SIMASSIE WON OUT

her. On entering the stretch, Boutlier, Simassie's driver, made liberal use of the tape but Silk Patchen got to the wire first.

The second heat was the most sensational of the afternoon. Silk Patchen took the lead at the start and the efforts of Simassie and Louise E. in turn to capture the pole from her proved unavailing. She seemed to be a match for both of them and led to the stretch by a small margin. Louise E. made a fine sprint, during the run to the wire and finished neck and neck with the Patchen mare, Simassie coming in several lengths behind. Many horsemen standing opposite the wire declared that Patchen had won but the judges, after deliberating for a time, called it a dead heat. Time by quarters was 33, 1.06, 1.40, 2.14. This is half a second lower than the track record.

In the third heat Simassie made a bad break in the back stretch, which spoiled her chances of winning the heat. Louise E. kept right after Silk Patchen, the leader, and was only a neck behind when the wire was reached.

In the fourth heat Simassie took the pole from Patchen at the first turn but lost it soon afterwards on a break. At the three-quarter pole, however, she closed the gap and by a remarkable burst of speed succeeded in passing the Patchen mare and winning by a length. This is said to have been the Patchen mare's first defeat and Simassie's performance brought a mighty cheer from the spectators.

In the fifth heat the horses got away well together with Simassie at the pole. Her wonderful power of endurance asserted itself and she was not long in opening up quite a gap. Upon entering the home stretch Simassie had nearly a length to the good over Patchen but Louise E. stole a march on the latter and shot into second place.

Miss Cappy who had finished last all through the race, was drawn in the sixth heat. Simassie led by a length at the quarter pole, with Louise E. and Patchen close on her wheel. Simassie kept the lead until the home stretch was reached when, to the surprise of all, Louise, who had been travelling very steady, suddenly shot forward and took the heat by a neck.

All the horses showed the effects of their strenuous work when they were sent for the seventh and final heat. Louise E. held the pole for the first lap with Simassie a close second and Patchen several lengths behind. Upon entering the back stretch Boutlier let Simassie out and she overhauled and passed the leader just beyond the quarter pole. Louise E. was a length behind on entering the stretch and struggled hard to overcome this lead but it was no use. Simassie came in a winner in what is considered to have been the greatest race ever seen in these parts. The meeting has been highly successful in every way and the park directors are being warmly congratulated. Nearly all the horses taking part will compete at Woodstock next week.

Notice is hereby given that The Canada Loose Leaf Company, Limited, will apply to the City Council of the City of Fredericton for a loan and certain exemptions hereunder set out pursuant to Chapter Thirty Nine, Acts of Assembly, 6 Edward VII.

The Company will make application for exemption from water rates, sewerage rate and taxation generally for a term of five years, renewable for a further term of five years, and a loan of three thousand five hundred dollars, repayable in instalments of five hundred dollars annually without interest, the first instalment to be paid five years after the loan is made.

In consideration of such assistance the Company on their part agree to repay such loan as aforesaid and to employ forty five people with a gross annual wage of not less than three hundred and fifty dollars weekly, and to actively carry on the business of manufacturing loose leaf ledgers and other loose leaf devices to the amount of not less than \$50,000 annually.
