CITY COUNCIL

men be furnished copies of the by-law for perusal in the meantime. This was lost by a vote of 3 to 7. Aldermen John Moore, Edward Moore and Jewett voting for it, and the motion to take the bill up section by section was carried.

Ald. Farrell said that while he was in favor of a better system of roads. He believed in property owners not assessed for the general tax paying a fifty per cent. but did not believe it just to property owners on Queen street paying 25 per cent. on the street paving in addition to their general tax. He believed that the section should be struck out.

Ald. Winslow was in favor of the property holders paying the twenty-five per cent. of the cost in addition to the general tax. He believed the paving would benefit the property and make it more valuable. Ald. Burchill stated that in the United States the city pays for the streets between curb and curb and the property owners pay a percentage on the cost of sidewalks. The section was finally struck out.

Ald. John Moore was opposed to the whole scheme as it would take altogether too much of the people's money. He claimed the whole city assessment for road purposes would be spent on one block.

It was moved by Ald. Winslow, seconded by Ald. Hooper, that the road committee be authorized to enter into a contract for the paving of Queen street from Regent street to Carleton street and on Carleton street from Queen street to the highway bridge.

Ald. Farrell thought in an important matter such as this, the city council as a whole should have the handling of the business instead of leaving it to a committee of three men, and moved an amendment that the city council be authorized to make the contract.

The amendment was carried, Ald. Winslow, Hooper and Kitchen voting against it.

Ald. Winslow asked for a guarantee of \$1,500 for the Agricultural Society in case of a deficit in connection with the exhibition which it is proposed to run this fall. After a suggestion that the matter be referred to the finance committee, the guarantee was passed. Ald. John Moore, Edward Moore and Ryan voted against it.

THE BAND GRANT.

A grant of \$150 was made to the Fredericton Brass Band to be given upon a satisfactory arrangement being made with the band regarding weekly concerts. Aldermen Farrell, Winslow, and Kitchen all spoke highly of the band and believed that it should be encouraged.

Ald. Calder showed that we grant our band less money than St. John, Woodstock or Moncton.

Ald. Winslow thought the Fredericton Brass Band should get \$100 and the 71st Regt. Band \$100. He moved an amendment to that effect, which was seconded by Ald. John Moore.

It was pointed out by other aldermen that the 71st Regt. Band had not asked for a grant, and also that they receive other assistance.

The amendment was lost. Those who voted for it were Ald. Winslow, John Moore, Ed Moore and Ryan.

Dr. R. H. McGrath was appointed a member of the local Board of Health, in place of Mr. J. M. Wiley, who has been promoted to chairman of the board.

Ald. Calder read a communication from the Secretary of School Trustees regarding the unsanitary condition of the Charlotte Street School. It stated that \$1,500 would be required to put the sanitary arrangements at this school in a good condition.

The matter was referred to the school committee who will report at the next regular council meeting. On motion, the council adjourned.

DUTY ON POTATOES.

Under New U. S. Tariff It Will Be 45 Cents a Bushel.

The increase in the duty on potatoes going into the United States from 25 to 45 cents per bushel will have a marked effect on the trade in Canada, and farmers in this country will suffer to the extent of probably ten to fifteen cents per bushel whenever the crops are bountiful.

Heretofore a good trade has been done by Canadians, who shipped their potatoes to the United States, especially in the Province of New Brunswick, where on occasions as many as fifty cars have been shipped across the border in one day. While it is not unusual to see potatoes going right from Montreal direct to Chicago.

The change in the tariff means that Americans will have to pay a duty of 60c. per bag of 90 lbs., and though some business may be done despite the change it will have a very noticeable effect on the Canadian market.

With bountiful crops the home market will be well supplied, with prices everywhere easier, while with small crops the prices may be held steady. On the present crop local dealers say that owing to the late planting the crop may not be too good, but with continued favorable weather the loss may be made up,

and the yield be as large, if not larger, than ever.

In connection with the increased duty on barley, this will not affect the trade much, for the reason that since the duty was raised ten years ago there has been very little trade with the United States, though previous to that time Oswego and Buffalo received immense cargoes of barley from Canada.

THE DRIVES

Mr. J. D. McLaughlin, who has been lumbering on the Tobique, arrived in the city last evening. He reports that his drive has got out of the Tobique all right. Mr. McLaughlin hears that all the up river drives are in safe waters. The Kilburn and Noble logs are the furthest back, but are coming along all right. Reports from up river are most encouraging.

Big Reward for Bandits.

Toronto, June 1.—Ontario chiefs of police has received notification of a reward of \$10,000 offered for the arrest of each of six men who a few days ago held up and robbed a Great Northern train at Morse Siding, four miles from Hillyard, Wash., when the registered mail containing many thousands of dollars, was stolen. It is thought that the men may have come to Canada.

Chief Is Stolen White Boy.

Galveston, Texas, June 1.—Two Brides, a well-known Apache chief, has proven his identity as Thomas Springfield, a native Texan, born of a prominent family, 44 years ago in McMullen County, who at the age of four years was kidnapped by a band of Apaches, who on a raid massacred the boy's mother, father and young brother. A sister, presumed to have been slain, survived, and is still alive.

Chinese Revenge.

New York, June 1.—Ten minutes after a Chinaman, whom the police are now trying to find, came out of a laundry in East 22nd street and warned the children in the neighborhood to move away from the place, a heavy explosion occurred and the entire front and rear of the building were blown out into the street.

Going Blind, Drowns Himself.

Deseronto, June 1.—James Crawford, aged 65, hostler at the Arlington Hotel, committed suicide yesterday by jumping into the lake. Some time ago he became almost blind, and the town prepared papers and were about to send him to the Home for the Aged in Belleville. He has a wealthy brother in New York.

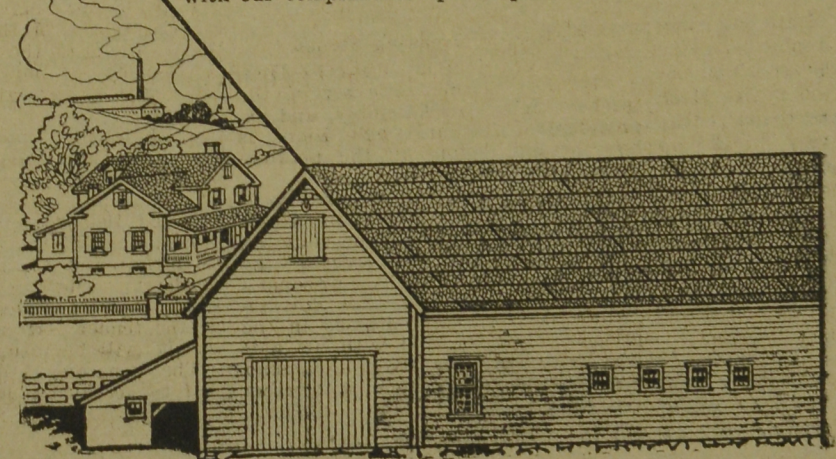
