"AMERICAN PERIL"

Prominent German Says Europe Should Check Uncle Sam.

THREATENS WHOLE WORLD

Judge Schwarze In an Article In Der Tag Declares that the United States is the Force to be Feared and That Instead of Fighting Each Other Germany and England Should Unite Their Strength.

Berlin, July 4.—Judge Wilhelm Schwarze, a prominent member of the Reichstag and of the Prussian House of Representatives, seizes upon America's eleventh-hour use of moral force to secure participation in the Chinese railway loan as a pretext for a fresh and vigorous warning against "the American peril."

Writing in Der Tag, under the caption, "Europe for Europeans," the learned judge urges that England and Germany abandon their mutual suspicions, trade competitions, and small rivalries, and league themselves without further delay against their common enemy from across the water.

"America," declares the jurist and politician, "is the peril not only for England and Germany, but for all Europe. Instead of arriving at common ways and means for combating the still latent danger, England and Germany are preparing to tear each other to pieces. In order to make the danger acute, Greater Britain and Greater Germany would go to smash on account of the United States."

"Europe should realize this in time to preserve what is still to be preserved. The yellow peril is altogether secondary. Our Imperial cousin in America is the greater danger. The dollar is the bigger. It will annihilate the shilling and the mark unless Europe sets up its own Monroe doctrine of Europe for Europeans. This doctrine must eventually take the form of an economic alliance of all Europe, including England, otherwise America will be the conqueror in the world battle and will exhaust Europe. The cause of this war would be the supremacy of the sea and the world markets. No matter who won, America would be the eventual and the supreme gainer."

"It is high time to explode the fiction that England and Germany are the chief rivals for world trade dominion, and that whoever is defeated the other would attain to it. The competitors are not England and Germany. America is not only her competitor of England and Germany alone, but of both of them together."

"Let us not be deceived by the fact that the American merchant marine at present is no match for the English and German mercantile fleets. That is a circumstance due, not to the inability of America to have such a fleet, but simply because it has hitherto not wanted one. That America will get such a fleet when it needs it is deducible from its imperialistic development in recent times."

"It must also be plain that American designs on Canada would be hastened by an Anglo-Germany war. If England and Germany fight they will fly at each other's throats for the benefit of America. America will be the laughing heir of both. That this will without doubt be the case is indicated by the brutal procedure of Aldrich and Payne in connection with the new tariff bill and by the forward policy of Secretary Knox in China."

"It is of the most vital necessity that the economic factors of Europe unite against pan-Americanism before it is too late."

Brakeman Fatally Hurt.

St. Catharines, July 5.—In Merriton on Saturday afternoon, Charles Mennen, brakeman, lost his life through injuries received in the G.T.R. yards. Mennen, while performing regular duties, fell under the wheels of the car. When removed to the hospital amputation was found necessary below the left leg being amputated below the knee. He died yesterday morning. His home was in Harrisburg.

Max. and Min. Provision Adopted.

Washington, July 5.—The maximum and minimum provisions of the tariff bill were adopted by the Senate on Saturday by a vote of 36 to 18. The provisions of this measure will go into effect March 31, 1910, and 90 days must elapse before a President's proclamation applying the maximum duty of 25 per cent. and valorem in addition to other duties provided in the bill will be operative.

Woman Takes Paris Green.

Hastings, July 5.—Mrs. James Stevenson died Saturday as a result of taking paris green about 10 a.m. Friday.

After she had taken the poison she crossed the road to her daughter, and told her what she had done. Medical aid was at once summoned, but without success. She was about 69 years of age, and her health had been poor for some time.

Queen of Spain's Ambition.

Madrid, July 5.—The Queen of Spain, when congratulated on the birth of the infant princess, answered: "Yes, it is nice. I always hoped I should have as many babies as grandmamma and I still hope so." The Queen's determination to have a larger family than her mother has been noted.

New High School Principal.

St. Catharines, July 5.—At a special meeting of the collegiate institute board on Saturday, A. E. Coombs of Newmarket was appointed principal to succeed Principal John Henderson, who was principal for 34 years, and is resigning.

