CHANGED CONDITIONS.

Only a few years ago the sudden death of Henry H. Rogers would have shaken the world of finance to its center. But when the announcement was made Wall Street paused, but only to manifest personal interest in the man who had moved in that area a towering figure. There have been times when the death of a lesser figure, exercising a lesser influence and having lesser connections with industrial and financial affairs would have precipitated a panic in the "Street," but in this case there was barely a ripple in the sea of finance.

The reasons for this are interesting to seek, and when sought are found not to be remote. It is due largely to the change that has taken place in the methods of the conduct of business. The day of individualism has passed. The day of combination which means a division of labor and responsibility is here. Mr. Rogers grew up under one system and participated in the establishment of the other. He lived to see the arrival of the stage when his responsibilities as a formative power were divided among so many that plans went forward to a completion under a process that even seemed to be automatic. The very best that can be said for the system of combination, which is not only a combination of capital, but as well a combination of brains, is said when this fact is pointed out. The death of John D. Rockefeller would cause no more of a ripple though he is the largest investor in the country, and through his holdings has a hand on every established enterprise.

It is curious to note also that the submergence of the individual in a combination of individuals was felt by and, indeed, engulfed the man who has just died. Influence he did exert, and to the day of his death, but it was in a circumscribed circle where only its potency was observed—in that circle to which belonged the privilege of execution in the bond of commercial and financial development.

THE TRUE SPIRIT.

Some of the more militant of the suffragettes are fond of asserting that women are men's equal in all things, and that the mere difference of sex should not be a barrier to equality in politics as well as in every walk of life. The unwisdom of the suggestion—to put it mildly—was emphasized a few years ago by Queen Victoria when she wrote:

"We women are not made for governing—and if we are good women we must dislike these masculine occupations."

"God created men and women different—thus let them remain each in their own position. A woman would become the most hateful, heartless and disgusting of human beings were she allowed to unsex herself; and where would be the protection which man was intended to give the weaker sex?"

And the point has been recently emphasized by Queen Alexandra, who in a message to the Jubilee Congress of Nursing at Liverpool, said:

"Queen Alexandra. She has the fullest sympathy with you in your work. She is sorry that she cannot be present, but she will hear all about the congress. She feels that this is a work which women can do. Some women nowadays try to be like men, but this is a thing that men cannot do, and it is therefore here that we feel superior to anybody else."

There breathes the true spirit of woman, to be the helpmate of man and to do that work in the world which she can do better than man.

FAITH NEEDED.

The sentiment of the following lines from the editorial column of the St. John Times, is an admirable one and may well be commended to the people of Fredericton.

"Neither federal nor provincial governments can do for a people that which they ought to do for themselves. This city and province are making progress, but there is still too much of pessimism. To him who looks about him with unprejudiced gaze, there are abundant evidences that practical faith in our resources and advantages is not unrewarded. Let us have more of this faith, that our villages, towns and cities may grow, and our farm lands become the home of prosperous and contented husbandmen."

The action of the University authorities in conferring the degree of Doctor of Laws upon Chief Superintendent Inch yesterday, was a fitting tribute to one who has devoted the greater part of a long life to the cause of education. The only cause for regret is that it was not done long ago.

ANGRY MORMONS.

Mob in Alberta Took Revenge on the Gentiles.

Winnipeg, May 27.—The following despatch has been received from Lethbridge:

"A mob of thirty or forty Mormons yesterday mobbed, threatened to hang and severely handled two men and a woman at Magrath, a Mormon settlement about twenty-two miles southeast of here."

"The matter arose from the marriage a year or more ago of a Mormon girl to a Gentile, as the Mormons call all non-members of their church. H. Barclay and his wife, the couple concerned, after their marriage, lived in Calgary. Mrs. Barclay about five months ago returned to her mother's home at Magrath and intended to return to her own home in the course of a week or two. Once back in Magrath, however, her parents and church determined to keep her, and in spite of her husband's entreaties she refused to return to him."

"Barclay, accompanied by his sister, Mrs. Bolderson, of this city, and a friend named Harrison, went to Magrath to urge his wife once again to come back to him; she refused. He finally declared that if she would not come back he would have his child, which he did."

"A mob got together and Barclay was shackled by a man who called himself sheriff. He, his sister, and Harrison were hauled before a Mormon magistrate, who gave orders that the child be returned to its mother and the three Gentiles leave the place on the first train. The three were taken, handcuffed, to the depot where the sheriff, who meanwhile had been in the waiting room some time when a mob appeared. 'We will hang you,' cried some of the mob. 'Get a rope.' The mob rushed the three Gentiles, knocked them down, kicked and beat them, pelted them with eggs and threw Harrison through a window and the top of one of his fingers severed."

ESCAPED FROM JAIL.

VAN BUREN, Me., May 27.—

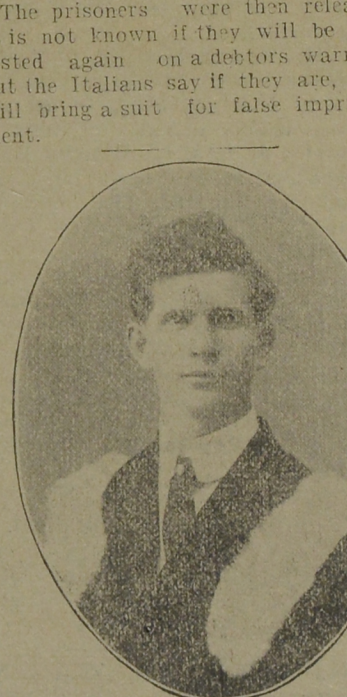
Sheriffs and detectives on both sides of the Maine-New Brunswick border are searching tonight for two alleged desperadoes who escaped today from the county jail in Edmundston, N.B., where they were being held for attempted train wrecking and dynamiting. It is believed that the men have fled to American soil and that they were in the neighborhood of Fort Kent, Me., tonight. The men are Ubald Micha and Paul Micha, brothers, of Baker Lake, N.B.

According to New Brunswick officers, the two men are charged with attempting to dynamite the station at Clair, on the Temiscouata railroad, opposite Fort Kent, and with attempting to wreck the night express from Edmundston at that point. Traced by detectives and lodged in jail, they managed to make their escape today. President Grundy, of the Temiscouata railroad, who was here late today to consult the counsel for the prisoners, Peter C. Keegan, relative to the issuance of extradition papers, said he believed the fugitives would be captured before morning.

ITALIANS RELEASED.

CHATHAM, N.B., May 28.—(Special)—Twelve Italians arrested here Tuesday and kept imprisoned for three days, on a warrant sworn out by the agent of a G.T.P. construction party, were released this morning. Mr. J. A. Haviland acted for the prisoners, and as the warrant purported to be for a criminal offence, whereas the question was one of breaking a working contract, he asked the magistrate to dismiss the case.

The prisoners were then released. It is not known if they will be arrested again on a debtors warrant, but the Italians say if they are, they will bring a suit for false imprisonment.

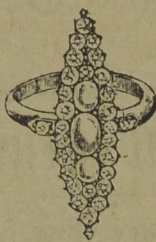
