

COW PROGRESS.

The records of the cow testing associations show a large increase in the number of cows whose production, both as regards weight of milk and butterfat, is being noted regularly. It is no wonder that the plan appeals to the progressive dairymen of Canada, because record work must mean substantial improvement, and the improved herd is the herd that produces economically.

Since commencing records many farmers have been enabled to increase the yield of milk and fat per cow considerably, because instead of contentedly saying "so many cows so much milk," each individual is studied, and each member of the herd brought up to a good profit earning capacity. Herds that used to produce only 187 lb. fat are now up to 220 lb.; milk production has gone up from 4,850 lb. to 6,380 lb. In 1905 one herd averaged 5,374 lb., but in 1908 the owner had brought all up to 7,240 lb. milk per cow. One member in 1903, keeping 9 cows obtained only 4,360 lb from each, but in 1908, with 11 cows he had an average yield of 7,000 lb milk. Cash receipts have increased with another member from \$52 per cow in 1905 to \$76 in 1908.

Instances might be multiplied, these few indicate what it means to the real dairy farmer who seeks improvement. Time spent in weighing and sampling is well spent; definite knowledge is obtained.

Explosion Injures Five Hundred.

London, June 8.—A despatch received here from Cracow in Austrian Poland, says that 500 persons were wounded by the explosion of an army powder magazine there Saturday night. Three soldiers were killed, 40 houses were wrecked and hundreds of other houses damaged, and many of the wounded are seriously hurt.

The magazine, which was situated near the railroad station, was struck by lightning and exploded.

Several thousand pounds of powder went off and 1,500 projectiles were scattered among a big crowd of people who had assembled at the station awaiting a train.

Whisky Can't Be Imitated.

Washington, June 8.—Lloyd W. Bowers, solicitor of the United States, yesterday submitted to President Taft his opinion as to what the term "whisky" means in law.

In effect Solicitor-General Bowers holds that the public does not consider that added coloring or flavoring matter can make whisky out of what otherwise is not whisky. Whisky is regarded generally and naturally as having a flavor and properties of its own.

Montreal River Claims Two More.

Cobalt, June 7.—The Montreal river has claimed two more lives. On Wednesday Frank Taylor was drowned at Mountain Chutes, when he and two companions were overtaken from a canoe in the rapids, and on Thursday a prospector, name unknown, was drowned at Red Pine Point, 12 miles north of Latchford, by the upsetting of a canoe. A companion was saved. Train Goes Through Bridge.

College Grove, Oregon, June 7.—A passenger train, consisting of an engine, tender and one car on the Oregon & Southeastern Railroad, on its return trip from Willwood and the Bohemia mines Saturday night, went through a bridge which spans Roe river, about five miles east of here. About fifteen persons were injured and W. H. Ostrander, the engineer, is expected to die.

Mackenzie King, Ph.D.

Ottawa, June 7.—Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Minister of Labor, returned from Harvard University yesterday, where he underwent Saturday the oral and concluding part of his examination for the degree of Ph.D., probably the most coveted university honor on the continent.

He was successful and thus adds another to his long list of honors. He left for Berlin last night.

ACCURACY NEEDED

Earl Crewe Addresses Imperial Press Conference.

MUST HAVE CHEAP CABLES

Great Care Must Be Exercised In Reporting Speeches of Public Men and Transmitting Them to Outlying Parts of Empire—Easy Communication Is Essential to the Welfare of the Nation.

London, June 8.—(C.A.P. Cable.)—At the Imperial Press Conference meeting yesterday, at the Foreign Office, Earl Crewe took the chair. In his opinion the Empire would not be completely united until time comes when the western provinces of Canada, say, are in a position to learn and understand what are the problems facing the India Government. The Empire would not be complete until the aboriginal in Australia was in the position, if he cared to, to learn all about the development of our great protectorate state.

It was extremely difficult now for every speech to be reported all over the Empire. Only last week his office suffered from a difficulty of this kind. Col. Seely made a statement in the House. There was nothing in the speech to cause uneasiness, but the form in which the speech was cabled to South Africa caused very real uneasiness.

Towards the question of cable development the attitude of the Government is of a thoroughly sympathetic character, and we shall look forward to your business discussions in the hope to find a solution of the question," said Earl Crewe. The great development of wireless telegraphy they must also bear in mind.

What the Empire needed above all other things was easy communication between the Mother Country and the dominions over the seas. Intercommunication between the dominions was every bit as important.

Referring to the accuracy in cabling reports of speeches, Lord Crewe said it was very important when reporting speeches of Ministers, which almost entirely consisted of qualifications; it took almost immense genius not to avoid being misleading in sending reports of this kind by cable, and when there was added to this, the other fact that the man at the end of the wire might represent someone with purposes on one side or other, which may be used to garble the message, it stood to reason that anything like perfect accuracy was exceedingly hard to maintain.

They were constantly receiving suggestions in regard to wireless developments, the latest being one with relation to Western Pacific. Sir Sanford Fleming of Ottawa, and Henniker Heaton, Lord Crewe referred to as the two evangelists of intercommunication.

