## CONMEE GETS JOLT

His Power Bill Is Gently Hoisted by the Premier.

## MUST CONSIDER PROVINCES

Sir Wilfrid Takes Strong Stand Against Using Brute Strength to Force Objectionable Legislation on the Provinces — Bill Will Have to Be Altered Before It Can Hope to Go On.

Ottawa, April 20.—Mr. Conmee seized the opportunity yesterday in the Commons to proceed with his much-discussed project to incorporate the Ontario & Michigan Power Co., with the result that the intended attack on Hon. Mr. Pugsley was crowded out. Of the proposed piece of legislation the House is heartily tired, and it was with a palpably bored expression that the members listened to the reiteration of the old arguments in favor of a course which public opinion has so unmistakably stamped with its disapproval.

Mr. Aylesworth, speaking for himself alone, expressed his view and at the end of the debate which followed Sir Wilfrid moved that the measure be left with the committee on private bills and that progress be reported pending alterations.

The Prime Minister said in opening that he was disposed to regard favorably the request of Dr. Sproule to have the committee rise. It was very questionable whether Mr. Conmee could have his bill this evening or that he could have it at all, because there seemed to be a wide difference of opinion with regard to it.

"In the meantime," he said, "let me say a word which may possibly contribute to clear the atmosphere. This bill has been carefully considered by the private bills committee. As a rule, so far as I am responsible for the business of the House, I have always deemed it my duty to support, as far as possible, the findings of the private bills committee. Not that it is a law absolutely binding upon us, but that every member of the House must abdicate his judgment when the private bills committee has spoken, but I have always thought that when a matter of importance has been discussed in the private bills committee, or any standing committee, and a conclusion reached, then, unless there is some strong reason to the contrary, the finding of the committee should be followed."

"The real point of the discussion is this: are there provisions in this bill which effect the power of the local Legislature and the local Government? That is the only point which weighs with me."

"If this bill were to be proceeded with it would be necessary to consider the opinion of the Minister of Justice on one side, which is a clause with which we are familiar, and it was not invented, I may say to my hon. friend from South Simcoe (Mr. Lennox) by the Liberal party; it is a relic of former days, and perhaps in the case of relics we may be wrong in not doing away with them. At all events, the hon. gentleman and I can agree that it ought to be eliminated from the bill."

"But the whole discussion we have heard this afternoon has been directed to one point, and one point alone, and that is that the power of expropriation of water powers belonging

contained in this bill should be eliminated. I think if these two sections were amended there would not be much objection to the bill.

"Did we pass this bill we interfere directly with this principle, and, therefore, under these circumstances, holding as I have held all my life to the sacredness, if the word is not too strong, of provincial rights, while we have the brute power to override those rights, it is a question whether we should do so. And it is a question upon which I would invite the serious consideration of my hon. friend who is promoting this bill."

But there is a serious conflict of opinion, I am afraid, with regard to the power of expropriation. I think on the whole, seeing that if we proceed with the bill, we shall not be able to get it through to-night. I would move that the committee rise, report progress and ask leave to sit again."

When the bill was brought up in the afternoon, Mr. Lennox asked for a Government announcement as to the bill.

Hon. Mr. Aylesworth said he spoke only for himself. He believed the B.N.A. Act was plain as to the incorporation of companies and as to the line of demarcation between the jurisdiction of the Federal and Provincial authorities. It was plain that no Provincial Legislature had the power to incorporate a company whose work extends beyond the limits of the province.

The purpose of the Ontario & Michigan Power Co. was apparently to carry its work across the boundary into the State of Michigan, and the committee having reported the bill, it must have accepted the intention of the company.

The declaration that the works are to be "for the general advantage of Canada" was one used all too frequently. He could not see why the declaration should be made in this case any more than the establishment of any manufactory would be in a remote way for the general advantage of Canada. There was no need to make the declaration.

Mr. Conmee was willing to amend the clause, declaring the words to be for the general advantage of Canada by inserting the words "in so far as they relate to water powers and electrical transmission."

Mr. Fowke (Liberal, South Ontario), declared that he was not one of those who were "rounded up" by the Liberal whip. He had supported the bill in committee for the purpose of bringing it before the House. He did not feel inclined to support the bill, for the reason that it proposed to give large powers of expropriation which ought not to be granted, and there was another clause to which he would always be opposed, which proposed to give a franchise in perpetuity in respect to the natural resources of the Dominion. The day was coming, Mr. Fowke declared, when we would regulate all the water powers.

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## Mürder the Verdict.

Moosajaw, Sask., April 20.—The adjourned inquest to discover the cause of Mrs. Kent's death opened yesterday morning and after hearing evidence for over two and a half hours, the jury retired to find a verdict: "That Mrs. Kent came to her death by strychnine poisoning given or sent her by some party or parties unknown with intent to kill." Beyond showing almost conclusively that murder had been committed, no new light was thrown on the case.

## Drops Dead at Prison Door.

Montreal, April 20.—William Laroque, who was released from St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary in 1906 on ticket-of-leave, with eight years of a sentence for robbery yet to run, died on Saturday. He had drifted back into his old ways again and had been arrested at Rimouski and was taken back to the penitentiary to serve out his sentence. When on the threshold he dropped dead.

## Ridgetown Man Murdered.

Windsor, April 20.—John Marcon, one of the best-known young men of this city was arrested and locked up in Detroit, charged with having caused the death of Albert Clark, aged 35, of Ridgetown. The men became engaged in an altercation in Elliott's saloon, on Congress street, and Marcon, it is said, struck Clark a heavy blow. When picked up his skull was fractured.
