rains Should Be Patient.

Montreal, July 27.—Referring to dispute over the succession of Archbishop Duhamel at Ottawa, a "French-Canadian" from the capital writing to Le Canada, says that the Irish element cannot complain of the treatment received at the hands of the papal authorities. He instances the Maritime Provinces, where, although the majority of the Catholic population are French speaking, the bishops are Irish, and also the New England states, where, until quite recently, dioceses having a French-speaking majority, remained under the control of Irish bishops.

The correspondent believes that, under the present circumstances, the raising of the race question by the majority in the diocese of Ottawa would simply tend to group the majority against them, and he calls upon all Catholics to wait respectfully for the decision of Rome, when the situation will be fully investigated.

Anderson Fights "Mugging."

Vancouver, B.C., July 27.—The police force are greatly puzzled to account for the reason which caused young Jack Anderson, held here for the Toronto police on the charge of cashing scores of bogus checks in different parts of the world, to fight against having his photograph taken for the Rogues Gallery.

When Detective James Anderson told him that he was going to take his picture the young man wished to leave his glasses behind. He was told he must be taken with them on. So determined was he not to be photographed with his glasses on that he smashed them on the hard cement floor of the jail corridor. A new pair was obtained and he was successfully photographed.

WINNIPEGGER LEADS

Sergeant Blackburn Is Top Prize Man For Canada.

WINNINGS WILL REACH \$1,000

He Appears In Nearly Every List Where Canadians Are Eligible and Won Some Big Events — Morris Is Second and Bayles, Richardson and Mortimer Are High — Blackburn Second In S.R.C.

Bisley Camp, July 27.—(C.A.P. Cable).—Sergeant A. M. Blackburn of Winnipeg, the "unattached" man with the Canadian Bisley team, is easily the leading prize-winner among the Canadians.

To begin with he has the Prince of Wales' prize, \$500 in cash, as well as the Prince of Wales' badge, and N.R.A. badge. With his Birmingham Munition Cup he gets another \$125, and he divides the first prize of \$175 in the Martin match with another competitor. In the King's Prize, Blackburn got fifteenth place; value \$160. His second place in the service rifle championship brought him nothing but glory, and a silver jewel. But Blackburn was an "often mentioned" in the list of minor prizes in other matches. It is quite possible that his winnings will total \$1,000 easily.

Next to Blackburn, Lieut. Morris of the 46th Regiment, Bowmanville, is probably next in cash winnings. He takes \$200 with his third place in the King's Prize. His standard of Empire prize includes \$105 in cash and his London Small Arms Rifle takes with it \$25. Morris also figured well in the lists of winnings in nearly every match in which the Canadians contested.

Staff-Sergeant Bayles of the Royal Grenadiers, Toronto, got \$25 with his Wimbledon Cup and, has figured up fairly well in other matches. Staff-Sergeant Richardson's All-Comers' Aggregate was a great win, but carried no money with it. Lieut. Mortimer of Ottawa got a good lot of money prizes.

Sergeant Blackburn of Winnipeg is second in the Service Rifle Championship, and Sergeant Mitchell of Hamilton third. Other Canadians stand as follows in this competition: Staff-Sergeant Richardson, Vancouver, 13th; Lieut. Morris, Bowmanville, 14th; Sergeant-Major Huggins, Hamilton, 26th; Sergeant Freeborn, Hamilton, 30th; Lieut. Smith, Chatham, 41st.

Blackburn's prize in this match is the silver jewel. The other Canadians above get a bronze jewel.

The prizes are awarded to competitors with best scores in the grand aggregate (short ranges), Elkington (long ranges aggregate), and Martins (rapid-fire aggregate).

In the Martin Challenge Cup Competition Canadians were placed as follows: Morris, Bowmanville, 10th; \$25; Mitchell, Hamilton, 23rd; \$10; Stack, Truro, 41st; Richardson, Victoria, 78th; Mortimer, Ottawa, 96th; Huggins, Hamilton, 107th; Jones, P.E.I., 102nd; all make \$10.

In the Harmsworth, Blackburn, Winnipeg, 17th, \$5.

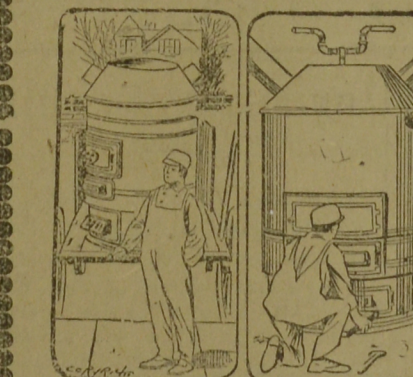

WILL EXPOSE DEAL

John Piche Expected to Turn King's Evidence.

