How Colonel 'Maori' Browne Won his Bride.
Love and Heroism.

Once again has the wheel of fortune turned for Colonel "Maori" Browne. Three months ago he was found almost starving in a humble lodging-house. To-day (Thursday) he leads to the altar a lady of wealth and position.

Colonel C. Hamilton Browne—"Maori" to his friends—found himself stranded at the age of sixty-three without a pension as he had commanded only Colonial troops during the forty years he spent in the Empire's service.

He was reduced to such poverty that he even offered to black boots for a living. For three weeks he lived by the sale of his medals. At last a way was found. Face to face with starvation he was rescued by the Salvation Army.

LOVE AND HEROISM.

The publicity given to the colonel's sad case caused the final turn of the wheel of fortune.

A letter came from a lady asking if the colonel was the same Hamilton Browne who had served in Zululand with a man whose name she gave.

She wished to know, because a man named Hamilton Browne had saved the life of her sweetheart. Colonel Browne recalled the incident, and wrote to her telling her what he remembered of it. The man he had saved at a critical moment in the Zululand campaign had afterwards died in the Sudan, and the lady had never married.

The correspondence between Colonel Browne and the lady led to a meeting, which ripened into an acquaintanceship, and then into an engagement.

Colonel Browne who counts among his friends Lord Roberts and General Baden-Powell, belongs to an Irish family, and was educated at Cheltenham.

His long military career began in New Zealand in 1866, and was continued in South Africa, where he won great distinction. He was commended for gallantry at Rorke's Drift, and was an eye witness of the great disaster at Isandlwana.

Now, after all his adventures he intends to settle down with his wife, and end his days in peace and happiness.

EXTENSION TO CONGO.

Railway Plans Will Open Up More of Darkest Africa.

The negotiations between the British South Africa Co. and the Congo which have been in progress for some months with a view to the extension of the Northern Rhodesia railways to the Tanganyika mining area, are now practically completed. It only remains for the signatures of the contracting parties to be affixed to the agreement arrived at.

The effect of this arrangement will be not only the rapid development of the Katanga mines by a through railway route to the eastern and southern ports, but it will also ensure the supply from the Rhodesian coal area for the working of the Katanga mines and the further opening up of Northern Rhodesia. The agreement also ensures the construction of another section of the Cape to Cairo railway from its present terminus at Broken Hill to the Congo Free State, and for this purpose negotiations are in active progress with the Beit trustees and other groups for obtaining the necessary capital.

The whole of the next section northward of the Cape to Cairo Railway to the Congo having already been surveyed, it is expected that work will commence during the present dry season, and will be easily completed in a year, when there will be direct railway communication between Cape Town and the Congo.

Khedive's Wife Bought For £80.

Abbas II., Khedive of Egypt, who, at the moment of writing, is paying us another visit, is one of the most progressive and enlightened of foreign rulers. Passionately fond of travel, he goes about the world with his eyes open, and has introduced many excellent reforms into the country over which he rules. Unconventional to a degree, he has amused himself, and horrified his suite, by donning overalls and driving a railway-engine. The Khedive, by the way, unlike the Sultan, has no Imperial harem. His wife was a beautiful Circassian slave, bought by his mother, chiefly on account of her beauty, from a powerful Turkish Pasha for less than £80. The Mohammedan religion permits the Khedive four wives, but Abbas II., like his father, is content with one, and is passionately devoted to the beautiful Circassian, who has borne him five charming daughters and a promising son.
