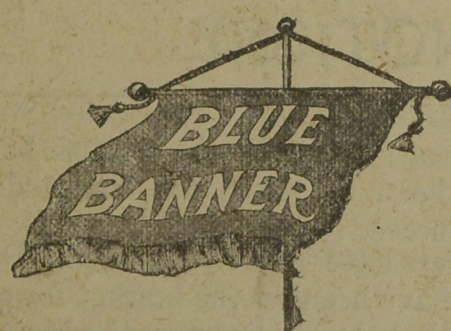

METHODIST CONFERENCE.**Resolution Adopted Expressing Appreciation of Dr. Inch's Services--Church Union Discussed.**

WOODSTOCK, June 21.—(Special)—The Methodist conference this morning passed a resolution regretting the retirement of Dr. Stewart, and expressing appreciation of his valuable services.

Another resolution congratulated Rev. H. S. Magee on his appointment to the assistant secretaryship of Moral and Social Reform department, and pledging their hearty sympathy and support.

The temperance report criticised the provincial government for not passing a prohibitory law, but expressed approval of the amendments made. It urged severer laws for the punishment of adultery and fornication, asked that the I. C. R. be prohibited from carrying liquor into Scott Act counties, and endorsed the request of the Prince Edward Island legislature for an act prohibiting the importation of liquor into provinces where the sale is prohibited.

WOODSTOCK, N. B., June 19.—The morning session opened at 9 a. m., President Rev. A. D. McCulley in the chair. After the usual devotional services and reading the minutes of previous session, Rev. Mr. Hudson presented the report of the Epworth League and Young People's Society committee.

Number of leagues, 33, increase, 2; membership, 1,243, increase, 18; Young Men's Society, 2, decrease, 3; membership, 160; decrease, 87; Young People's Societies, 3, decrease, 1; membership, 71; decrease, 49; Junior Epworth Leagues, 8, increase, 1; membership, 284, increase 11.

Financial—Total contributions, \$2,501.46. Of this amount \$635.27 was given to missions.

Your committee wishes the conference to note the fact that the Young People's Societies, other than Epworth Leagues, are on the decrease. It will be observed, however, that the Epworth Leagues are holding their own and that the junior leagues show an increase.

The church property committee reported as follows: Committee met and organized. Rev. Robert Wilson, chairman; J. L. Dawson, secretary. Report was received and recommended.

Rev. Mr. Fulton introduced Rev. Mr. Ireland of Woodstock to the conference.

Mr. Ireland expressed himself as being strongly in favor of organic church union and believed in few of the important minority arguments against the proposed union and that every minister in favor should express reasons for his belief. It is the duty of all in favor to keep the project to the front in season and out of season. He believed union would be consummated.

DR. INCH HONORED.
Rev. Dr. Sprague moved the following resolution, seconded by J. Hunter White:

Whereas, James R. Inch, Esq., LL. D., an honorary member of this conference, resigned the office of chief superintendent of education in the province of New Brunswick and has announced his intention of retiring from active public life; therefore

Children as Shoplifters.

Vancouver, B. C., June 19.—A shoplifting gang who have been for weeks causing departmental store managers great worry, is made up of children, the eldest just past 12 years, the youngest five.

Those arrested are: Two McKee girls, aged 12 and 7; a girl named Waterman, aged 12, and a McKee boy, aged 5. They all live on Mount Pleasant. They claim that they were first started on a career of crime by older girls, who told them how easy it was to pick up things in stores. For a time they worked for them, getting a share of what they purloined.

Money-Lender in Court.

Chatham, June 19.—John W. White, a money-lender, charged with levying a charge over the amount allowed by law on a \$250 loan made to Timothy McQueen, came yesterday morning before Judge Dowling, who reserved judgment. White admits loaning McQueen \$250 from which he deducted \$12 for his fees as solicitor. He also admits that within a year he accepted from McQueen the sum of \$250 in full payment of the \$250 loan, from which the \$12 was deducted as fees.

The French Treaty.

Ottawa, June 19.—The Government has received word from Paris that the bill ratifying the Franco-Canadian trade convention, as negotiated by Hon. Messrs. Fielding and Brodeur in 1907, and amended last summer, is now before the Chamber of Deputies, and will be assented to within a short time. The treaty, however, cannot come into effect until formally ratified by the Canadian Parliament, which will be done early next session.

Rev. Harry Harrison presented the report from the statistical committee.

Rev. J. W. McConnell reported for the Conference Board of Trustees: Receipts, \$62,83; disbursements, \$361,50; balance on hand, \$1,33.

Rev. W. Gladstone Watson reported for the educational committee:

Rev. W. Gladstone Watson was elected conference secretary for this committee, and Dr. David Allison was elected conference treasurer.

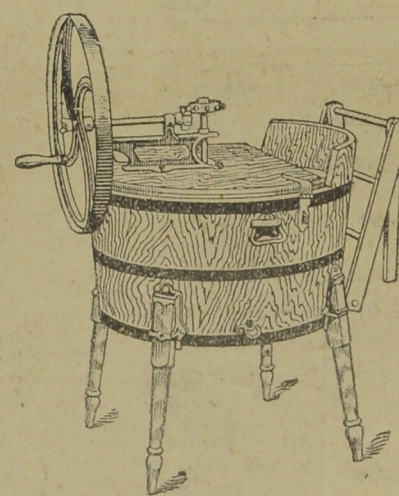
