Victoria Colonist, (Qon.)—Mr. William Pugsley, Minister of Public Works, is to be entertained by the Canadian Club at luncheon next Monday. Mr. Pugsley is not only a prominent public man, but an exceedingly agreeable speaker.

Earl Grey, one of the best government generals Canada has had since the days of Lord Dufferin, is determined to see all parts of this great country during his term of office. He left Ottawa yesterday on a trip to the far-away Yukon.

Telegraph—Mr. R. A. Estey's testimony before the river commission yesterday was of a practical and pointed character. The man by stream should not be permitted to hold up logs bound for points below. That sort of delay should involve damages.

How many farmers in York County would like to be paid 45 cents a bushel for all the potatoes they can grow? Yet that is the amount of duty that the new United States tariff will impose on tubers imported into that country. The business of potato growing is evidently still classed as an "infant industry" in Uncle Sam's domain. What a lot of humbug there is in connection with a protection tariff.

Attorney-General Bow-wow-sir, of British Columbia, who is just back from a four months' trip to the old country, told a St. John Standard reporter that the outlook for Tory success at the next Dominion election was very hopeful. He probably thinks the Tories of New Brunswick are in need of a word of encouragement at the present time.

The cement merger, one of the most important business combinations ever effected in Canada, is announced. It will include all the important cement manufacturing companies in Canada. And the consolidated company which will be known as the Canadian Consolidated Cement Company and will have a capitalization of \$25,000,000. This is a day of big things in Canada.

The increasing popularity of the Dominion government annuity system is evidenced by the fact that the premiums received during the seven months the annuities have been on sale now total \$205,000. S. T. Bastedo, head of the annuities branch, reports that applications from intending purchasers of annuities are coming in daily from all parts of Canada between the Yukon and Halifax.

The bye-election in the fourth district of Prince County, P. E. Island, will be held on August 18, Hon. Joseph Read having resigned his seat to contest the district again. The people pronounced their verdict in favor of the government in the first district of Queens on July 7. The captain is a sturdy representative who has large business interests throughout the county. He followed the sea for many years.

Hon. John F. Dryden, for many years minister of agriculture in Ontario, and a colleague of the late Sir Oliver Mowat, died at his home in Toronto yesterday. To Mr. Dryden belonged the distinction of being the first colonial ever appointed by the British government to deal with a question purely British. He served on the agricultural commission for Ireland and went exhaustively into representing a report with recommendations since acted on by the British government.

Largely as the result of a petition circulated by Mr. John A. Humble, when he was working for the job of sheriff, two important appointments have gone to the Parish of Stanley. Major Howe was appointed sheriff and Mr. Allan Ward is now a provincial constable. To offset these blessings however, the Hazen government has decreed that the people of the parish must pay an additional road tax of \$800. In the meantime the much needed local government subsidy for the extension of York and Carleton Railway is not forthcoming.

Ottawa Free Press—Those Canadian tariff reformers who would raise the tariff is high as Haman's gallows should go to live in Brazil, for that country has a scale of duties which makes the McKinley tariff look like a kindergarten effort. Look at this list for instance: Penknives, 291 per cent. screws, 334 per cent. iron racks, 430 per cent.; iron bits, 526 per cent.; school chalk, 552 per cent.; key rings, 629 per cent.; canned vegetables, 349 per cent.; canned goods, 415 per cent.; and onions 616 per cent. And yet Brazil is not noted as one of the big manufacturing countries of the world.

Rev. Dr. Sutherland, missionary secretary of the Methodist church, in

addressing the Epworth Leaguers at St. Thomas Ont., the other day, in defence of Chinese mission work, said: "The Chinese may be inveterate gamblers, but so are lots of Canadians. They may be past masters of fan-tan, but fashionable ladies who go to church, can give them pointers in euchre and bridge. Much of the clamor that comes from the Pacific coast is stage thunder manufactured by demagogues to further their selfish interests. Orientals make just as good Christians as Accidentals. Canada's greatest menace comes not from Asia but from Southeastern Europe. Certainly if the Chinese and Japanese are not worth saving in British Columbia they are not worth saving in the Orient. If we cannot get men to preach to the heathen on our own shores let us in all honor and consistency recall our missionaries from beyond the seas."

SEEKING LOST MAN

Port Arthur Citizens Are Out Looking For Horrigan.

MOTHER DOES NOT KNOW

Authorities Are Straining Every Nerve to Prevent Any Word of Disappearance of ex-Alderman In Woods From Reaching the Aged Mother—Company of Militia Helping In the Search In the Bush.

Port Arthur, July 29.—More than one hundred men are now engaged searching for ex-Alderman George Horrigan, the prominent citizen who on Sunday last became separated from George Hodder and W. C. Dalton in the woods of Black Bay Peninsula.

They rushed across the forty-mile strip of water between here and Black Bay. The tug Picket is in constant commission carrying men and supplies. Yesterday the big tug Whalen took out a whole military company and returning yesterday afternoon brought word that no trace had yet been found. The Picket left again with a full load of supplies. An unsuccessful effort was made to get bloodhounds from Duluth.

The disappearance of Horrigan under such dramatic circumstances and the energy with which the search is being carried on has created great excitement in this city. Every incoming boat is greeted by crowds looking for news.

Country, pure wilderness, thickly wooded, low and wet in places and not devoid of bear, lynx and other such animals, while it is the height of the fly season. Some believe flies alone would make it impossible for a man to live in the woods, added to which Horrigan was lightly clad and without provisions.

A pathetic feature of the case is the effort made to keep the news of his disappearance from Horrigan's aged mother. Telephone lines to the residence have been cut and a man is on guard on the street to prevent the possibility of anyone taking in word of the affair. Local papers have been requested not to publish facts in order to assist in this way and no word of it has appeared in print yet in the Port Arthur newspapers. Horrigan is about 35 years of age, a prominent Liberal and a close friend of James Connely, M.P.
