DIED IN MALDEN.

Mrs. Annie E. Lounsbury, of this City, Called to Her Reward.

A telegram this morning announced the death at the Malden, Mass., hospital, last night, of Mrs. Annie E. Lounsbury, of this city, widow of Mr. George A. Lounsbury, of Newcastle. She has been spending the winter at Wolfville with her son, who is a student at Acadia College, and a few weeks ago went to Malden to undergo an operation for an internal trouble. She seemed to be getting along nicely until the latter part of last week, when she suffered a relapse, and the end came quite unexpectedly. The news of her death came as a great shock to her many friends in this city.

The deceased lady was formerly Miss Clark of Queensbury, and was a sister-in-law of Mr. John T. Clark of this city. She resided at Newcastle for some time, and about seven years ago, on the death of her husband, removed to this city, and erected a dwelling house on the corner of St. John and Brunswick streets. She has spent the last two winters at Wolfville, but it was her intention to spend the coming winter at her home here.

The late Mrs. Lounsbury was a devoted Christian lady, and for years has been an active worker in the Baptist church, contributing liberally to its support. She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. H. B. MacDonald of Chatham, and one son, Mr. G. Holland Lounsbury, of this city.

The body will arrive from Boston by the noon train tomorrow, and the funeral will take place from the homestead, St. John street, at two p.m. on Wednesday.

DEATH TODAY.

Mr. Thomas F. Thompson, hotype operator at the Gleaner office, died this morning from pleuro-pneumonia, after an illness since Wednesday last. The deceased gentleman was a native of Albert county, but had been employed with the Gleaner for about a year. He was on the Globe composing staff for seventeen years. YACHT UPSET.

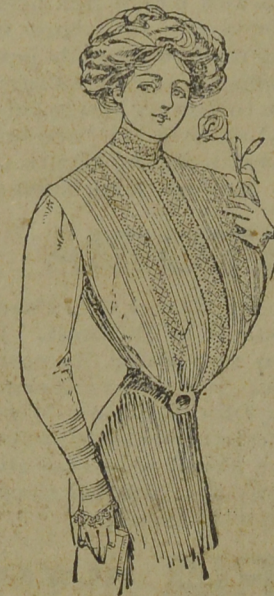
