

## LORD NOTHCLIFFE'S INCOME.

## Great Newspaper Magnet Worries Along on \$10,000 a Week.

Under the heading "The Scorpion Budget," the London Daily News prints a communication from a subscriber which effectively punctures the almost frenzied opposition of a certain section of the English press to the methods adopted by Mr. Lloyd-George for providing funds for the increased naval armaments and the new schemes of social reform.

Lord Northcliffe, as is well known, is the owner of the London Daily Mail, the London Times, and other important daily and weekly newspapers and periodicals. Twenty years ago Alfred Harmsworth was a struggling journalist, probably making \$25 a week. Certainly the income tax did not hit him very hard. Today the government records show that his income from two companies alone is \$10,000 a week, and besides these he has other very profitable investments. Lord Northcliffe is now very greatly interested in the new budget and has inspired his newspapers to fight the proposals to the death.

Lord Northcliffe is a strong advocate of tariff reform as "broadening the system of taxation."

The correspondent referred to says that at Somerset House he discovered that the holdings of Lord Northcliffe and his family in the Amalgamated Press Limited and the Associated Newspapers Limited amount to somewhere between ten and fifteen million dollars. The former company pays 40 per cent dividend, which gives his lordship an income of \$419,360 annually, while his income from the latter company is \$143,000. The correspondent continues facetiously:

Lord Northcliffe may have, indeed I hope he has, other income than this. But take this nucleus of a livelihood. In my middle class way I am accustomed to think that \$100,000 is a fair fortune. Lord Northcliffe has that fortune every year!

What will he pay in taxes? Let us see.  
One shilling on \$112,000 is.....\$5,600  
Extra two pence.....933  
Super-tax on \$109,00 at 6d.....2,725  
\$9,258

The Budget costs Lord Northcliffe \$3,600 about, and after he has paid his income tax, two companies alone yield him \$103,000 a year.

Two thousand pounds a year is a fair salary; the Postmaster General receives this sum once a year. Lord Northcliffe gets \$2,000 a week.

My income, with five children, is \$300 a year; Lord Northcliffe receives \$300 a day.

A skilled mechanic earns \$2 a week. Lord Northcliffe receives \$2 and a little more than \$2 every five minutes.

The poor seamstress is fortunate if she earns 5s. an hour, Lord Northcliffe receives 4s. ever six seconds—nearly a penny a second—this from two companies alone.

Is it not a little dangerous of him to be so angry about a Budget which leaves him so wealthy? Has he not been kindly treated by Providence that he should grudge the old folks the five children? Of course I only take Lord Northcliffe's case as representing the whole of the very wealthy class. They are almost all as angry as he is, and if they all owned newspapers those papers would sing the same song.

Is it "plunder" to raise money for Dreadnoughts which are to defend Carmelite street against Germany or would Lord Northcliffe prefer to escape his super-tax and fall into the hands of the invader?

If he is so discontented with his \$2,000 a week, will he change places with me, with my \$300 a year? I would gratefully pay his super-tax.

Does he mean to say that he ought to be taxed less and I ought to be taxed more?—Yours, etc.

The man on the street will not have very much sympathy for millionaires like Northcliffe, who in one breath shout for Dreadnoughts and in the next squeal because they are compelled to pay a larger share of the bill than their less fortunate brothers.

## NEW RUGBY TROPHY

## Earl Grey Presents Handsome Cup to the Dominion.

## THREE TRUSTEES NAMED

H. B. McGivern, M.P. of Ottawa, Rev. Bruce McDonald of Toronto and M. Nolan of Montreal are to be Custodians of the Cup—Similar to Minto Lacrosse Cup and Stanley Hockey Cup.

Ottawa, June 1.—A challenge cup for competition in Rugby football is to be given by His Excellency the Governor-General, according to an announcement made last night. It is hoped to make the trophy emblematic of the amateur championship of the Dominion. The trophy is to be a perpetual one. The Governor-General is thus doing for football what his predecessor, Lord Minto, has done for lacrosse, and Lord Stanley for hockey. His Excellency names three trustees, H. B. McGivern, M.P., of Ottawa, an old footballer; Rev. Bruce McDonald, principal of St. Andrew's College, Toronto, and M. Nolan of Montreal. Regarding the trustees, Earl Grey's wish is that they shall control the cup and that their decisions as to the cup and its custody shall be absolute. Should any trustee die, or otherwise drop out, a successor shall be appointed by the Governor-General for the time being.

At His Excellency's request, the trustees have made suggestions regarding the disposal of the cup and the contest for it, which His Excellency has approved, with the reservation that the regulations must be considered as subject at any time to the will of the trustees, inasmuch as circumstances are always liable to arise which may render a departure from the rules.

The deed of gift has conditions similar to those for the Stanley and Minto cups.

## Negro Race Inferior.

New York, June 1.—A national conference in the interest of the American negro was opened in the United Charities building in this city yesterday by Prof. Burt G. Wilder of Cornell University, and Prof. Livingston Farrand, E. R. A. Seligman and John Dewey of Columbia University. Prof. Wilder, after exhibiting several brains, including those of an orang outang, an unscrupulous politician, an illiterate colored janitor, and an eminent mathematician, made some interesting deductions to the conference.

The brain of the average American negro, he said, seems to be about two ounces lighter than that of the average white man, and probably there occurs more frequently than in the white man less development of the prefrontal lobes. These two conditions render it likely that the whites will remain the dominant race. But there are individual exceptions to the above general conditions of both kinds and among both races.

