PLEADS FOR PEACE

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux Speaks at Champlain Tercentenary.

HAVE HERITAGE OF AMITY

As Representative of Canada at Celebration at Burlington, Vt., Postmaster-General Is Guest of Honor—Hopes There Will Never Be Hostilities Between the United States and Great Britain.

Burlington, Vt., July 9.—The Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, Postmaster-General of Canada, in speaking here yesterday at the Champlain tercentenary celebration, made an eloquent plea for the perpetuation of progress and peace in North America as now exemplified by the cordial relations between his country and the United States. He said in part:

"Whilst we must show appreciation of the explorers and pioneers of this continent and of the warriors who fought and died here for their country, whilst to forget such true and brave men or even to yield them indifferent praise would be but shame, yet is not this the fittest occasion to proclaim our determination that now on and forever the American Commonwealth and the Dominion of Canada shall always promote and advance the cause of peace, harmony and civilization on this vast continent."

"There are heroes of peace as there are heroes of war. In our modern times death sacrifice is not demanded as in days gone by. With less glamor, perhaps, but with no less glory, can the statesmen by standing faithfully to their unthought tasks of public service make their country a better land. Assembled here on the historic shores of Lake Champlain the representatives of three great nations can well afford to proclaim before the whole world that the arts of peace are above all the most civilizing."

The speaker compared the celebration of the Quebec tercentenary a year ago and the Champlain celebration as equally important in recording the historical development of the North American Continent. He outlined the part the Canadian explorers had taken in the early colonizations and settlement of the west, and in the development of the whole northern continent.

There could be no better evidence of the friendly spirit existing between England and the United States than that for nearly a century the policing of the great lakes had been reduced to a minimum of armed cruisers, the speaker said. The same friendly spirit between his country and the United States was shown by the fact that there were already five treaties existing between the two countries, a sixth awaits ratification, and a seventh was almost completed, the Postmaster-General said.

"Canada" was the subject of an address delivered last night by Mr. Rodolphe Lemieux at the dinner given to President Taft in connection with the Champlain tercentenary celebration. The speaker paid his respects to President Taft by saying that the Canadians claimed a part ownership in him on account of the several hundred thousand of his countrymen who had gone over the border and became citizens of the United States.

One of the proudest memories in Canadian history was the fact that the little Canada of fifty years ago sent no less than 45,000 men to fight in the ranks of the north, to maintain the ascendancy of the Stars and Stripes, said the Postmaster-General.

The speaker said there could never be any real barriers arise between the United States and Canada, as their futures were already so closely linked together by all the ties of friendship and mutual trade.

A Plucky Woman.

London, Ont., July 9.—Rare presence of mind and magnificent pluck was all that prevented Mrs. Oscar Wanton and her two-year-old baby from being ground to death beneath the wheels of the merry-go-round at Springfield Park.

Mrs. Wanton was standing on the platform holding the baby on a horse when a section of the merry-go-round gave way and she and the baby were thrown between the wheels. She managed to grab the flooring with one hand and held on to the child with the other and was dragged around twice before the machine was stopped.

Contrary to Rules.

London, July 9.—By a vote of 224 to 24 the church council, which was attended by the leading bishops, clergy and laymen of the Church of England, yesterday declared that marriage to a deceased wife's sister, recently legalized in this country, was contrary to the moral rules of the church and to the principles of the Scriptures.

Furthermore, the use of the prayer book in the service solemnizing such marriages was repudiated in the strongest terms.

Second Only to King.

London, July 9.—(C.A.P. Cable.)—Amongst the world-wide telegrams received by Mrs. Joseph Chamberlain on the occasion of her husband's 73rd birthday were messages from the C.M.A. and Daughters of the Empire of Toronto, and from Sir J. P. Whitney, who, on behalf of his colleagues, said that Mr. Chamberlain stood next to the King in the estimation of over-sea Britons.

May Be Double Murder.

Niagara Falls, N.Y., July 9.—The police last night are considering the theory that the English couple found dead yesterday morning may have both been murdered. Murder and suicide was the first belief. It is thought the woman may have had a paramour, who did the shooting when English surprised them.

