

## TOLEDO SHAREHOLDERS.

Stock in Which Fredericton People are Interested  
Not in Great Demand Just Now.

The break in Toledo shares on the organization developments is not particularly encouraging, and it looks now as if the common stockholders are in for another long wait.

Holders of the company's first mortgage 5 per cent. bonds, maturing on July 1st next, would be given the option of a two-years' extension of the security, or retirement on date of maturity. There are in all between \$5,000,000 and \$6,000,000 of these bonds, and it is confidently expected that but few holders will offer their securities for retirement.

However, in case a large number of bondholders present their certificates for payment, it is proposed to issue short-term notes to provide funds for meeting the maturity obligations.

ANOTHER \$5,000,000.

In addition to the company's 5 per cent. bonds maturing on July 1st next, there are about \$5,000,000 falling due on the same date. It will be recalled that interest due July 1, 1908, on these bonds was defaulted, and still remains in default, and it is understood that nearly all these securities have been deposited with the bondholders' committee.

While it is not possible to ascertain at present just what disposition will be made of the maturing 4s, plans are now well under way for a reorganization which will provide for the paying off or possible extension of these obligations.

RENEWAL OF FRANCHISES.

The company has comparatively few street railway franchises which expire during 1910 and others which terminate between now and 1914. It is expected that if these franchises can be renewed on a reasonable basis, the company will experience no difficulty in taking care of its maturing obligations and effecting a thoroughly satisfactory reorganization of the property. Those having the matter in charge state that there is every reason to believe that the Toledo authorities will be perfectly fair as regards the franchise question.

The company's gas, light and power franchises are perpetual. It now owns every street railway in Toledo, as well as those entering the city, while at the same time it owns or controls all the electric lighting, power and gas business of that city.

Its contract with the city for street lighting does not expire for eight years.

THE EARNINGS.

Earnings of the company thus far in the current fiscal year have shown considerable improvement over the previous year. In March the gross scored a gain of over \$12,000, and net \$8,800 over the corresponding month a year ago, while the surplus after charges represented a gain of better than \$14,200, brought about largely as the result of lower fixed charges. For the first quarter of 1909, the company's gross expanded about \$27,000, and the net about \$15,700, nearly all of which was saved for the improvement in surplus over the like period of the previous year.

THE DIVIDENDS.

The company paid 2 per cent. yearly dividends from May 1, 1905 to November 1, 1907, when they were discontinued. As a matter of fact, the company's earnings available for dividends yearly have been in excess of the dividend rate during the last eight fiscal periods, in 1906 nearly 4 per cent. having been earned on the outstanding capital stock.

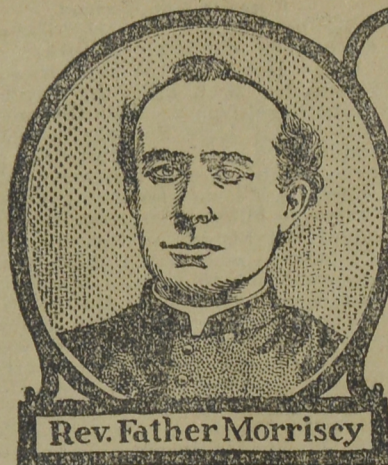
Former Suicides.

## IS NEARLY THROUGH

House Almost Finishes Amendments to Insurance Bill.

## LABOR MINISTRY MEASURE

W. L. M. King's Portfolio is Arranged For by Sir Wilfrid—Clauses to the Number of 102 in Insurance Bill Are Put Through Committee and the Proposed Act is Reported—Loan Authorized.

Ottawa, May 17.—Considerable speed was made in the Commons with the insurance bill on Saturday and in committee all of the 102 clauses, except that relating to the 15 per cent. tax, were passed. This contentious matter will be taken up to-day.

During the day Mr. Fielding announced the Government's intentions to create a sinking fund. R. L. Borden opposed the appointment of a Minister of Labor as unnecessary. Hon. Mr. Aylesworth said that the Government had received certain representations from British Columbia as to race track gambling.

Prior to taking up the insurance bill Mr. Fielding introduced a resolution declaring it expedient that in the case of insurance on property in Canada, effected in any unlicensed company, the person effecting such shall pay to the Minister of Finance for the consolidated revenue fund a sum total of 15 per cent. of the total net cost of the insurance so effected. Mr. Fielding said the resolution would gauge the temper of the House. Upon the clause on which was based the resolution there was much difference of opinion, but he did not regret the matter as vital and would accept the judgment of the House.

He pointed out that the object of the Canadian law was that when licensed companies comply with the law unlicensed companies should not be allowed to do business without restriction. However, the machinery for this was defective and it was evaded by entering into contracts outside the company.

The clause was designed to raise the question. In its original form, parties who came into Canada to inspect risks would be considered as doing insurance. Property owners, however, had resisted this proposal on the ground that they would be at the mercy of the insurance combine. A compromise was effected and the plan of proposing a reasonable tax was proposed.

Mr. Fielding said that the New England mutuals, and individual underwriters did much business in Canada. The former, by sprinklers, and other forms of protection, greatly reduced risks and by a system of rebates greatly reduced the cost of insurance.
