IN HIS 105th YEAR.

John Brown, of this City, is Probably New Brunswick's Oldest Inhabitant.

Mr. John Brown, colored, Fredericton's oldest inhabitant and probably the oldest man in the province, entered upon his 105th year on July 5th, at the home of his niece on Charlotte street, where he resides. When the Herald representative met Mr. Brown on Saturday afternoon he had just finished doing a day's work sawing wood for a lady on Carleton street. He was in the best of health and seemed as smart as many men thirty years younger. He was then on his way to the lower end of town to spend the evening with a friend.

Mr. Brown was born in a small building on George street below Regent on July 5th, 1805, and resided in this neighborhood all his life. He says he remembers the day when the old 104th Regiment left Fredericton in the winter of 1813 on their famous march to Quebec which was made on shoe shoes.

Mr. Brown is in possession of all his faculties, his eyesight and appetite being particularly good.

During all the years he has resided here Mr. Brown has been known as an upright, honest citizen, and is well known and respected.

OLD RESIDENT DEAD.

Mr. Richard Jones Succumbs to an Attack of Heart Failure.

Mr. Richard Jones, a well known and esteemed citizen, passed away at his home on Charlotte Street, Saturday afternoon, after a brief illness from heart failure and complications. He was a native of Prince William, York County, but left there when quite a young man. He spent several years in Wisconsin in the employ of Hon. Isaac Stephenson, a wealthy lumberman and former New Brunswicker. That he enjoyed the esteem of Hon. Mr. Stephenson was shown by the fact that when the latter visited Fredericton a few years ago he promptly sought out his old employee and entertained him to a drive.

The late Mr. Jones after his return to Fredericton, was for many years employed by the late Mr. W. T. Estey, grocer. He was subsequently employed by the late Mr. Elijah Estabrooks and also by Mr. James A. Bell. Of late he has been prevented by ill health from engaging in hard work.

He deceased was seventy-six years of age and is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Mellick of this city. His wife passed away only three weeks ago.

The funeral took place at 2.30 o'clock this afternoon and was well attended. Capt. Hargrove, of the Salvation Army, conducted the services and interment was made in the total cemetery.
