

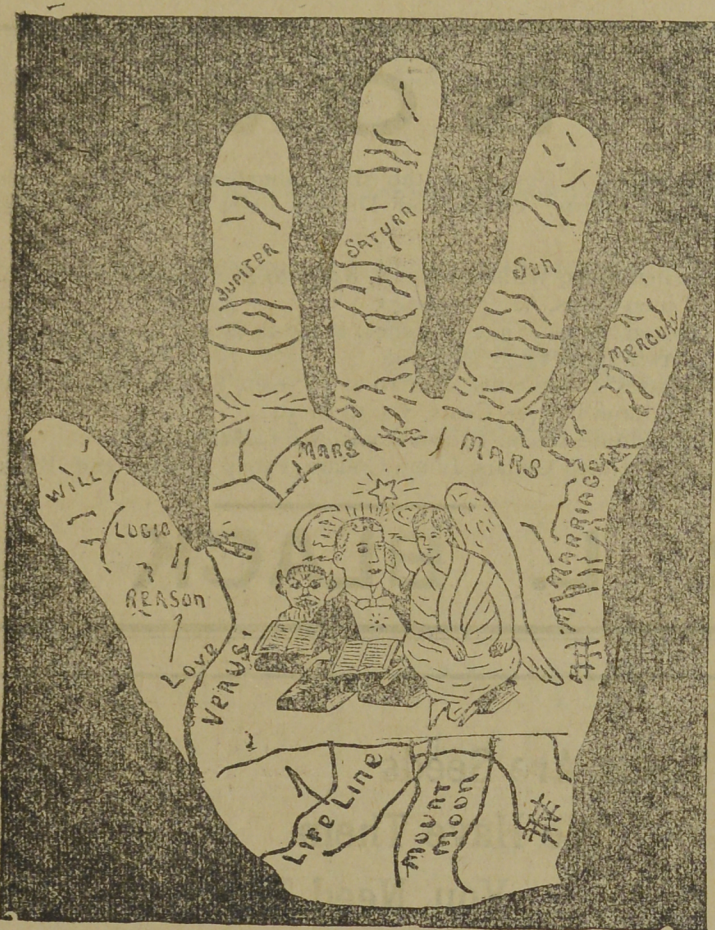

ELOPING HEIRESS FOUND.

Brooklyn Girl Is Discovered in St. Catharines With Husband.

Buffalo, May 17.—In a pretty little cottage in St. Catharines, Ont., a reporter found Hazel Stuart Drew, the pretty 17-year-old heiress who eloped from Brooklyn on Christmas Day with Walter McGreal, the 20-year-old son of Thomas F. McGreal, a retired United States naval pharmacist.

Last Monday Hazel became of age, and entitled to the fortune of \$150,000 bequeathed to her by her grandfather, the late Daniel Drew.

The reporter found the runaways living together under the name of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Dinsmore, one of many pseudonyms they have taken since they have disappeared.

There is a warrant issued by Magistrate Dooley in the Adams street police court, Brooklyn, for young McGreal, charging abduction, but it will not now be enforceable, because Hazel is 18 years old. The happy bride will soon be baptized a Catholic, the religion of her husband, and immediately thereafter they will be married by a priest, and then start for home and seek the forgiveness of the girl's mother, who has been bitterly opposed to the match, and who has vowed that she will prosecute her daughter's husband to the bitter end. Mrs. McGreal is a tall, slender girl, of graceful figure, with a mass of chestnut brown hair, and sparkling blue eyes.

BRIEFS FROM THE WIRES.

The petition against the election of Hon. Sydney Fisher was dismissed.

Archbishop Bruchesi has placed the Theatre Royal at Montreal under the ban.

Percy M. Stinson of London, Ont., was killed on the railway near Dorchester.

Germany is establishing a line of airship stations along the French frontier.

A number of Armenians were fired on by a band of Moslems near Adana on Saturday.

The fourth son of Abdul Hamid, the deposed Sultan of Turkey, has been placed under arrest.

Foreigners at Urumieh, Persia, including British and American missionaries, are in danger.

The French postal strike is practically dead, and the leaders in their desperation are adopting destructive tactics.

The steamer Gargantua carried away three gates in the Welland Canal yesterday, but repairs are being rushed.

Rev. George Anderson was consecrated Bishop of Moosonee by Archbishop Matheson at the Church of St. Andrew, Kildonan.

