HOTEL THIEF PLEADS GUILTY

Frank Wilson alias McIsaac Acknowledges That He Robbed Guests at Windsor Hall.

Frank Wilson, who is also believed to be Frank McIsaac and is known by several other aliases, and who was brought from Gagetown yesterday on a charge of stealing a valise from Mr. R. T. Waller, a boarder at Windsor Hall, was before the police court today and remanded until Monday next.

The prisoner came here about three weeks ago from St. John and secured a position as bell boy at Windsor Hall. He remained there until Saturday last, when Mr. Weaver, the new proprietor of the hotel, not liking the young man's way of doing things, paid him off and allowed him to go. He registered at the York Hotel on Sunday night and took the steamer on Monday morning intending to go to St. John but changed his mind and left the boat at Gagetown. On Monday a valise belonging to Mr. Walker and also several articles belonging to other boarders were found missing. Mr. Weaver wishing to protect the property of his guests swore out a warrant for Wilson's arrest. Chief Hawthorn after communicating with the police authorities in different places learned of the young man's arrival at Gagetown and telephoned Sheriff Williams to hold him. The chief went to Gagetown on Tuesday and brought the prisoner here yesterday.

At the police court this morning young Wilson appeared before Police Magistrate Marsh. He was asked if he had ever went by any other name than Wilson but declined to make any statement unless he was compelled to do so. The Police Magistrate informed the prisoner that he had received word from the St. John authorities that a young man named Frank McIsaac had been arrested for theft in that city a short time ago and later was let go on suspended sentence. A letter had been found in the valise stolen by the prisoner, addressed "Frank McIsaac, Fredericton."

The prisoner declined to state whether or not he was Frank McIsaac, but pleaded guilty to stealing the valise.

His Honor stated that a list of articles belonging to other boarders at Windsor Hall had been found in possession of the prisoner and included a pair of duck pants belonging to K. Evans of the Bank of Montreal; 100 cards of Mr. E. Crawford, of Furrell Bros; bathing suit and ties, the property of K. Evans; tin whistle, George Walker, coat hanger from Jas. Bruce; safety razor blades belonging to Mr. Bruce; a fancy tobacco box and a hockey cap belonging to Mr. Evans; \$3.25 in cash and 3 brushes, the property of Mr. E. Crawford, and one \$5 exciser which he disposed of at Gagetown for \$1.25.

When asked regarding these things the tobacco box belonged to himself and that the exciser belonged to Mr. Evans. Mr. Evans had left the hotel and as he had occupied the next room to the prisoner and left the things behind the latter thought he might as well appropriate them. The exciser he stated was for physical training. When arrested the prisoner was attired in a very natty navy blue suit which he purchased on tick at a local gent's furnishing house. When he appeared in court he had a respectable but not so stylish a fit-out. The navy blue suit had been taken from the prisoner during the morning by the manager of the furnishing house.

Col. Marsh stated that the charge against the prisoner was for stealing the valise valued at \$13 from R. Z. Walker on May 16, the complainant was J. H. Weaver. The prisoner pleaded guilty to this charge and was remanded until Monday next. The Magistrate may take up the case on Saturday. In the meantime the St. John police will be communicated with.

There was some discussion in regard to the proposed race meeting for exhibition week, and on motion of Ald. Calder, seconded by Mr. O'Neill, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"Whereas a committee from the Fredericton Park Association has waited upon the directors of the Fredericton 1909 Exhibition asking them to guarantee two stake races for the exhibition race meeting on the condition that five days racing or purses and stakes aggregating between \$3,500 and \$4,000, and

"Whereas the Exhibition directors have refused to lend the assistance asked for and assume responsibility for the racing on one day of five, therefore

"Resolved that it is not wise to hold a five days race meeting during the Fredericton Exhibition, and

"Further resolved that preparations be commenced for holding a three days race meeting during the exhibition."

CLOSE OF SESSION.

Dominion Parliament Formally Prorogued by His Excellency Earl Grey.

OTTAWA, May 19.—The governor general this afternoon, amidst the traditional brilliancy and glitter of the event, closed the session and sent the members of the eleventh parliament of Canada to their homes.

The session has lasted just four months and is the shortest that has been held for several years.

The outstanding features of the session was the resolution that Canada should participate in the naval defence of the empire and the splendid manner in which Hon. Dr. Pugsley met and defeated the attacks made upon him, based on the Maves affidavit and the report of the Landry commission.

The close of the session finds Dr. Pugsley one of the biggest men and the most imposing figures in Canadian parliamentary life and members on both sides of the house expect to see him grow in importance with every session. There will be little more heard in the way of attacks upon him hereafter.

The speech from the throne delivered by Earl Grey refers to the more important pieces of legislative work accomplished by parliament during the session just closed. His remarks follow:

EARL GREY'S ADDRESS.

"Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate:

"Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

"In relieving you from further attendance on this session, I thank you for the assiduity and diligence of the for the assiduity and diligence which you have given to the discharge of the duties entrusted to your care and it must be a source of satisfaction to yourselves that you have been able to perform your labors in a comparatively brief space of time.

"I am pleased to notice that your attention has been engaged in some measures of great importance.

"In the first rank of such measures is to be noted the amendment of the railway act, under which by the joint action of the national government,

provincial authorities, together with the railway companies, level railway crossings are to be gradually removed and a constant menace to life and property thereby effectually done away with.

"The loan of \$10,000,000 to the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway company will no doubt ensure the completion during the coming season of the prairie section of the National Transcontinental railway and will secure to the fast developing western provinces for this year's crop a new and competitive outlet towards the sea.

"The act to place the department of labor, which has been in existence for some years, under the direct responsibility of a minister of the crown, exclusively entrusted with its management, is in accordance with the oft expressed wishes of the labor organizations and is a further step in a field of legislation wherein Canada has already taken a not unimportant place.

"The act charging the secretary of state with special responsibility in regard to the external affairs of Canada will facilitate the transaction of business in connection with that most important branch of the public service.

"The resolution adopted by the House of Commons for the organization of a Canadian naval service, in co-operation with and in close relation to the imperial navy, is a proper acknowledgment of the duties now appertaining to Canada as a nation and as a member of the British Empire.

"The financial conditions throughout the world seem more hopeful than they were four months ago when I opened this session, and whilst in Canada we have undoubtedly suffered less than other countries during the period of universal depression it will still be the part of prudence to exercise care and economy in all branches of the services.

"Gentlemen of the House of Commons, I thank you for the provisions which you have made for the public service.

"Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate:

"Gentlemen of the House of Commons: I sincerely hope and pray that Almighty God will continue to pour His blessings upon our country and let us now offer Him the fervent and a constant menace to life and property thereby effectually done away with.

Mount Allison team is not picked yet. Ryan, however, will be the first choice for 100 and 200. Clay will also be in these events and probably in the high jump also. Other men will be picked from McKay, Hooper and Patterson. In the quarter box will probably also be a competitor. Stalling and McCully are likely to be the only ones in the broad jump with neither doing particularly well so far in practice.
