THE TASMANIAN DEVIL.

Badger-Like Animal Peculiar to Antipodes Has Never Been Tamed.

Probably the only animal that has proved itself absolutely untamable is the Tasmanian devil. The creature rejoicing in this name is misshapen and powerfully built, with an exceedingly large head terminating in a short, broad muzzle. In size, as in many of its habits, it very much resembles the badger. Its limbs are short and powerful, and the front paws are well adapted for burrowing. Its fur is very thick and close with a thick under fur. The color is chiefly black, with the exception of a white patch on the chest, which occasionally extends as far round as the shoulders, and a variable number of small white spots on the neck, shoulders and hindquarters.

The Tasmanian devil is nocturnal in its habits, spending much of its time on the seashore on the lookout for crabs, fish, and anything that may have been washed up by the waves. These, however, do not form entirely its diet, for practically any creature except those much larger than itself are killed and eaten. In the earlier days of colonization great numbers of sheep were destroyed by them. Of late years, however, their numbers have been considerably reduced, until now they are quite rare, and no longer trouble the farmers to any extent. At one time the Tasmanian devil also existed on the mainland of Australia.

Another creature peculiar to Tasmania, now becoming scarce in the same manner as the "devil," owing chiefly to the price put upon its head by the Government, is the Tasmanian wolf, or Thylacine. Like the "devil," too, it once existed upon the mainland. It was known to the early colonists by the various names of wolf, hyena, tiger and zebra. In size as well as in the general shape of its body and head it very much resembles a wolf. Unlike a wolf, however, it hunts singly and not in packs; tracking its prey, like the true dogs, by their scent. The last two names, tiger and zebra, have been assigned to it on account of the transverse black bars on the middle of the greyish-brown back and buttocks. Its black-tipped tail is long and very compressed. Like the Tasmanian "devil," much time is spent on the sea shore on the lookout for food, but since the introduction of the sheep farms it has more or less deserted its old haunts and practically confines its attention to the latter and to poultry yards. This is the largest of the carnivorous marsupials (the latter name being applicable to those animals carrying their young in a pouch), which, although common in Australia, have disappeared from the rest of the Old World, although fossilized remains are often found showing that they previously existed there. In the pouch are four teats, this being the number of young in a litter. Although so much larger, this creature is not nearly so savage as its "countryman" already described, and is more or less tamable.

AN ACCURATE CLOCK.

The Timepiece in the Observatory of Columbia University.

In the observatory of Columbia university is one of the most accurate sandths in the world. It has run for several months with a mean error of only fifteen-thousandths of a second and a maximum error of thirty-thousandths of a second per day. That means that it does not vary more than half a second a month, or six seconds a year.

Compare this with the first pocket timepiece, the "animated egg of Nuremberg," which required winding twice a day and varied an hour and a half in the same time! Compare it with some of the highest priced watches manufactured today, which often vary more than ten seconds a week, and you will have some idea of the refinements in the science of measuring time. Yet even this accuracy is surpassed by some famous timepieces, if the trade magazines are to be believed. There have been accounts in them of clocks or watches that have varied less than a second in periods as long as ten years.

The clock at the University of Columbia is an astronomical clock. It is surrounded by a glass case in which a partial vacuum is maintained, and in order that the case may not be opened or disturbed the winding is done automatically by electricity. The clock is set up in a room especially constructed to keep it free from jar or vibration. The temperature and barometric conditions are maintained practically constant, and every possible precaution is taken to minimize the errors of the running mate.—New York World.

IT CLEANS THE SHIPS.

Sailing Through a Volcano Crater in the Aegean Sea.

In the Aegean sea a vessel may sail into the top of a crater, and though it is hard to find anchorage there, yet a mere sail through is appreciated greatly by captains, because it cleanses the bottom of the ships from marine growth.

More than 2,000 years ago the isle of Santorin was split in half by an earthquake, with the result that what was once the crater of a volcano is now a crescent shaped harbor. Two glistening white towns of Thera and St. Nicholas are perched on the summit of the steep cliffs, whose dark and dismal hue is similar to that of the top of Vesuvius. Standing out against the sky are large numbers of windmills, with many sails, arranged in a perfect circle. These are evidently employed for crushing the olives, which, along with the terraced vines, are the staple product of the island. The Santorin wine is of excellent quality and is highly appreciated in the Levant.

Between the main island on the east and the smaller, Thera, on the west, are the three small Kaumene islands, all of which have come into existence since the original earthquake, while the largest of the three was "born from the sea" less than 200 years ago, showing that the center of the old volcano has still a certain amount of activity.

The water in the harbor into which the sulphurous streams from this volcanic island rain has a peculiar property which completely cleans off growths of every kind from the bottom of any ship.

RELIGIOUS ACROBATS.

Dangerous Aerial Slide Annually Performed in India.

India offers many curious things in the way of religion, and the strangest of them all is the aerial slide, which is performed annually at Kulu, in the Himalayas. At a point where there is a cliff overhanging a precipitous gorge several hundred feet in width and a hundred feet in depth a rope is made fast to the rock. The other end of this is carried across the gorge and there is secured to a stake. The total length of the rope between the two points is when drawn taut 2,500 feet, and the end attached to the cliff is several hundred feet higher than that fastened on the opposite side of the ravine. Thus a slide is contrived, and it is a dangerous one to all appearance.

It is down this incline that the performer has his path. For the lofty journey a sort of saddle is provided made of wood, with holes in it, through which the rope passes. But before a start is made the whole length of the rope is wet to prevent the saddle from catching fire from the friction. The performer sits astride this seat, and his legs are fastened bags of sand, which serve two purposes—they enable him to maintain an upright position during his lightning-like descent, and they increase the momentum. The lower end of the rope is carefully wound with bits of carpet to check the speed before the stake is reached. Without this precaution the performer would be dashed to pieces.

The terrific velocity of the descent for the first few hundred yards is shown by the stream of smoke that trails from the wake of the saddle, despite the fact that the rope has been wet. Afterward the incline diminishes somewhat, and the pace becomes correspondingly slower. By the time the goal is reached the jheri, as the performer is called, is able to come to a standstill without disaster.

This slide in the air is supposed to reveal the will of the gods as to the crops of the approaching season. If the perilous trip is accomplished in safety a plentiful harvest is assured. Naturally, therefore, every care is taken to minimize the dangers of the performance. The ceremony is of ancient origin, and those who engage in it as jheri form a small caste apart.—New York Tribune.

She Saw.

Mr. Lawton was on a dyspeptic diet, and Mrs. Lawton was endeavoring to reduce her weight. Frank Hild in "Victoria, the Woman," says that the queen herself ended it, at least as far as the court was concerned.

Girl though she was, Victoria set her face against the practice the moment she became her own mistress and expressed her disapprobation with great tact and skill.

When she went to the drawing room with the ladies after dinner, she remained standing until the gentlemen came into the room. The knowledge that her majesty was standing until the gentlemen left the table made it impossible for them to stay behind longer than the few minutes necessary for the drinking of coffee.