BRIEFS FROM THE WIRES.

The Hamilton Board of Education granted several increases in salaries. A severe earthquake was felt at Simla, India, and at points in Turkistan.

Two Kingston grocers have been summoned on a charge of selling adulterated coffee.

Japanese are strongly reinforcing the garrison at Mukden and are extending fortifications.

Frank Seed's cheese factory at Chantry, near Brockville, was burned with 150 boxes of cheese.

Charles T. Coombes, fireman on the steamer Saronic, was drowned at Fort William by falling into the river.

The Calgary Express was ditched near Edmonton, as the result of a spreading rail, and five men were more or less hurt.

Bernard Keller, an electrician, 27 years old, living at Fort Erie, Ont., was one of three men terribly burned in a blowing out of fuse at a sub-station of the Cataract Power and Conduit Co. at Buffalo.

Serdar Sokowicz, a Galician settler from Hirsch, Sask., returning with a carload of effects, was killed while the car was being shunted at Winnipeg. Seeking fresh air he crawled to the car roof, was thrown off and his head crushed.

Suffragettes at New York.

New York, July 9.—A hurdy-gurdy and tambourine were used by two militant suffragettes yesterday, whose English tactics, adopted for the first time in New York, met with such a boisterous reception in City Hall Park, on the edge of the financial district, that a riot nearly resulted. A meek-looking man pulled the hurdy-gurdy while Mrs. Sophia Loebinger and Miss Helen Murphy, the suffragettes, wore badges and streamers bearing "Votes for Women" and carried copies of The Suffragettes, as they sang their tambourines.

Within five minutes they were the centre of such a crush that they had to shirk for the police. Not a copy of the official publication was sold and there were no speeches. A squad of police made a lane for the two women to the nearest subway station, and home they hurried gratefully. The same two made their appearance in Wall street on Wednesday.

Hudson Bay Co. Wins.

London, July 9.—In the Court of Appeals yesterday, in the case of Stevens v. Hudson Bay Co., the court allowed the company's appeal from the decision of Mr. Justice Channell. The case raised the question of the liability of the company to bring into account for purposes of assessment the sum of £177,857 realized on the sale of land during the last of the three years which were taken to obtain an average of the profits to be assessed. Their lordships held that the sum in question is not to be regarded as profits or gains denied by the company, and further, that Judge Channell was wrong in holding that the company carried on the business of dealing in and selling land.

Challenge to Duel.

Rome, July 9.—The Minister of Posts and Telegraphs yesterday sent a challenge to a Republican deputy as a result of the debate in the Chamber of Deputies Wednesday night on the proposal to give the Italian Lloyd Steamship Co. a twenty-five year subvention for the transportation of mail.

Signor Calliani, the deputy in question, yesterday explained that he did not allude to the personal honesty of the Minister, but to his political honesty, but this explanation did not satisfy Signor Schanzer. The bearers of his challenge were Admiral Miraballo, the Minister of Marine, and Gen. Spingardi, the Minister of War.

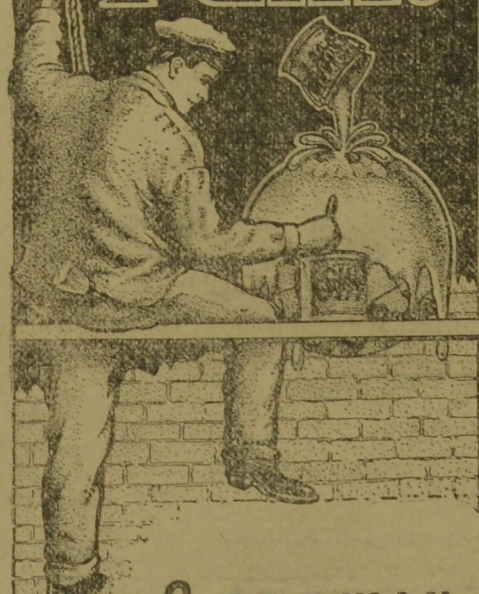