Stanley Reed of India moved the following resolution:

"That this conference regards it as of paramount importance that telegraphic facilities with the various parts of the Empire be cheapened and improved, so as to ensure fuller intercommunication than exists at present, and appoints a committee to report to the conference at its re-assembling on June 25, as to the best means to attain this object, the committee to consist of Messrs. Thomas Ward, Temperley, Fenwick, Coker, Brierley, Ross, Nelson, Phillipson, Stowings-well Crosby, Boles and Hoyer."

Postmaster-General Buxton followed. The postoffice, he said, would have to consider the whole question from the point of view of business. They would do what they could to assist the committee by providing them with information.

Sir Hugh Graham, Montreal, believed in the agitation for state-owned cables, and proposed the organization of a permanent commission to enquire into the subject.

Postmaster-General Buxton assured the delegates of the sympathy of the Government, which, he said, would try to co-operate.

P. D. Ross, Ottawa, moved an amendment advocating an all-red cable route by the Government cable to Canada and Government control of wires across Canada. Canada was almost unanimous in favor of bringing in the state to improve the cable service with Britain. He believed the Canadian Government had information to the effect that with a state cable the cost of commercial messages could be reduced without loss to the service.

Austin Chamberlain said the problem they had to consider that day was one of the greatest possible importance to the development of the Empire. It needed co-operation alike of the nation's Governments and cable companies. (Applause.)

Crosbie-Boles of India, Temperley, Fenwick and Ross spoke in favor of cheaper rates.

Sir Hugh Graham said the only basis for an improved service was cheaper rates. If they could get cheaper rates of transmission from the old cable companies, good and

(Applause.)

Mr. Reed's motion was then carried unanimously, with an addition to the committee of Sir Hugh Graham, Hon. W. L. Lawson, Messrs. Fairfax, Brierley, Bell, Phillips, A. Lawson, F. Parke, Banorgie and Blake. Mr. Ross' motion was then allowed to stand over.

The conference adjourned to luncheon at the Commons. After luncheon the delegates attended a garden party at Marlborough House as guests of the Prince and Princess of Wales.

London Conference.

London, June 8.—London Methodist conference will finish its labors today, when the stationing committee will present its final draft. The sustentation fund committee's report was adopted, which means a raise in the minimum salary for ministers on poorer circuits. Married men receiving less than \$700 now apply for aid to the sustentation fund, unmarried men if below \$600 and probationers if below \$550. The figures heretofore have been \$600, \$400, and \$200.

Doctor Fatally Burned.

Montreal, June 8.—A telegraphic despatch from Pacific Grove, California, announces the tragic death of Dr. Neil Gunn, who was fatally burned in a fire in his laboratory. Dr. Gunn graduated from McGill in 1888 with high class honors. He went west about four years ago for his health. He was 48 years of age, and came from St. Thomas, Ont. Immediately after graduation he went to St. Mary's Ont., where he practiced till 1891. In 1901 he married Miss Hardy of this city. He leaves no children.

Want a Western Referee.

Chatham, June 8.—In his opening address to the County Council, Warden William Abraham, drew attention to the Government appointing an eastern man, Henderson of Ottawa, as drainage referee for the entire province. An eastern man could not be at all conversant with drainage matters in the west, where nine-tenths of the drainage litigation takes place.

Warden Abraham also urged the council to memorialize the Legislature regarding asylum authorities refusing patients.

New Ogilvie Elevator.

Fort William, June 8.—Definite announcement was made yesterday that the new Ogilvie elevator will be commenced immediately. It was anticipated that construction of this elevator would be postponed until next year, but the large increase in the growth of the western business made it imperative that an addition to the Fort William plant should be made at once.

For Bishop of Ottawa.

Montreal, June 8.—Those well posted in ecclesiastical matters believe that Mr. Emard, Bishop of Valleyfield, will succeed the late Archbishop Duhamel of Ottawa. It is also stated that His Grace Archbishop Bruchesi of Montreal, will be given the red hat during the plenary congress here.

Sir Wilfrid Off to Quebec.

Ottawa, June 8.—Sir Wilfrid left for Quebec yesterday to confer with the mayor and City Council in respect to the terminal site for the G.T.P., it being proposed by the G.T.P. Commissioners to secure the ground on which the Champlain market stands.

Mrs. Taft Saves Man's Life.

New York, June 8.—A Washington special to The World says: Through the intervention of Mrs. Taft, a Russian named Perovich, convicted of murder at Fairbanks, Alaska, and sentenced to die, has been saved from the gallows.

Want to Be Naturalized.

Vancouver, B.C., June 8.—The greatest avalanche of applications for naturalization in Vancouver rolled in upon Judge Grant yesterday. They number over 350. Practically all came from the German and Italian colonies.

Treed By a Bull.

Peterboro, June 8.—Four Peterboro men were kept up in trees for three hours by an infuriated bull on the banks of the Otonabee river Saturday evening. They were preparing to go in bathing.

Mme. Stoessel a Defaulter.

St. Petersburg, June 8.—The Port Arthur Benevolent Society have found a deficit of \$7,500 in the accounts of the society under the presidency of Madame Stoessel, wife of General Stoessel.

He Prefers a Yankee.

The following is a letter to Reynold's Newspaper of London, and contains remarks not strictly complimentary to Canadians:

"Sir,—I've been five years in Manitoba. You in the Old Country have no idea what most Englishmen go through here. If you could see for yourselves you wouldn't have much love left for Canadians.
