

EVELYN THAW'S VISIT.

Arrived at Campbellton With Maid and Man Servant.

Evelyn Nesbitt Thaw, late wife of Harry K. Thaw, the woman who has been in the limelight for the past two years, arrived in Campbellton Wednesday morning on the Ocean Limited, together with a maid and a man servant, and registered at the "Minto." The day was quietly spent here, Mrs. Thaw appearing on the streets and was readily recognized by those who were familiar with her published pictures.
Yesterday she, with her attendants, left by the Intercolonial for

Richard's Siding, enroute to Restigouche Lodge on the Kewbeek, where Mr. Stulman, is enjoying the fishing with a party of friends.
Mrs. Thaw will have a hard road to travel. She will go about fifty miles by rail, and then about seven miles by team, over one of the roughest portage roads in this country. She was dressed for the journey, being attired in a short walking skirt of grey cloth, tan leggings and boots, a sweater with collar and a bright red tie. A felt hat of men's pattern completed a very serviceable woods costume.

SENTENCED TO HANG.

Prisoner Thanked Judge for Giving Him a Chance to "Lay Down His Life for His Country."

London, July 23.—Madalari Dhinagari, an Indian student who, in the night of July 1, at the conclusion of a public gathering in the Imperial Institute, shot and killed Lieut.-Col. Sir William Hutt Curson Wyllie and Dr. Cawase Lalacaca, was today found guilty and sentenced to death at the conclusion of a trial of less than an hour's duration in the Old Bailey Police Court.

During the recital of the occurrences in the Imperial Institute on the night of the tragedy, the prisoner sat in the dock listening unconcernedly and only once broke his silence by saying: "Whatever I did was an act of patriotism."

At the close of the evidence and in reply to the query if he wished to question any of the witnesses, Madalari said no, adding that he wished only that the statement in justification of his act, which he made in the police court of July 10, should be read. This was done, and the verdict of guilty and sentence of death followed in a few seconds.

As the Lord Chief Justice concluded in pronouncing sentence, the prisoner drew himself up in military style and

saluted. He said: "I thank you, my Lord. I am proud to have the honor of laying down my humble life for my country. Your sentence of death is perfectly illegal. You are all-powerful and can do what you like; but remember we will have the power some day. That is all I have to say."

IMPRISONED FOR SEDITION.

Al D. Horsely, printer of the Indian Sociologist, who recently was arrested on the charge of publishing seditious newspapers, the avowed object of which was to support the Indian nationalist movement for the liberation of India from oppressive alien rule by the use of physical force today pleaded guilty and was sentenced to four months' imprisonment. The Indian Sociologist is owned and edited by Kishnavarma, who is now a refugee in Paris. The paper openly approved the murder of Sir William Wyllie and Dr. Lalacaca July 1 by Madalari Dhinagari.

SEVEN CHANCES YET

King's Prize Competitors Are Now in Last Stage.

STACK SECURES A PLACE

Canada Has Still a Good Show for Winning Blue Ribbon of Rifle Competitions—Huggins and McGinnes Stand at the Top of Remaining Canucks — Other Prizes Won Yesterday at Bisley, Eng.

Bisley Camp, July 24.—Staff-Sergt. Stack of Truro, N.S., in the shoot-off for a place in the King's Prize, third stage, was successful in winning; one of the two places, which were competed for by 28 others.

The total score in the third stage over the three ranges is 150—ten shots at each range. Sergt. Stack can equal last year's winning score of 325 by making 140 out of the possible 150 in this stage.

There are now the following seven Canadians in this final stage, which is shot off to-day: Sergt.-Major Huggins of Hamilton, Corpl. McGinnes of Edmonton, Lieut. Morris of Bowmanville, Sergt. W. A. Smith of Ottawa, Sergt. Blackburn of Winnipeg, Sergt. Freeborn of Hamilton and Sergt. Stack of Truro.

The third stage, open to the 100 competitors making the highest places in the first and second stages combined, is at 800, 900 and 1,000 yards (aggregate), ten shots at each distance. The places of all competitors in the second and third stages will be decided by the aggregate of the scores made by them in all the stages in which they fire.

It is interesting to note that the man making the highest score in the first and second stages of the King's Prize has not yet managed to win the great trophy. Canada still has a good chance to lift it.

The highest score yet made in this competition, that of 325, made by Pte. J. Gray of the 5th Scottish Rifles last year, can be equalled by either Sergt.-Major Huggins of the 13th, Hamilton, or Corpl. D. McGinnes of Edmonton, if they make only 135 out of 155 at the 800, 900 and 1,000 yard ranges at the third stage. To equal this score also, Sergt. Blackburn of Winnipeg must make 136, and Col.-Sergt. Freeborn of Hamilton and Lieut. Morris

of Edmonton must each, out of 150.

Lieut. Mortimer was first in the "Range Prizes," competition at 500 yards in the first stage of the King's Prize, and won a rifle presented by the Birmingham Small Arms Co. and \$25. Sergt. Russell was second, winning a rifle and \$25; Staff-Sergt. Bayless, 4th, \$5; Corpl. Albert Sprinks, 26th, \$5.

In the "Range Prizes," at 600 yards in the King's Prize, Staff-Sergt. Mitchell was 18th, winning \$5; Sergt.-Major Huggins, 19th, \$5; Col.-Sergt. Freeborn, 31st, \$5.

In the King's Prize list those who failed to get into the third stage rank are as follows: Sergt. Russell, 106th; Major Jones, 141st; Sergt.-Major Creighton, 166th; Corpl. A. Sprinks, 194th; Sergt. Kelly, 200th, and Pte. H. D. Gougeon, 230th.

Russell, Jones and Creighton win \$20; Sprinks, Kelly and Gougeon, \$15.

In the Corporation of the City of London, open only to Indian and colonial volunteers, Col.-Sergt. Freeborn was 2nd, winning \$75; Staff-Sergt. Mitchell, 4th, \$50; Sergt.-Sergt. Richardson, 5th, \$37.50; Lieut. Smith, 6th, \$37.50; Corpl. McGinnes, 7th, \$25; Sergt. Smith, 8th, \$25; Sergt.-Major Huggins, 10th, \$25; Lieut. Morris, 12th, \$25.

Lieut. Smith is second in the Elkington Cup competition, winning \$10; Sergt. Smith, 40th, also won \$10.

The Elkington prizes are awarded to the competitors whose respective scores in the Secretary of State for War, Duke of Cambridge, Imperial Tobacco, make up the highest aggregates.

Jerome In Thaw Case.

New York, July 24.—District Attorney Jerome announced yesterday that he would go to White Plains on Monday to appear at the resumption in the Supreme Court there of the hearing as to Harry K. Thaw's mental condition.

He said that Attorney-General O'Malley, who is opposing Thaw's application for the release on the part of the state, had asked his assistance.
