three months' course in the Ontario Agricultural College.

A note found among the papers of John Davidson, the missing Scottish poet, indicates that he has committed suicide.

An unconfirmed report has reached St. Petersburg of the massacre of 2,000 persons by Turcoman tribesmen at Astrabad.

John Neville was committed for trial at Hamilton on the charge of shooting Constable Smith with intent. Smith swore the prisoner was the man who shot him.

James Johnston's allegation at the Fort Frances lumber inquiry that all lumber companies robbed the Government by making false returns of stumpage will be investigated by Hon. Frank Cochrane.

To Face Murder Charge.

Toronto, April 20.—A charge of murder will likely be laid against Gagnon, a French-Canadian, whom Provincial Inspector Greer arrested at North Bay on April 3.

Last fall Gagnon, while under the influence of liquor, entered the house of Ethel Crawford on the outskirts of Cobalt, and brutally beat her and a companion, Mary E. Smith, about the heads with an axe.

The Smith woman is dead in St. Michael's Hospital, as the result of the injuries inflicted by Gagnon. Her jawbone was broken and suppurating set in. A portion of the decayed bone was removed, but owing to an impoverished physical condition, general tuberculosis followed, resulting in death.

Gagnon is now in jail at North Bay, after a long pursuit by Inspector Greer over the northern part of the province.

Ferry Adrift.

Buffalo, April 20.—The ferryboat Niagara, running between Buffalo and Fort Erie, Ont., was caught in the ice yesterday morning and was carried down the Niagara river to the International Bridge, where its top deck and pilot house were carried off, when it came in contact with the bridge. There were but few passengers on the ferry, and while there was a panic on the boat, no person was injured. The tug International finally got a line to the Niagara and towed her to the Canadian side.

THE TOBIQUE BILL.

Amendments to the Measure are not Approved of.

The Corporations Committee of the Legislature held a meeting last evening and continued the hearing on the bill to incorporate the Tobique Pulp and Paper Company. Mr. Fred. E. Taylor claimed that the changes in the bill did not meet with the approval of those opposed to the measure. He pointed out that Sleson, Cutler & Co. evinced so little interest in the bill that they did not consider it worth while to be present.

Mr. Tweeddale followed with a vigorous speech in support of the bill. He stated that the charter was not being sought for purposes of speculation as had been alleged.

Premier Hazen stated that he had been advised from Ottawa that an officer of the department of Marine and Fisheries would be here to meet the committee.

After remarks by Messrs. P. A. Guthrie, L. H. Bliss and H. A. Powell, the committee adjourned until Wednesday.
