## UNITY OF EMPIRE.

Patriotic Speeches at Banquet to Visiting  
Press Men at Toronto

TORONTO, Ont., May 18.—(Special)—A note of militant and industrial imperialism swayed a social gathering of Australians, New Zealanders and Canadians in Toronto last night at a banquet tendered to the visiting journalists by the press. "The hour is not far distant," declared Sir James Whitney, "when the units which compose the British Dominions beyond the sea will come together to confer a magnificent plan of imperial defence." "Germany must be made to understand," observed Lieutenant-Governor Gibson of Ontario "that not only Great Britain but the Dominions beyond the seas must be reckoned with in any struggle which affects British supremacy on the seas." "Surely it would be a great thing to have a British cable giving from one end of the Empire to the other records of your deeds. Surely a better system under which letters could be sent from New Zealand to London in three weeks would be a great thing and if our statesmen put the Empire first these could be consumed in a week," declared Gresley Lukino of New Zealand.

## MONCTON BUDGET.

Scott Act Violator Under Sentence Made a  
Lucky Find.

MONCTON, May 18.—(Special)—Albert Girouard, was not so unlucky as he thought, when last week he was arrested charged with three different violations of the Scott Act and sentenced to pay fines aggregating one hundred and fifty dollars or nine months in jail. While in the local lockup awaiting transportation to Dorchester Girouard sent a policeman out to secure him some clams. As he opened one of the bivalves he discovered a large pearl said to be valued at about one hundred dollars. Claiming that he had walked from St. John to Campbellton, Albert Dugay, who escaped from the industrial zone at St. John was taken through the city from Campbellton this morning in charge of Chief of Police Crawford of the north shore town. Dugay says that during three days of his tramp from St. John to Campbellton he had nothing to eat but orange peelings.

## GEN. DRURY HERE.

Annual Inspection No. 4 Regimental  
Depot Now Going On.

Brigadier General Drury, of Halifax, commanding the militia of the Maritime Provinces, Lieut. Col. R. L. Wadmore, commanding the R. C. R., Halifax, and Colonel George Rolt White, D.O.C., arrived in the city last evening and registered at the Queen. This morning with all due pomp and ceremony, they commenced an inspection of H. Company of the R. C. R., which numbers about sixty men. The troops were exercised in company and physical drill by Major Flisset, and made a remarkably good showing.

The inspecting officers were afterwards shown over the barracks premises by Lieut. Cols. Chinn and Bridges, and Major Flisset, and they also paid a visit to the mess room at dinner hour. They were most favorably impressed with the evidence of neatness and cleanliness to be seen on every side, and complimented the officers on the desirable state of affairs.

This afternoon the visitors are making an inspection of the orderly room and regimental books.

General Drury and Lt. Col. Wadmore will return to Halifax this evening.

## HAINS SENTENCED.

Flushing, N. Y., May 17.—Captain Peter E. Hains, Jr., U. S. A., who was convicted of manslaughter in the first degree for killing Wm. E. Annis, at the Bayside Yacht Club last August, was sentenced today by Justice Garretson, in the Supreme Court to an indeterminate sentence of not less than eight years, nor more than sixteen years, at hard labor in the State Prison.

John F. McIntyre, counsel for the defendant, made the usual motion for a new trial, on the ground that the verdict was against the weight of evidence, and also contrary to law. Justice Garretson denied these motions.

## YOUTHFUL TRAVELLERS.

WINNIPEG, Man., May 18.—(Special)—Three little tots were found in a bunk at Emerson. When an inspector asked their destination they replied they were going to Star city, Sask. Their tickets expired at Boundary, and it was further found that they had only thirteen cents between them. They had come all the way from Kansas, where their parents had deserted them, and they had been sent to Star city, where their grandparents now reside.

## RUSHING THE BUSINESS.

Insurance Bill and Other Important Measures  
Passed by Parliament.

OTTAWA, May 17.—The Canadian parliament will not be called upon to give effect to the French treaty this session. The French chamber of deputies has failed to take action on the treaty, and the government of Canada see no reason why they should urge parliament to give it effect under the circumstances.