Chas. L. Foxwell, a mining stock broker, is under arrest at Washington. He is alleged to have victimized a number of firms in Canada and the United States.

Carried Big Bylew.

Owen Sound, May 17.—Little interest was shown in the results of the vote on four bylaws voted upon by the property-owners here Saturday.

Two were defeated and two carried. The former were to raise \$7,000 to remodel the interior of the old town hall building, and \$3,500 to erect an isolation hospital. The majorities against were 129 and 53 respectively.

The expenditure of \$125,000, to take in part of the Sydenham river, construct a sedimentation basin and a filtration plant, adding a million gallons daily to the supply, was endorsed by a majority of 50. The extension of the electric light plant by an expenditure of \$30,000 was also ratified, the majority being 88.

Dead Number 10,000.

Adana, May 17.—The estimates of from 20,000 to 25,000 Christians killed by Mohammedans, in the Province of Adana, made a fortnight ago, must be revised. It is now ascertained that the number can hardly reach more than 10,000. Thousands who were supposed to have been killed in the country districts have since come into some of the large towns for relief. Nearly 50,000 persons have received assistance from the foreign and Turkish relief committees or officials at Adana, 22,000 at Marash, 14,000 at Hadjin, 3,000 at Mersina, 2,000 at Latakia, 4,000 at Tarsus and a comparatively large number at Aintab and Alexandretta.

Blinded by Explosion.

Indianapolis, May 17.—"I am badly burned and blind," was a message slowly ticked in the Panhandle railroad dispatcher's office at Logansport, Ind., last Saturday night from G. E. Frazel, an operator in a block tower near Marion.

The dispatcher ordered a freight train to stop at the place, and the crew found Frazel suffering terrible agony from burns. He had been scalded by the explosion of a bottle of coffee he was heating on a stove, and felt his way to a key to call for help. Frazel was taken to Marion, where yesterday a physician says he fears he cannot save Frazel's sight.

Jap-British Parade.

Victoria, B.C., May 17.—The day's proceedings in Victoria to welcome the Japanese cruisers Soya and Asagao near midnight with one of the strangest parades ever seen in Victoria. Four hundred bluejackets from the warships marched arm-in-arm with British bluejackets from the Esquimalt station and soldiers from the local garrison.

The march followed a smoker and concert and a reception to Admiral Uchida and to the officers and cadets by the Japanese colony.

Cuss Words a Crime.

Madison, Wis., May 17.—The lower House of the Wisconsin Legislature has put the finishing touches to the bill, making it a misdemeanor to swear in public. The bill is first introduced simply prohibited swearing in the presence of persons under 18 years of age.

When the bill reached the Senate in that form Senator Hudson submitted an amendment striking out the reference to age. The amendment has been adopted and the bill passed.

BOLD TRAIN ROBBERY.

Fast Mail Train on Great Northern Looted by Bandits.

SPOKANE, Wash., May 16.—Bandits held up and robbed the Great Northern fast mail train, nine miles east of Spokane, at Morse, early today. In running the engine back to the detached cars after looting the train, it crashed into the train. Several passengers were injured but none fatally. Medical aid and a relief train rushed to the scene with a sheriff's posse and some newspaper men.

This is the second hold-up in this vicinity in the last month. Bandits in the first case are still at large.

According to the report at Hilliard, the bandits have obtained booty amounting to more than \$20,000 from the mail car.

The Great Northern has offered a reward of \$10,000 for each robber captured.

When the train reached Colbert late last night some switching had to be done. While the engine crew was busy at this work two men sprang into the cab and thrusting revolvers against the bodies of Engineer William Miller and Fireman John Hall, ordered them to do as commanded.

The engineer and fireman complied, and the mail cars were cut off from the rest of the train by four other robbers. The locomotive and the mail car were then run up the track a few miles. Next the engineer and his fireman were forced to leave the cabs.

Two of the robbers went to the door of the mail car and ordered it open. Their command was obeyed by Benjamin F. Stumpf, mail clerk, who was hurried away from the cars with the engineers by a dozen revolver shots.

Manning the locomotive themselves the outlaws took the cars down the track and stole the registered mail. Then they started the locomotive back to the train and escaped.

OTTAWA SOCIETY DUPED.

Society Circles Fooled by Bogus Austrian Nobleman.