Suicide of Barrie Man.

Barrie, July 5.—Alex. Walker, a resident of the railway ward of the town, took a dose of laudanum with suicidal intent, and died in two hours. He has been despondent for some time. He leaves a wife and a large family.

BRIEFS FROM THE WIRES

Rev. Michael Lynch died at Peterboro', aged 82.

Fourth of July carnage in the United States were heavy.

Charles Green of Burlington was drowned while boating on the lake. C. W. Hayes, an employee of the T. Eaton Company, was drowned at Winnipeg.

Edward Rourke dropped dead at London, Ont., while painting at one of the fire halls.

The projected railway from Winnipeg to the Gulf of Mexico has been abandoned owing to lack of money.

In the heart of Detroit a woman aeronaut lodged on a mass of live wires and had her body terribly scorched.

A British sea captain from Nova Scotia was interviewed by the police at Stamford, Conn., and forced to haul down his flag.

Bill Brown, a former employee of Buffalo Bill's show, stole a horse at St. Thomas and drove furiously to Aylmer. He was pursued by officers in an automobile and captured.

Roseberry to Resign?

New York, July 5.—The Herald's London correspondent cables: Lord Roseberry has at last, I hear, decided to break the ties that still bind him to the Liberal party, and he will pronounce his reasons for doing so in a letter which is to be read at the next meeting of the Liberal League.

This will mean his complete and formal severance from the party with which he has been associated throughout his political career. He has had this step in consideration for some time and he came to the decision on the budget, which was intended to be the first hint of his approaching defection.

Strenuous efforts are being made to make him change his mind and induce him to still keep up an attitude of benevolent neutrality toward the old party.

Drowns Herself in Cistern.

London, July 5.—While in a despondent state, as the result of an illness extending over six months, Miss Jennie Guest, 454 Queen's avenue, committed suicide yesterday morning by drowning herself in a cistern in the rear of the Guest residence.

Early in the morning her sister heard her moving about in her room, and asked if she would like company. She answered that she wished to be alone. At 7 o'clock the sister awoke and found that Jennie was missing. Dressing hurriedly she aroused neighbors and a search was made. The body of the unfortunate girl was found in the cistern, which was filled as a result of recent rains.

Governor Bulley's Adventure.

Edmonton, July 5.—Lieut. Governor Bulley, Hon. Charles Murphy, and Dr. McIntyre, M.P., figured in a mix-up which might have been serious, but for the horseanship and pluck of the Lieutenant-Governor. His honor was driving the Secretary of State and Dr. McIntyre about the grounds, when a plank, run over by one wheel, upended, raising one side of the carriage and throwing the Lieutenant-Governor to the ground. He pluckily clung to the reins, and brought the spirited team to a standstill after being dragged some distance.

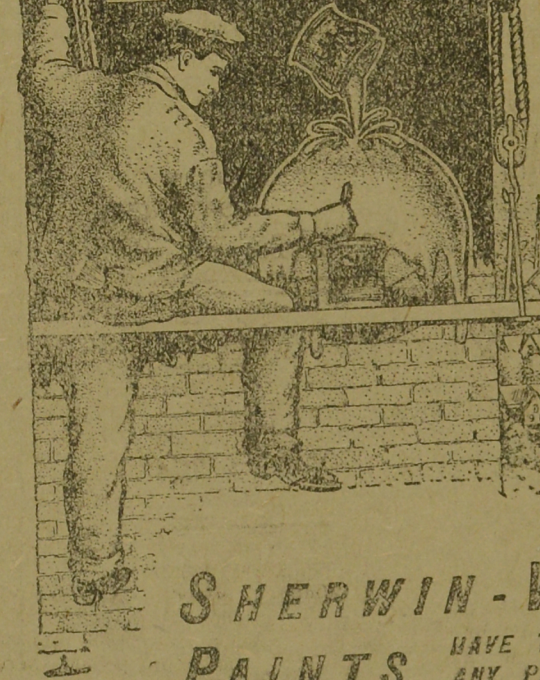