Winnipeg Railway Finding.  
Winnipeg, June 1.—The finding of the board of conciliation affecting the Winnipeg Street Railway was handed out yesterday.

out yesterday. The union is recognized fully. Seniority is to govern for selection of runs. Wages are to be paid semi-monthly; the scale to be twenty-one cents per hour for the first six months; twenty-three cents for the second six months; twenty-four for the second year; twenty-six and a half the third year, and twenty-seven thereafter. Men have the privilege of either working nine or ten hours, and Sunday work is to be paid at the rate of ten hours per week and a half hours work.

On the whole, the men appear to be well satisfied with finding of the board.

## Dog Saves Child.

Ottawa, June 1.—To the instinct and strength of a large collie dog a little Ottawa girl owes her escape from death by drowning. While some children were playing near the St. Louis Dam on the Rideau Canal one of them fell off the dock into the water. The others set up a scream of terror, which attracted the attention of an automobile party on the driveway and also of some men in the locality. Meanwhile, however, a large collie dog, which happened to be on the dock, leaped into the water, grabbed the little girl by the dress and kept her up till one of the men pulled her out.

## Think They've Been Swindled.

Galt, June 1.—The firm of Biehl & Wagner report a case of supposed swindling. Harry Passmore, representing himself as about to locate in Galt, bought furniture from them on Friday, giving a Bank of Hamilton check for \$85, and receiving \$3 change. The check was made out in favor of Passmore, and signed "B. Marshall, for the Shippers Supply Co., Toronto." Passmore has appeared. The Shippers Supply state that Marshall has an office in the same building, but has no authority to sign the firm's checks.

## YOUNG ROBBERS CAUGHT.

Chicago Policemen Is Wounded and Death of Detective Is Planned.

Chicago, June 1.—The blood and thunder doings of two youths were disclosed by the arrest of Ernest Halverson, 22 years old, and Peter Dumont, 19 years old, who confessed to wounding a policeman and committing two robberies Saturday night, three robberies on May 23, and Halverson confessed that he had arranged to shoot Detective O'Keefe, who had arrested him twice before.

While driving on the north side, they held up two men with revolvers and robbed them. One started to run and Halverson fired at him and jumped back into the rig, and they drove on until a policeman tried to stop them. Halverson fired four shots at him and the wounded policeman returned the shots. Another policeman tried to stop them and Halverson lashed him with a whip. They saw an automobile load of policemen coming after them and the thugs jumped out and ran home, where they were arrested.

## More New Mills.

Port Arthur, June 1.—The C.P.R. will probably induce some industries of considerable magnitude to locate on their lands in Port Arthur, in order to procure a renewal of exemption from taxation.

Ten years ago an agreement was made fixing the yearly assessment at \$50,000. That has now expired and the property is assessable at one million dollars, and as they now face \$20,000 yearly taxation, it is expected they will bring some independent company, most likely flour mills, here, to distribute wages sufficient to get exemption again.

William Whyte and Solicitor Atkins had an interview with the City Council yesterday and said as much, though they will not make any definite proposition until they return from Montreal, for which place they left last night.

## Engineer's Bravery.

Smith's Falls, June 1.—But for the bravery of Engineer Thomas Bennett of the C.P.R. express eastbound, an accident similar to the one which recently occurred at Windsor Station, Montreal, might have happened near here yesterday morning.

A tube in the locomotive burst, and though there were volumes of escaping steam, Bennett stuck to his post until the train was brought to a standstill.

Fireman Martin Riley was blown out of the pit and on to the tender, but escaped with slight injuries. Bennett was badly scalded about the face and arms. A physician on the train attended him until he was brought to the hospital here. The accident occurred four miles from here, and the train was delayed in its arrival here an hour and a half.

## "Adam God" Goes to Prison.

Kansas City, Mo., May 31.—The jury in the case of James Sharp, or "Adam God," charged with the murder of Policeman Michael Mullane in a religious riot here on Dec. 8 last, returned a verdict of guilty of murder in the second degree.

Sharp was sentenced to 25 years in the penitentiary.

## Discuits Go Up.

Toronto, June 1.—Every biscuit manufacturer in Ontario has raised the price of his product one cent per pound. The reason given is that it was imperative in view of the high prices obtaining now for the ingredients. The manufacturers claim they have been trying to hold the prices down, thinking the price of flour, etc., would drop.

Wholesale prices have advanced, being now 20 per cent. higher.

## Shot by His Neighbor.

Rochester, N.Y., June 1.—Morris Donovan, a wealthy Clyde, N.Y., farmer, was killed by his friend and neighbor, Beckwith Tremper, early yesterday. After a night's drinking bout Tremper said, "Boys, it's time to go home. I want to go to bed." The reply was a refusal to depart, and saying, "I've got something to hurry you," Tremper fired a shotgun at Donovan.

## Boy Electrocuted on Road.

Ottawa, June 1.—Some wire, which had blown down and was lying on the ground, caused the death of Henry McCallister, aged 11, at Kirk's Ferry last night. The boy was passing along the road and picked up the wire, causing instant death.

## Defends Higher Criticism.

New York, June 1.—The theory that higher education begets religious unbelief was attacked by Rev. Dr. W. T. Manning, rector of Trinity Church, in the baccalaureate sermon preached by him to the graduates of Columbia University.

## A Suicide at 74.

Honolulu, June 1.—Starr Hoyt Nichols of New York committed suicide last night by taking chloroform in his apartments in the Royal Hawaiian Hotel. He was 74 years of age and had been troubled with insomnia.

## Newfoundland House Convenes.

St. John's, Nfld., June 1.—The recently elected Newfoundland Legislature convened yesterday. Mr. Warren, a supporter of Premier Morris, will be the Speaker of the Legislature, with Mr. Parsons as Deputy Speaker.
