The Victoria Hospital is an institution of which the people of Fredericton have every reason to be proud. It has done and is doing a noble work for suffering humanity, and is in every way deserving of the hearty support and encouragement of all good citizens.

The annual report of this institution, recently issued from the Herald Presses, contains some valuable information in regard to the work which it is doing in our midst, and the Herald takes pleasure in presenting to its readers some extracts from the same.

GENERAL INFORMATION.

The Victoria Public Hospital owes its founding to the efforts of Lady Tilley, who saw the great need of a Hospital in Fredericton.

The first sod was turned for its

erecting, and the building of which was commenced in 1887. Its special hospital bed is one of the most modern made, it is mounted on large roller wheels and fitted with adjustable head-rest as well as the necessary apparatus for use as a fracture bed.

Many important changes and improvements have been effected during the year. Through the generosity of Mr. George Kitchen, Ald. Kitchen and ex-Warden McNally the entire premises have been fitted with an up-to-date acetylene plant, and this has already been of great advantage to the work.

The Ladies' Hospital Aid has also undertaken several improvements in addition to the two hundred dollars which they annually contribute.

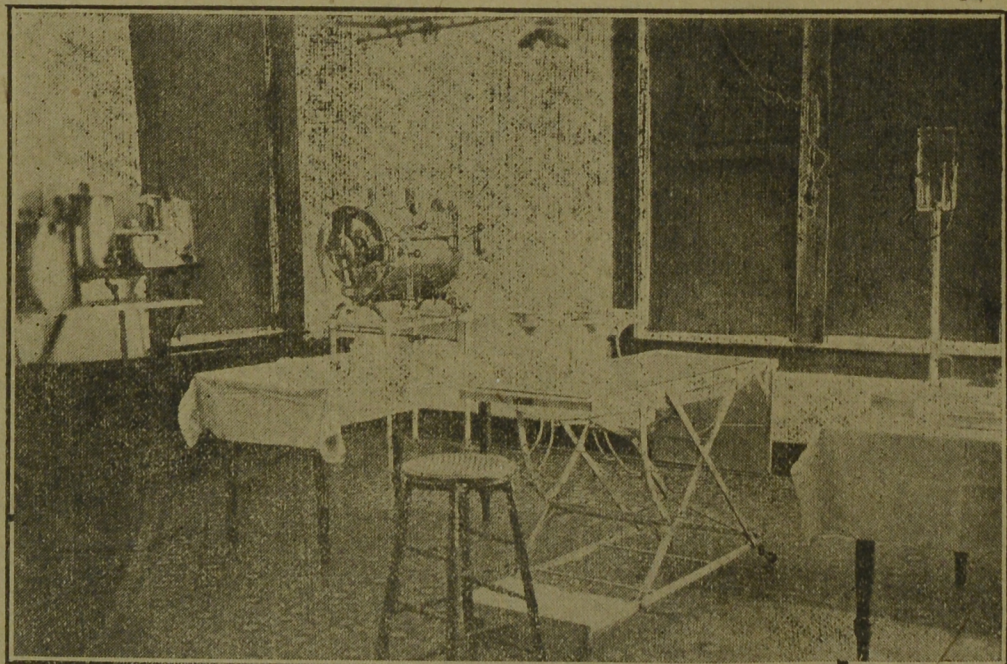

PUBLIC NOTICE

Notice is hereby given that The Canada Loose Leaf Company, Limited, will apply to the City Council of the City of Fredericton for a loan and certain exemptions hereunder set out pursuant to Chapter Thirty Nine, Acts of Assembly, 6 Edward VII.

The Company will make application for exemption from water rates sewerage rate and taxation generally for a term of five years, renewable for a further term of five years, and a loan of three thousand five hundred dollars, repayable in instalments of five hundred dollars annually without interest, the first instalment to be paid five years after the loan is made.

In consideration of such assistance the Company on their part agree to repay such loan as aforesaid and to employ forty five people with a gross annual wage of not less than three hundred and fifty dollars weekly, and to actively carry on the business of manufacturing loose leaf ledgers and other loose leaf devices to the amount of not less than \$50,000 annually. To secure the repayment of such loan by a first mortgage on the building and machinery owned by the Company and to insure the said property with loss, if any, payable to the City of Fredericton to the extent of their interest, and also to give a bond conditioned that the Company will carry out all their agreements as above mentioned.

The said application will be made to the said City Council at their regular monthly meeting to be held on Tuesday evening, the second day of August next.

I.C.R. Pays Dividend.

Ottawa, July 23.—The gross earnings of the Intercolonial Railway for April and May were \$1,469,000. The June returns are not complete.

At the Railway Department yesterday it was stated that as a result of the policy of retrenchment adopted by the commissions, the working expenses are well within the revenue and if the present net revenue is maintained the railway ought to show a surplus of three-quarters of a million at the end of the fiscal year.

British Firms Outclassed.

Melbourne, July 23.—Official papers have been issued, explaining the acceptance by the Commonwealth Government of the tender of Pratt & Whitney, an American firm, for the erection of a small arms factory in Australia for the Government.

One English tender was \$500,000 as against \$340,000 bid by the Americans, and required three years to build, as compared with the American firm's one year.

Plate Stands Test.

London, July 23.—(C.A.P. Cable.)—Harold A. Richardson of London, Ont., who has been here two years in connection with an improved process for the manufacture of armor plate, seen by the Canadian Associated Press at the Hyde Park Hotel, said he had scored a great success in the tests of his plate by the naval authorities, which culminated on Saturday at Whale Island. A six-inch plate was fired at from a distance of 120 feet by a 9.2 inch gun, with armor-piercing capped shells, which was a severe test. No impression was made on the plate, though the impact shattered the shell into a thousand fragments.

Twelve Killed by Storm.

Houston, Texas, July 23.—The hurricane which swept the Texas gulf coast Wednesday caused the sacrifice of 12 human lives, fatal injuries to four other persons and serious damage to property.
