

Fishery Case May Be Postponed.

Ottawa, July 23.—Contrary to general expectations the fisheries dispute between Newfoundland and the United States will not be referred to at The Hague conference this year, but will probably be referred to next year.

Meanwhile Hon. A. B. Aylesworth and J. S. Ewart, K.C., are in London preparing Canada's case along with Sir Robert B. Finlay, the distinguished Scottish lawyer.

Mr. Aylesworth will proceed to Vienna in a few weeks, where he will consult with an ear specialist regarding his deafness, which occasioned him much discontent during last session of Parliament. He will return to Canada in October.

pageant for Czar.

London, July 23.—The summer of 1909 will be remembered as a season of naval pageantry.

Last month the greatest assemblage of war craft in the history of the British navy took place off Portsmouth. This week the same ships entered the Thames and the public was able to see the largest fleet that ever anchored so near London.

On Saturday the ships will gather

at Portsmouth, where, on July 31, they will be reviewed by the King, and on the following Monday, the Emperor of Russia will have an opportunity to see them when his yacht comes to Cowes for the meeting with the King.

Says Mines Are Unsafe.

Glouce Bay, July 23.—There is scarcely a ripple on the surface here yesterday to indicate any change in the situation, although the company reports a much larger output from the collieries.

Rumor says that conditions in the mine are growing dangerous. Skilled men have more than they can attend to and the great pressure is to get out coal regardless of the care of the mine. One man left No. 2, and said he would not stay in under present conditions as he recognized them.

Hearse Chauffeur Arrested.

Chicago, July 23.—Eugene R. Boden, a chauffeur of an automobile hearse, was arrested for speeding in Michigan avenue at Garfield Boulevard Wednesday. He was on his way with a body to Oakwood cemetery.

Robert Smith of Cornwall, Ont., was found dead of gas poisoning in his room at Andover, Mass.

The indications are that the British Government will order four greater Dreadnoughts immediately.

A foreigner, supposed to be one of the gang who robbed the bank at Rainy River, has been arrested at Winnipeg.

A peculiar disease has broken out among horses in the Peterboro district and several deaths are reported. The outbreak is a serious one.

A deal was consummated by which the T. Eaton Co., Ltd., of Toronto will occupy the entire three top floors of the new J. A. Jacobs building at the corner of St. Catherine and St. Alexander streets, Montreal, and adjoining the Princess Theatre.

Earl Grey Returns.

Quebec, July 24.—Earl Grey arrived yesterday morning on the Empress of Ireland. He was met at the landing by Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Lieutenant-Governor Sir Alphonse Pelletier.

His Excellency is the picture of health. He was driven to the viceregal quarters at the citadel and left at 2 o'clock for Ottawa.

A young woman from London, England, named McMillan, 39 years of age, died on board the Empress of Ireland during the voyage. She was accompanied by her husband and two children and was en route for Vancouver.

Among the passengers by the Empress of Ireland was the Lord Bishop of Chichester, besides a number of prominent Canadians.

Falls Dead in Parliament.

Melbourne, Australia, July 24.—At 6 o'clock yesterday morning, after an all night sitting, Sir Frederick Holder, Speaker of the House of Representatives, was seized with a fit and fell to the floor. The House immediately adjourned. He died in the afternoon.

Hon. Sir Frederick William Holder, K.C.M.G., J.P., M.P., was the first Representative of the Australian House of Representatives, and was appointed in 1905. He was a native of Australia, and served on many important commissions during his political career. He was Premier and Treasurer of the Commonwealth at various times, his first term being 1899 to 1901. He was elected to the Federal Parliament for South Australia in the latter year.

Eig 'Phone Merger.

Pittsburg, July 24.—Absolute control of the Central District & Printing Telegraph Co., the local Bell Telephone concern, is to pass into the hands of the American Telephone & Telegraph Co.

In discussing the deal, M. H. Buchler, general manager of the Bell Telephone Co., said:

"This is the fourth deal in a movement which will eventually extend over the entire country. The local deal has been pending for some time, and is but a part of a movement on the part of the American Telephone & Telegraph Co. to consolidate all the Bell companies in the United States under one head."

