

IMPORTANT GATHERING

Representative Farmers and Produce Shippers Meet at Woodstock.

WOODSTOCK, N. B., July 22.—The Produce Shippers' Association of New Brunswick met in the council chamber here this afternoon. Among those present were: C. W. In the absence of the president C. F. Gallagher was elected chairman. Roy Peterson was secretary.

Mr. Tweeddale reported for the committee appointed to draft up a constitution. It provides that the association meet four times a year, in Florenceville and Andover alternately, that the initiation fee be \$1 and that five members constitute a quorum.

The report was taken up section by section and approved.

Besides the members speeches were made by F. E. Williams and F. E. Law and by Hon. Messrs Landry and Fleming, representing the government.

Hon. Dr. Landry said that he was pleased to meet and discuss matters with the shippers association. The government was willing to do anything it could to secure new markets for the potato and other crops. The potato has been increasing year by year. The government thought it might be well to send a man to see if it were possible to secure a foothold in the Cuban market. The government would pay the expenses of the commissioner and let the association name the man. He should be sent right away. Another meeting would be held in St. John, and possibly at Moncton, to discuss the question with the steamship companies. He had traveled over a good part of the dominion recently and after what he saw he was prouder than ever of this province from an agricultural standpoint, and he hoped that their efforts would result in the opening up of new markets. If the new and higher duties pass the American senate it would hurt the New Brunswick potato shippers, but it should also stimulate them to look for other markets. Last year there were 3,000,000 bushels of potatoes raised in this province—more than the previous year—and the increase would be equally large this year, the necessity for more markets.

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CANADA IS NOT WANTED.

Mr. Preston Accounts For Protest From Japan.

OTTAWA, July 20.—Referring to the Canadian Associated Press despatch from London this morning, stating that the Colonial Office had sent a protest to the Canadian government respecting Trade Commissioner W. T. R. Preston's advocacy of direct trade relations between Canadian and Japanese business men, the latter, who is now in Ottawa, declares that the protest referred to is probably simply the forwarding of complaints made to the British Ambassador at Tokyo and to the Colonial Office by British commission and trade agents in Japan, who have bitterly resented the intrusion of Canada into the Japanese market, and the efforts made during the past two years to capture for Canadian exporters of the trade with Japan, which is now confined practically exclusively to the British American and German commission houses in the Orient.

Mr. Preston says that prior to his going to Japan practically the whole import trade of that country was done through the medium of the commission houses. In order to get a foothold for Canada in the Japanese market he had to compete with these commission agents, who naturally wanted to keep everything in their own hands. As soon as his efforts began to bear fruit there was an angry storm of protests from German, United States and British traders regarding the upsetting of existing conditions, and their protests were taken up by the American, British and German Ambassadors and the foreign Government officials, who seemed to share in the view that Canada was an intruder and should be kept out. The Japanese, on the other hand, sided with Mr. Preston, and as a result of the propaganda for the past year or so indications now point to the rapid development of Canadian trade with Japan.

JAPAN MAY FIGHT CHINA.

Government's Organ Strikes Alarmist Note.

TOKIO, July 20.—The Kokumin, one of the most influential of the Japanese newspapers, and which is generally regarded as the mouthpiece of Marquis Katsura, the Premier, in matters pertaining to the government's policy, discusses the situation between Japan and China, and strikes a somewhat alarmist note. It was expected, says the article, that the withdrawal of the proposal to refer to The Hague arbitration

tribunal the differences between China and Japan would precede the adoption of what was hoped would be a conciliatory policy by China. But this expectation has not been realized. Canada now proposes wholly unacceptable terms, and refuses to reply to Japan's request for reconsideration.

The article concludes: "The Japanese government is showing all possible patience, but is not carrying its endurance to the point of sentimentality. Unless China's mood changes before the conclusion of the current month Japan will be obliged to assume a different attitude."

TORONTO, July 20.—Prince Ito, who has just returned from Korea, will preside tomorrow for the first time at a meeting of the Privy Council, of which he was appointed President by the Emperor. There is reason to believe that the pending questions between Japan and China, which are causing increased tension, will be the first consideration of the Prince Ito and the Council.

TORIES HOLD PICNIC.

North York Conservative Gathering Addressed by Premier.

Jackson's Point, July 22.—The annual North York Conservative picnic, held yesterday, was as great a success as the uncertain state of the weather would permit. All morning, though the sky was overcast and rain fell intermittently, the roads leading to the Point were crowded with teams, many driving a score of miles from all sections of the riding and from North Ontario and Simcoe. The trolleys brought several thousands from Toronto and York Radial stations; trains had a few thousand from Stouffville, Beaverton, Uxbridge and other points, while 500 or more came in by steamers from Barrie, Allandale and other Lake Simcoe ports. Everyone who knows about crowds says yesterday's turnout exceeded last year's. A modest estimate would place the figure at 12,000 at any rate.

