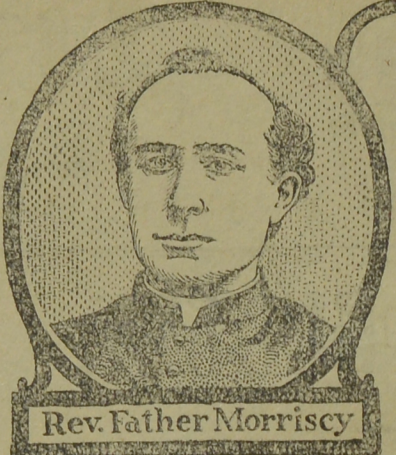


OLD TIMERS' BANQUET

Survivors of Canada's First Parliament to meet around Festive Board at Ottawa

OTTAWA, Feb. 13.—Plans are being laid for the sixth annual banquet of the Canadian Club at Ottawa, which will make this event one of exceptional interest to all who take part. The gathering of the club on this occasion will be held in honor of the surviving senators and members of the first parliament of the Dominion, eleven in number, of whom it is expected that at least eight or nine will be able to attend. The older statesmen of Canada, who are to be thus honored, are Sir Mackenzie Bowell, Sir Charles Tupper, Sir Richard Cartwright, Hon. Edward Blake, Sir John Carling, Hon. John Costigan, Hon. Senator William Miller, Hon. Senator Wm. Ross, Hon. A. R. McClellan, Hon. James Young, of Galt and Sir Jas. Grant. Of these gentlemen three

make their home in Ottawa the year round, and others are in attendance on the session of parliament. Sir Charles Tupper is at present in the Old Country, and it is doubtful if Hon. Mr. Blake's health will permit of his attending. Hon. Mr. McClellan is an ex-Senator and an ex-Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, and is at present the representative of the government of Canada on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway board. Hon. James Young is a resident of Galt, Ont., but could probably be persuaded to visit Ottawa for this occasion. In addition to the foregoing the club would probably be favored with the company of most prominent men or both parties in the present parliament. No date has yet been set for the event, but in this respect the club will consult the convenience of those who are to be guests.

CUCUMBER-ORANGE WONDER.

New Vegetable the Result of Several Years' Work and is Round in Shape.

BOSTON, Feb. 15.—Outdoing the wizard Burbank, a New England man has produced a vegetable which is a cross between a cucumber and an orange. The new cucumber is fine-grained, delicious to taste, and of a perfect yellow color, and it was produced by crossing the blossom of a cucumber and an orange, by Howard S. Hill, of Gardiner.

"I had an orange and a cucumber one day and without thought mixed together some of the pulp of the two," tells Mr. Hill. "The product was mostly cucumber, but the orange gave it a most delicious flavor. Instantly the idea came to mind to blend the two into one growth. Then I began my experiments. The first year the product of my cucumber vine changed slightly in color. The second year they took on the almost round shape of the orange. It was a naval plant with which I was conducting my experiments, and the naval showed perfectly the third year, at which time the cucumber took the perfect round shape; the spines or little prickles dropped off and the cucumber had the unmistakable orange flavor. "I picked the cucumber-orange ten

weeks after planting. From a single vine I had five perfect ones. "The cucumber-orange is of goodly size, even larger than an orange. On the inside of it, nearest the skin, it is mostly orange, and has the little cells similar to that fruit. The centre of the orange-cucumber is the same as that of a cucumber, but the seeds are not like either an orange or a cucumber. "At the present time, at the end of the third year, I have upwards of sixty seeds, and propose to raise all these when I put my next crop into the ground. I hope soon to raise seedless cucumber-oranges. "Some time ago I made experiments along this line, and did produce a seedless cucumber, but at the end of the year, when I had to take up my crop, I found myself at the point where I started, for there were no seeds to plant. It was a contingency I had not reckoned with, and I thought the joke was rather on me. "My cucumber-orange has a sweet taste, not unlike that of a fully ripe orange. "The ordinary cucumber matures in about eight weeks; it took my cucumber-orange from ten to twelve weeks to grow fully."

ACCUSED OF FALSE PRETENCES.

