## FIRE AT PRESQUE ISLE.

### One Hundred Buildings in Maine Town are Wiped Out.

PRESQUE ISLE, Me., June 7. — Fire swept an area of fully one quarter of the village tonight, burning 100 dwelling houses, ten potato sheds, the Canadian Pacific Railway freight station, the Congregational church and Masonic hall, causing a loss estimated conservatively at \$300,000. The residences burned included some of the best in the village, although the greater number were of the poorer sort. Upwards of a thousand people are homeless.

A high wind which prevailed all day is responsible largely for the extent of the disaster. It carried blazing embers a distance of a quarter of a mile in many cases and new fires started in several places at once after the first was well under way. All the burned buildings were of frame construction and although they were not very close together, their dry shingled roofs were easily ignited by the showers of sparks. Steamers and volunteer fire companies from Houlton and Fort Fairfield assisted the local firemen with their hydrant service, but even with this aid the blaze could not be said to be fairly under control until the wind had died down after all the north-easterly portion of the town had been levelled and the flames had reached the woods and farming country.

It was 4.30 o'clock when the fire broke out in the kitchen of John Brown's boarding house on North Main street, and it was nearly midnight before the work of destruction was finished. The burned section covers an area of half a square mile, including North Main street, Allen street, Third street, Blake street and South street to Maine street.

From the boarding house the flames communicated to the Congregational church and from that time it was entirely beyond control, the wind making the hydrant streams practically useless.

Among the finer residences destroyed in the vicinity of the church were those of the following:

Former State Senator E. E. Parker.  
Charles Richardson, first selectman and representative in the legislature.  
A. E. Maguire.  
M. P. Cook.  
Baptist parsonage, occupied by Rev. E. L. Gates.  
F. B. Thompson.

The high school building was threatened but was saved from destruction by one of the visiting steamers.

Among the storehouses burned was one owned by A. M. Smith and contained a large quantity of valuable hardware and a storehouse owned by S. L. Black, in which there were many tons of potatoes. Most of the other potato storehouses were nearly empty.

Several persons were reported injured in various ways during the fire, but there were no fatalities. Miss Ethel Scott was injured in an automobile collision while assisting the fire sufferers. She was thrown from her machine, suffering severe contusions and possibly internal injuries.

Every able bodied man in the village turned out to assist in fighting the flames. All the stores and all the factories closed their doors and proprietors, clerks, and operators worked together to save property and assist the unfortunate. It was feared for hours that a shift of wind would turn the flames back upon the principal business portion of the town, but this calamity was happily averted. Late tonight the breeze died down, and except for an occasional leap of flames from smouldering embers, the fire was subdued. In the woods in the outskirts to the north, however, there was still visible the light of a good sized blaze. From the south also came reports of other fires in the woods sweeping in the general direction of the village; though still many miles distant.

Every house in town which escaped the flames was thrown open to the fire sufferers and the churches and school buildings were also a refuge for many. Hundreds spent the night in the open, guarding such effects as they had been able to save. In many cases it was possible to save very little from the houses as sparks blown long distances set them afire and consumed them while their occupants were absent fighting the blaze in another section.

Presque Isle has a population of nearly 5,000. It is the centre of the potato-raising district of Aroostook county, and is located on the Bangor & Aroostook railway, and at the terminus of a branch of the Canadian Pacific railroad, running from Aroostook Junction. The total state valuation of the town is \$2,000,000.

### LABORERS STRIKE.

Ottawa, June 5. — Nearly one hundred laborers employed on the new G.T.R. hotel went on strike yesterday morning. The men have been getting \$1.50 for a 10-hour day, less two cents for insurance against accident. They want \$1.75, or a reduction in hours.

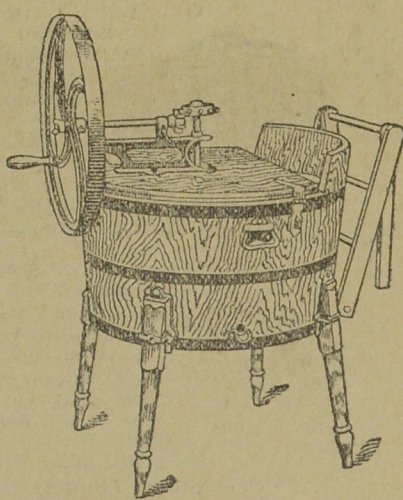
