BEAUHARNOIS TRAGEDY.

Clues Have Been Found in Murder of Domina Pelletier.

Beauharnois, Que., April 19.—The murder of Domina Pelletier, farmer, of St. Etienne de Beauharnois, on Tuesday is losing some of its mystery. The murderer is still at liberty, but there are indications that an important arrest will be made shortly.

The additional data of the tragedy is as follows:

Domina Pelletier was shot with a charge (possibly a couple of charges) from a No. 12 shotgun loaded with No. 2 shot.

His widow swore at the inquest that he was on bad terms with her people.

On the morning of the murder two men were seen with a shotgun in the neighborhood of the Pelletier farm.

Albini Hebert, a neighbor, declares that he distinctly heard two shots, fired in quick succession, and three wads were found.

About three weeks ago Aime Houle, brother of Mrs. Pelletier, visited Grumont's store in Beauharnois and bought twenty-five No. 12 cartridges.

Of course this fact does not necessarily have to do with the murder.

On Wednesday morning Aime Houle took the 10.45 train from Beauharnois to Valleyfield en route for Oudenburg to join the boat "Bennington."

He was noticed at the station to be rather excited, although he is usually calm.

On Thursday morning Wm. Houle, another brother, also left Beauharnois with the avowed intention of going to the lumber camps.

A gun has been found in the Houle home.

FLIRTATION COSTS LIFE.

Ontario Man Is Killed by Lake Captain in Port Huron.

Port Huron, Mich., April 19.—Geo. Birrell McKinnon, aged 21 years, of Moorestown, Lambton County, Ont., was shot by Captain Ralph Pringle, aged 32, of St. Clair, in the latter city shortly after midnight yesterday morning.

McKinnon died yesterday afternoon at four o'clock, after remaining in an unconscious condition almost until the last.

According to eye-witnesses, Captain Pringle entered the saloon known as the "Hole in the Wall," and seeing McKinnon for the first time in three years declared that the town was not big enough for both of them.

The two men entered a side room and an instant later three shots were fired and McKinnon fell to the floor unconscious.

Captain Pringle told the officers when brought to the jail here that McKinnon had flirted with his wife three years ago and that he had vowed to get even. Neither of the men were intoxicated at the time.

Captain Pringle is a well-known lake captain. This year he expected to sail the steamer William A. Young.

McKinnon had sailed for two years as a first mate. Last season he was on the steamer Rosemount, of Montreal, and this year he had agreed to sail on the steamer Adriatic.

Before breathing his last at the hospital McKinnon said that Pringle had no reason for shooting him. He would have said more, but he was too weak.

He died before he could be revived.

MAY BE A MURDER.

Hamilton Man Is Stabbed—Brother-in-Law Arrested.

Hamilton, April 19.—What may turn out to be murder occurred yesterday morning at 10 o'clock when Ross Wallace, 22 East Hunter street, was stabbed over the heart.

The doctors at the city hospital said last night that his chances of recovery were doubtful. Thomas Simpson, 152 South John street, his brother-in-law, has been locked up on the charge of doing the stabbing.

The affair took place at Wallace's home. There were no witnesses, but from what the police have been able to learn, Wallace's wife was absent in Toronto on Saturday night, and Simpson's wife remained out late, not coming home until midnight.

She says she could not get in, and went to Wallace's house to spend the rest of the night. Simpson went to Wallace's twice early yesterday morning, but could not find his wife. About 10 o'clock, he located her at Wallace's and as he came in she ran out. A short time after the tenants who live under Wallace's room heard a noise, and went to his room to find that Wallace had been stabbed. Simpson was under the influence of drink when arrested and the police say that he told them that he was glad he put his brother-in-law out of the way.

Yesterday afternoon the magistrate, crown attorney and Inspector McMahon went to the hospital and took Wallace's ante-mortem statement, in which he accused Simpson of stabbing him.

The statement was made in the presence of the prisoner, who vigorously denied his guilt.

Woman Drowns in Creek.

Elora, April 19.—During a temporary fit of insanity, Mrs. Geo. Edler of the Township of Pilkington, near Bethel, wandered from her home on Saturday. A futile search for her was made until yesterday, when it was found that she had been drowned in a creek which runs through the Edler farm.

She leaves a husband and family of five, the youngest being about ten years of age.

Killed on a Freight Train.

Poughkeepsie, N.Y., April 19.—The dead body of a man was taken off the top of a freight train on the New York Central Railroad at this city early yesterday morning, and from papers found on the man's clothing, he is believed to have been a brother of Harris Aber of Montreal. He is thought to have been stealing a ride and struck a bridge south of the city.

Brothers Suicide.

New York, April 19.—Two brothers, Isaac and Louis Abrahams, aged 55 and 50 years respectively, were found dead in their home, having been asphyxiated by illuminating gas. The men were lying face to face in two cots. The window had been hermetically sealed.

Montreal Live Stock.

MONTREAL, April 19.—(Special.)—At the Montreal Stock Yards, West End Market, the receipts of live stock for the week ending April 17 were 1380 cattle, 182 sheep and lambs, 304 hogs and 250 calves.

The offerings this morning consisted of 850 cattle, 150 sheep and lambs, 2175 hogs and 400 calves.

Altho the weather was unfavorable, it being wet and cold, there was a fair attendance of buyers, and the market fairly large.

To the fact that they were all pretty well cleaned out of stock and in consequence they all wanted a few cattle, of which the supply was none too large.

A fairly active trade was done at firm prices. Cable advices continue firm, consequently there was also some demand for export shipments with small lots to complete shipments.

Small lots, N.B. Choice steers and heifers sold at 5 1/2c; good, at 5 1/2c to 5 3/4c; fair at 4 1/2c to 5c; medium, at 4 1/2c to 4 3/4c; common, at 4 1/2c to 4c; and bulls, at 3 1/2c to 4c.

The condition of the market for sheep and lambs was unchanged, prices being firm under a good demand and small supply and sales of yearling lambs were made at 6 1/2c to 7c and old sheep, at 5c to 5 1/2c per lb.

Spring lambs were scarce and wanted at prices ranging from \$3 to \$6 each, as to size and offerings of calves were fair, which met with a good demand at from \$2 to \$3 each, as to quality.

The undertone to the market for hogs continues strong and prices are steadily tending towards a higher level.

The supply was fairly large, but as packers and dealers were short of stock the demand was keen and an active trade was done.

Sales of selected lots were made at \$3.25 per cwt, weighed off cars. Cables from Liverpool and London on Canadian bacon, were strong and noted an advance in prices of 2s to 6s per cwt.