Lord Ribblesdale Once Wormed Important Interview Out of Parnell. There were great rejoicings at Gisborne Park, near Clitheroe, England, for the coming-of-age of Hon. Charles Lister, son of Lord Ribblesdale, and the future baron. Lord Ribblesdale is generally regarded as one of the handsomest men in the peerage, and has the unique distinction of having been named "the Ancestor" by the King on account of his dignified appearance and air of belonging to the courtly age of the past. He is a noted sportsman; was Master of the Buckhounds, for three years, and has written an interesting book on stag-hunting. He served in the Rifle Brigade for some years, but never saw active service. The house in Gisborne Park was built over three hundred years ago of stone from the Yorkshire fells. A curious story is told concerning the decoration of the building. In the early part of the eighteenth century a party of French plasterers journeyed from Paris to Gisborne Park, where they worked for a year or so on the adornment of the house. And they left permanent evidences of their visit in some singular figures on the wall of the principal staircase. These figures are in half relief, life size, and they are represented as reading, writing, training flowers, and in other such occupations. The great hall is hung with pictures. Among them is one of Cromwell, by Sir Peter Lely, on the canvas of which is painted the word "Now," possibly in allusion to the immediate execution of the ill-fated King. Lord Ribblesdale is noted for having accomplished an extremely difficult task. He once interviewed Parnell. They happened to travel by chance in the same compartment from London to Holyhead, and the first efforts of the peer to draw the Irish leader into conversation were met by very brief replies. In time, however, Parnell thawed, and talked at some length upon the Irish Tenants' Arrears Bill, which was then the subject of great political interest, and many other matters besides. The interview duly appeared in a magazine, and Parnell never questioned its accuracy, merely saying it was got by false pretences.

HOVEY NOTE CAMPS.

Feb. 8.—As I have saw notes from other camps I thought I would write and let you know how we are getting along. We are situated about twelve miles from the settlement at the old crook room on Salmon Brook. Our cook room is 30 x 30, and our sleeping room is 30 x 32 long. Our boss is Robson Hovey. He is well liked by all, and when he comes out in the woods he always has a smile for his men. Our cook is Chester McEwence of Boiestown, who is one of the finest cooks on the Miramichi waters, and to see his tables, you would think you were at the Barker house or Queen hotel. Our cookie is Percy J. Boies, he is a jolly young fellow. He has always a smile for the men when they come in the cook room. Percy always calls the men about six o'clock. Tumble out boys and get out warm beans and two buns, pie, etc. There are about sixty men at present, and twelve teams, and one tank team. Our tottem is Mr. Benjamin Norrad of Campbell Settlement, who has lots of supplies on hand, oats, hay, beef, flour, etc. Mr. Norrad is called one of the best Tottems on the road. Mr. Manley Black, of Pleasant Ridge, is our sled maker, blacksmith, snow plow builder and repairer. Mr. Black is kept very busy in the evening. Mr. John MacCarty and his friend William Black are conducting the water wagon. Messrs. George MacKenzie and Alex W. Gradie are doing a very skillful bit of work, making picture frames. Our road monkeys are Alex. MacLeod, William Rowan and C. E. Boies. Daniel Kelley has full charge of the gravel pit and Mr. Kelley is the man in the right place. We received a call from the Rev. John K. King. Mr. King preached a very good sermon to large congregation, and afterwards entertained

the young men to music on his graphophone. The young men presented Mr. King with \$26.50 as a donation. Our old friends, W. Ralston and D. MacCatherine of Fredericton, the jewellers men, paid our camp a visit on Saturday evening, Feb. 6th. They done quite a business selling watches, rings, etc. Nearly all our young men had their fingers covered with rings. Our men are very glad to see Thomas Norrad from the settlement if he has any mail for them. Some of the boys get three to four letters at a time, and they keep corresponding back to their best girls. We receive two daily and weekly papers twice a week, and we get all the news that is going on in other parts.

MOTHERS OF INDIA Urged to Breed Rebels From the Cradle

The District Magistrate of Lahore India has confirmed the confiscation of the press and plant of a revolutionary newspaper named Inqilab for publishing articles inciting to rebellion. One of the articles in particular urged Indian mothers to breed rebels from the cradle. Tension continues between the Mohammedans and Hindus in Bengal. Following the recent riot when a Moslem mob was fired upon by troops, some Hindus attacked a Mohammedan mosque and desecrated
