COUNTRY FORGES AHEAD.

Canada is fast recovering from conditions of trade depression. The returns show that the imports and exports are increasing over the same period last year. The imports particularly show a great improvement which means that the revenue is advancing in a corresponding degree. The Northwest is receiving the very best class of immigrants. Those coming from the United States particularly are coming in large numbers and they bring with them personal property amounting to many millions. As differences arise between employer and employee they are dealt with under the provisions of the Lemieux Act, and both sides to the controversy appear willing, not only to submit their differences to arbitration, but to abide by the decision rendered. Rural mail delivery is being installed in response to the application of those who desire to enter into the Postmaster-general.

NEWS VERSUS MAIL.

Alluding to the election of Hon.