Two other matters which will go over are the immigration bill and the insurance bill. The time left to parliament this session is too short to call upon the two chambers to give these bills their final approval. The house of commons put the finishing touches to the insurance bill today and dispatched it to the senate in company with the Hon. Sydney Fisher's bill, authorizing a flat rate increase of \$150 to members of the inside civil service.

There was some further discussion of the clause in the insurance bill providing for a tax of fifteen per cent on the net cost of insurance placed with foreign unlicensed companies and an amendment was proposed reducing the tax to five per cent. This was lost, however, and the bill was read a third time.

On motion to go into supply Mr. Jameson (Digby) called attention to the proposed reconstruction of a bridge across the river at Weymouth by the Dominion Atlantic Railway company, and urged the desirability of the government granting assistance to have the swing span of the bridge widened to 55 feet in the interests of navigation.

Mr. Borden and Dr. Daniel joined in the representations of Mr. Jameson.

Hon. Mr. Fielding regretted that the member for Digby had not given notice to the minister of public works that he was going to bring the matter up. In the latter's absence he could only observe that having acquired the bridge with a certain span it was, perhaps, not surprising that the Dominion Atlantic company objected to build it on a larger scale unless somebody granted aid. No doubt there were many members who felt that they could find good use for \$48,000, which it was estimated the increased span would cost, but in the present state of financial matters he had felt it his duty to urge his colleagues to engage in no larger expenditures that could be avoided.

## REFORM OF THE SENATE

Members of the Upper House Get Rid of  
Troublesome Question.

OTTAWA, Ont., May 17.—The senate this afternoon in a most ingeniously effective manner disposed of the various proposals that have been submitted to it this session by members desirous of effecting some sort of reform in the upper chamber. The debate on Hon. R. W. Scott's resolution for a change in the constitution of the senate by making it two-thirds elective and one-third appointive by the crown has been continued spasmodically in the senate for some three months past. Several amendments to that resolution have been offered advocating various other proposals for senate reform. Today Senator Ellis, in continuing the debate, moved a final amendment declaring that as both parties thought there should be a change in the constitution of the senate, and as the Liberals had sixteen years ago declared for senate reform, and now had power to carry it out, the senate was now prepared to give careful consideration to any proposition that the government might make looking to improvement in themselves opposed to any change and the present system.

Sensors Beque and Wood declared Senator Choquette made a non-committal speech. Finally as a happy way out of the whole trouble of deciding on how to reform themselves, Senator Domville moved that the debate be adjourned until Thursday.

## DISMISSED WITH COSTS.

Collapse of Election Petition Against Member of  
P. E. I. Government.

CHARLOTTETOWN, May 18.—(Special)—Today trial of the election petition against Hon. J. H. Cummiskey, Commissioner of Public Works, came up before Chief Justice Sullivan today. The Petitioner's counsel stated he would not proceed with the case, not having sufficient evidence to show according to law that enough corrupt acts had been committed to influence a sufficient number of votes to affect the election as Cummiskey's majority was 21. The case was therefore dismissed with costs.

Several petty robberies have occurred in Charlottetown lately, the most recent one being in Prowse Bros. Ltd. large dry goods store. The thieves broke in large plate glass window at rear of the store, helping themselves to clothing, hats etc. There is as yet no clue to the perpetrators.

## MAINE LUMBER CUT.

Estimated That it Will be Just About  
the Same as Last Year.

BANGOR, Me., May 17.—With the season's lumber cutting operations practically at an end, it is estimated that the cut in Maine this year amounted to about 700,000,000 feet as compared with other seasons, these figures show no appreciable gain or loss, the anticipated heavy falling off from last season's cut being overcome to a considerable extent by the late spring. A considerable quantity of snow remained on the ground up to very recently, making it possible

to pursue logging operations later than usual.

Much of the lumber cut will be taken to the pulp mills to be converted into paper.

The log driving season is now on, and thousands of men are gathered at the headquarters of the Penobscot and other rivers ready to start the logs down the waterways to the pulp and lumber mills. In addition to the logs cut this season a large quantity of lumber cut last year has been left in the woods on account of the inert market, will be brought down soon.