The occasion was graced by the presence of Sir James Whitney, Hon. Dr. Pyne, Hon. James Duff and several members of the Legislature and House of Commons. They addressed the crowd from a stand in a sheltered corner and their words fell on a sea of umbrellas. Not till the program was well advanced did the rain cease.

Premier Whitney was the real "lion of the hour," and as it was his first visit to a North York gathering since his accession, he was presented with a laudatory address.

In his reply Sir James told how his administration had honestly and successfully endeavored to carry out its pledges; and then in concluding, referred to the power question.

MASONIC GRAND LODGE.

Officers Report a Prosperous Year for Craft in Ontario.

London, July 22.—The Ontario Masonic Grand Lodge opened its annual communication here yesterday.

Grand Master Freed, in his report, said that the revenue for the year just closing was \$37,446, and the expenditure \$41,349. Grants for benevolent purposes totaled \$26,372. The receipts from lodges for the semi-centennial fund during the year were \$7,657 and the amount to the credit of the fund on May 31, 1909, was \$51,759. Since that time contributions of over \$3,000 had been received.

R. W. Bro. Aubrey White, Toronto, in his report of the condition of Masonry, shows 22 districts, with 406 lodges, with a membership of 42,180. Several lodges were instituted during the year, bringing the membership up to 43,763. There were 2,600 initiations during the year. Some criticism is given on the slipshod methods of keeping Masonic records, and the inability of district deputies to ascertain if lodge rooms have been ever dedicated. The frequency of fires draws forth advice to insure Masonic property.

Warrants have been granted for lodges in Bancroft, Granton, Dryden, Haliburton and Cobalt. Dispensations had been granted to Blind River, Harrow, Arden, Smith's Falls, Markdale, Cardinal, Coldwater, St. Mary's, Hamilton and Toronto. Petitions for new lodges at Sutton, Mount Albert and Lombardy had been refused.

Daring Diamond Robbery.

Ottawa, July 22.—A big diamond robbery occurred here between one and two yesterday afternoon, when four men entered McMillan's jewelry establishment on Sparks street, right in the city business section, and took two trays out of the window, in each of which were fifty diamond rings. The four entered the store at once. One asked to see nail files, another to see umbrellas, and the other two "worked" the theft. The same firm was robbed of \$2,000 in much the same way two years ago.

The jewelry stolen yesterday was worth from eight to ten thousand dollars.

Devastating Cloudburst.

Milwaukee, Wis., July 22.—An evening Wisconsin special from Ashland, Wis., says:

A cloudburst late Tuesday night caused \$500,000 loss to all kinds of property in Northern Wisconsin.

Steam Brazil Grounds.

Amherstburg, July 23.—The steam Brazil grounded on Bar Point yesterday afternoon and in trying to release herself broke her crosshead pin. The tugs Harding and Aldrich are towing her to the Great Lakes Shipyard for repairs.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Notice is hereby given that The Canada Loose Leaf Company, Limited, will apply to the City Council of the City of Fredericton for a loan and certain exemptions hereunder set out pursuant to Chapter Thirty Nine, Acts of Assembly, 6 Edward VII.

The Company will make application for exemption from water rates sewerage rate and taxation generally for a term of five years, renewable for a further term of five years, and a loan of three thousand five hundred dollars, repayable in instalments of five hundred dollars annually without interest, the first instalment to be paid five years after the loan is made.

U.S. Warns Japan.

New York, July 22.—The American to-day claims to be "in a position to state on the highest authority" that the U. S. Government has abandoned its altruistic policy in the Orient and is now determined to deal with China, Japan—and Russia, as represented in Manchuria—in the firmest possible manner.

The role of benevolent advisor is to be replaced by the mailed fist. The Governments of China, Russia and Japan have been notified of this change of demeanor by the present administration. Ambassador Takahira is returning to Japan unable to approve of Japan's heetering attitude in Manchuria; and the United States will transfer its Pacific fleet to the Orient.

The United States will demand the restoration of the status quo in Manchuria from all the nations concerned, and that if this status quo is not speedily restored by voluntary and graceful act an acute situation will develop which Congress in regular session will be called upon to consider.

To Wind Up Whitby Company.

Toronto, July 22.—Aaron B. Haines, Whitechurch, a creditor to the amount of \$266, has applied for an order winding up the Farmers' Co-operative Harvesting Machine Co., holding that the concern is insolvent within the meaning of the act.

The company was incorporated in 1903, with a nominal capital of \$1,000,000, divided into 100,000 \$10 shares, of which 14,000 were said to have been subscribed and paid up. The company has a large factory at Whitby and an office in Toronto.

Wm. J. Clokey, president of the company, died on June 19.

Sleeve Caught In Machinery.

Kingston, July 22.—While Arthur Savage, aged 23, was running a drill at the locomotive works the sleeve of his right arm caught and the arm was badly mangled. A year ago he was similarly injured in an explosion.