Ottawa, May 15.—There is a great deal of chaffing and quiet laughing going on in Ottawa's swell society circles just now, over the fooling many of the "turf hunters" have received from a very smart foreign adventurer who registered a week or so ago at one of the Capital's leading hotels as "Baron Ott." He and banker blew in from Gotham in a very mysterious manner, so that little notice was taken of them for a day or two. Then it was whispered about that the distinguished stranger was none other than the long lost Archduke John Ott, of Australia, years ago, and was said to have been crowned at sea while serving before the mast as an ordinary sailor on a M. P. in speaking to a reporter of the "Baron's" exploits, said that many in the select circles of the Capital received him with open arms on the strength of the diplomatic whisper. He was surfeited with lunches, dinners, pink teas, etc.

FIGURED IN DIVORCE COURT.

London exchanges of recent date show the Baron in a most unsavory light. According to the London Daily Telegraph, the self-styled Baron was called in the Divorce Court about three or four weeks ago before Mr. Justice Baggallay Deane. The "Baron" was "non est," of course, the result of the case being that an injured husband obtained a decree nisi with the custody of the child of the marriage.

The parties were Mr. Frederick Foster Flave Messum, who accused his wife of misconduct with the correspondent, Adolf Maximilian Ott, passing himself off, said counsel, as "Baron Ott."

Evidence was submitted fully substantiating the charges against the "Baron."

Toward the conclusion of the trial, the following colloquy took place: Mr. Justice Baggallay Deane: "What nationality is the man?"

Mr. Baggallay: "I do not know." The Judge: "It may be an Englishman, for aught we know."

Mr. Baggallay: "He may be. But at the Austrian Embassy nothing could be found out in regard to him."

Mr. Messum, the petitioner, said he now resided at Blackheath. His wife had property in Argentina to the value of £7,000 or £8,000.

The Judge: "What age is the respondent?"

The witness: "About forty-seven or forty-eight."

The festive "Baron" after getting a big haul of Bank of England notes from the infatuated women, suddenly left for posterity's view, and the spot chosen was the Canadian capital. A "st" round the "Baron's" return shows no trace of the sham "Baron" so it is presumed he has gone back to New York with his "brother" and word was returned to the highest authorities.

TRADE IS IMPROVING.

Bradstreet Says That Business on the Coast is Excellent.

Montreal reports to Bradstreet's say:—General business here reflects the pronounced improvement in weather conditions which has taken place in nearly all parts of the country. Retail trade has opened out nicely and the sorting trade for dry goods lines has shown a much better tone during the week.

Letter orders are coming in well and the outlook for summer business is bright.

Excellent orders for fall goods are coming in and if present indications are entirely borne out, the volume of business during the latter part of the year will be very satisfactory. In the matter of spring goods the sorting trade should be heavy in order to make up a good total trade as early orders were light. The movement of groceries is seasonably active.

Sugars are unchanged at the recent decline and there is now a good demand for canned goods. The hard ware business is of fair volume. Business in English and Scotch pig iron has been more active since the arrival of water cargoes. Prices are about steady. The demand for leather is fair and prices about steady. Country trade holds quiet. Collections are still quiet.

Toronto reports to Bradstreet's say: With the general improvement in weather conditions there has come a much better tone to general business here. In most lines of goods the movement is still of moderate volume, but the outlook has improved, and there is a general feeling of optimism regarding future business.

Retail trade in spring dry goods, footwear, etc., is more active and a good sorting trade is now making itself felt. Orders for fall goods are also satisfactory. In this connection it is understood stocks are light and orders are likely to be large. Much of course depends upon the coming crop.

When that is assured a big business is expected to open out in all branches of trade.

Hardware trade is showing steady improvement, particularly in building materials. This trade is now actively engaged and an unusually large number of big buildings are to be put up in this city during the next year or so. A rather better demand for groceries has opened out and good shipments are being made.

Manufacturers here are now busy. The demand for hides and leather has improved and prices show a stiffer tendency. Hogs and produce are

firm. Collections are fair to moderately good.

Vancouver and Victoria reports say: An excellent business is moving all along the coast. Sorting orders for spring lines are heavy and collections are better than they have been for some time. The summer and fall trade promise to be heavy and provincial industries are entering upon a period of renewed activity. The demand for lumber is already brisk and the season's operations are expected to be large.

Quebec: Seasonable weather is badly wanted and little change is noticeable in the trade condition over the preceding week. As the season advances an improvement is anticipated. Collections are still on the slow side. Manufacturers are fairly busy. Building trades continue active.