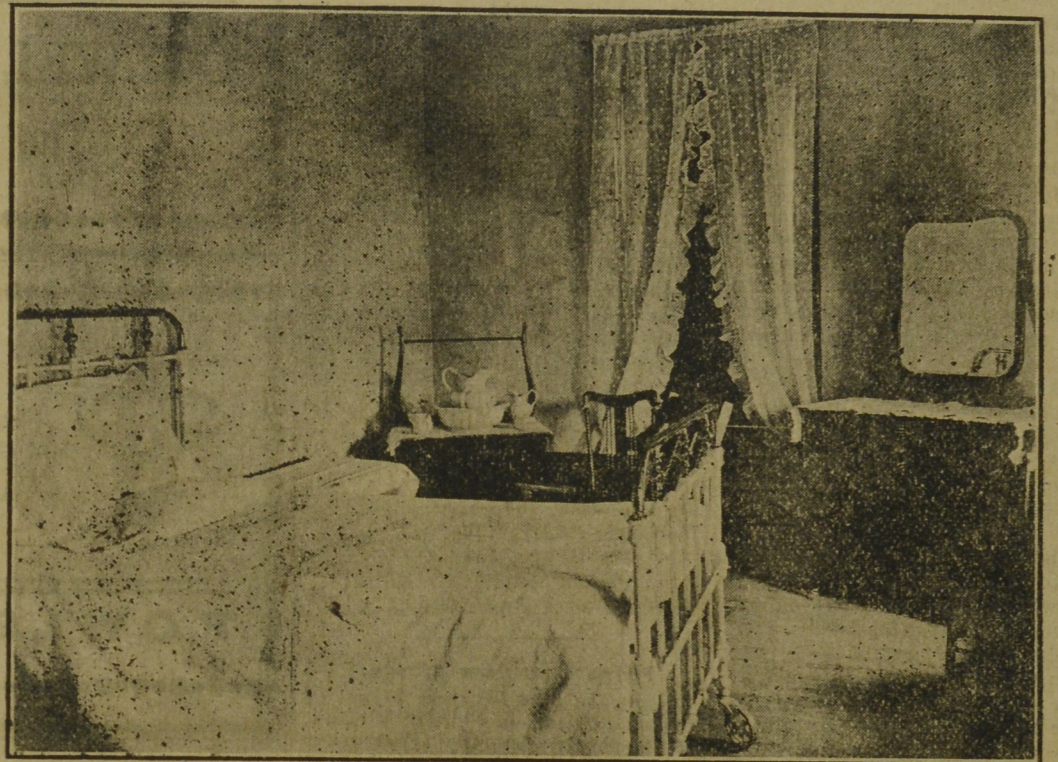

THE OPERATING ROOM.

The operating room is situated on the second floor of the new building, and contains as part of the equipment a modern sterilizer and a cabinet holding a good collection of necessary surgical instruments. As a result of the splendid electric lighting system in use, surgical operations may be performed as well by night as during daylight.

During the year acetylene gas has been used both for light and heating purposes.

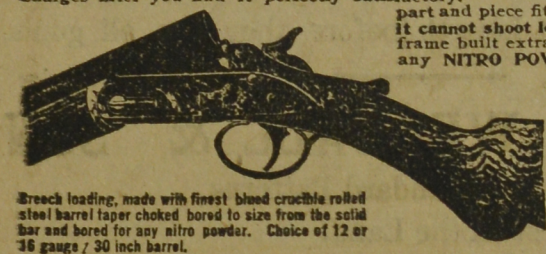

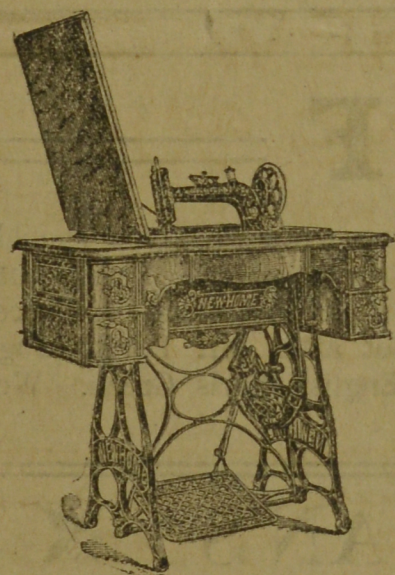

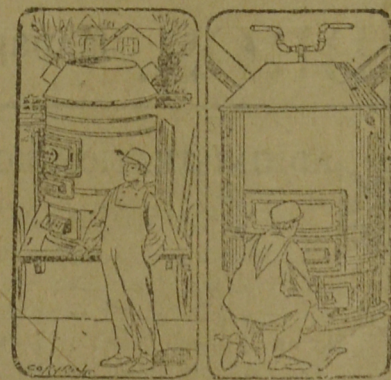
