

OUR OTTAWA LETTER.

Imports and Exports on the Increase—Revenue Again Bounding Upwards.

Factors of North Waterloo Resent Campaign of Abuse.

(Special Correspondence.)
OTTAWA, June 27.—Speaking of the elevation of Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King to the Cabinet as Minister of Labor, and the necessity for submitting himself again to the election of North Waterloo, the Mail and the present government. Of the remaining \$35,000,000, \$10,000,000 is a secured loan made to the Grand Trunk Pacific, upon which that company pays the interest, and for the repayment of which that company is responsible. The remaining figure of \$25,000,000 is said to be one for the Transcontinental Railway, and for this the country will possess a valuable asset.

Therefore, the sum total to add to the public debt would be \$25,000,000, and not \$150,000,000 to \$200,000,000.

ABSURD ARGUMENT.

The News goes on to say that if \$150,000,000 be added to the public debt the debt would be increased by that amount, a self-evident proposition. The News might with the same certainty have said that should only \$25,000,000 be added to the public debt it would only be increased by that amount. Way the News did not mention even a larger figure, as the whole argument was conjectural, is beyond comprehension.

OLD TORY DEBTS.

This is one method of deceiving the people. Even with regard to the \$75,000,000 referred to, which represents maturing loans, they were loans made by the Conservative government, a legacy of debt which the present government inherited, and which they have to make provision for. Had the Conservatives been economical in their day, Canada would not have had these debts.

Big Coal Strike.

Sydney, N.S., July 3.—That the U.M.W. of American mean business in demanding what they consider their rights from the coal operators of Nova Scotia, was manifest last night, when at a meeting of the executive, with representatives of a majority of the miners from each of the coal producing districts of Nova Scotia, a resolution was passed as follows:

"That the executive ask the Dominion Coal Co. operators to meet them on the afternoon of Monday, July 5, for the purpose of coming to an agreement in the event of the company not sending a representative to the conference, a strike to be inaugurated July 6, and that the executive be empowered to treat other companies and corporations in the same manner if necessary."

Canadians in Mexican Enterprise.

Mexico City, July 3.—The Federal Government has granted to the Pacific Government Concession and Lands Corporation, Ltd., of Victoria, B.C., a concession to develop and colonize 7,000,000 acres of public lands in the State of Guerrero. It is announced that F. C. Barnes of Victoria, the general manager, that the company will spend about \$10,000,000 in establishing systems of irrigation, and building railroads over the lands.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Notice is hereby given that The Canada Loose Leaf Company, Limited, will apply to the City Council of the City of Fredericton for a loan and certain exemptions hereunder set out pursuant to Chapter Thirty and Acts of Assembly, 6 Edward VII.

The Company will make application for exemption from water rates, sewerage rate and taxation generally for a term of five years, renewable for a further term of five years, and a loan of three thousand five hundred dollars, repayable in instalments of five hundred dollars annual without interest, the first instalment to be paid five years after the loan is made.

In consideration of such assistance to the Company on their part agree to repay such loan as aforesaid and to employ forty five people with a gross annual wage of not less than three hundred and fifty dollars weekly, and to actively carry on the business of manufacturing loose leaf ledgers and other loose leaf devices to the amount of not less than \$50,000 annually.