SENSATION IN THE NORTH

Arrest of Former Mayor McKelvie of New Liskeard on Charge of Bribing Prospector to Leave the Country While Suit Was On Creates Great Excitement in Cobalt—Officials Are Reticent.

Cobalt, July 27.—The Hudson Bay Mining Co. case will come before Magistrate Atkinson on Thursday.

The arrest of Angus McKelvie, vice-president of the company, on a charge of giving a bribe to John Piche to clear the country, by which the company was able to get title to the property, has caused much excitement. He was one of the most prominent men in this northern country. He was mayor of New Liskeard for two terms, and was the Liberal candidate in the last provincial election, being defeated by R. T. Shillington. He is also superintendent of the Presbyterian Church, and is said to be worth close to a million dollars. With Thomas McCamus, another director, he owns a large sawmill and tracts of timber berths in this country.

Piche claims that he received only \$6,000 for skipping the country, and that he was to receive \$10,000 a year while away. It is said Piche is ready to expose the whole transaction.

Officials Are Silent.

Toronto, July 27.—Neither Deputy Attorney-General Cartwright nor Provincial Inspector Rogers, who arrested Andrew McKelvie, was willing to discuss the matter at the Parliament buildings yesterday, though it was virtually admitted that Piche's confession led to the arrest. They would neither say whether Piche's confession implicated any one else nor if McKelvie had made a statement when arrested. The Attorney-General is out of the city and could not be seen.

Piche will be the star witness at the hearing of McKelvie's case on Thursday, and it is said he will tell all he knows.

The arrest, it is said, undoubtedly followed a full confession by John Piche, who was charged with accepting a \$25,000 bribe to abstain from giving evidence in an action between the Attorney-General and one Henry Thompson, a real estate man of New Liskeard, regarding the title to the Hudson Bay Mine.

Other arrests are expected to follow.

Navy Campaign Successful.

London, July 27.—The big navy campaign has won the day, and four additional super-Dreadnoughts are to be added to the current year's shipbuilding program.

Reginald McKenna, First Lord of the Admiralty, officially confirmed this statement in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon, saying that after a very anxious and careful examination into the shipbuilding conditions of foreign countries, the Government had come to the conclusion that it was desirable to take all necessary steps to insure the laying down of four additional Dreadnoughts in April, to be completed in March, 1912.

G.T.P. Application Dropped.

Ottawa, July 27.—The application of the National Transcontinental Railway Commission regarding its entrance to Winnipeg and the consequent crossing of the C.N.R. and C.P.R. tracks was to have come before the Railway Commission yesterday afternoon, but was withdrawn.

The transcontinental commission will proceed to Winnipeg next week and an effort will be made on the spot by the interested companies to come to an agreement.

C.N.R. Gets Connection.

Toronto, July 27.—After Aug. 6 the C.N.R. will be able to deliver carload freight from Ontario to points along their western lines, the C.P.R. having agreed to accept the haul between Sudbury and Port Arthur from Toronto to Sudbury and from Port Arthur to Edmonton the C.N.R. have their own line in operation.

Saved Trouble of Suicide.

Philadelphia, July 27.—Death yesterday prevented John P. Rodet, aged 65 years, a veteran of the civil war, from committing suicide. After climbing on a barrel, tying a noose about his neck and attaching the other end of the rope to a spike in the wall, he was stricken with heart disease.

IMPROVE RURAL CONDITIONS.

Some Extracts From an Able Address by Dr. J. W. Robertson.

Dr. James W. Robertson, so well and favorably known in New Brunswick, the principal of Macdonald College, St. Anne de Bellevue, Quebec, is now through the invitation of Educational Associations, Provincial Governments and Canadian Clubs visiting various western centres and delivering addresses in the interest of rural education.

Early this month he spoke at a meeting of the National Educational Association of the United States at Denver, Colorado, and from press reports he evidently made as he usually does, a powerful impression upon his auditors.

The Denver Daily News says of his address:

"For the first time since the beginning of the general sessions of the National Educational Association, the doorkeepers at the auditorium yesterday enforced the rule that only members of the Association should be admitted to the meeting.

"Notwithstanding this restriction, the session yesterday was more largely attended than many of the previous meetings. The theatre portion of the auditorium was crowded and the enthusiasm ran high.

"Cheer upon cheer greeted the epigrammatic address of Dr. James W. Robertson, president of Macdonald College, of Quebec, who spoke upon Education for the improvement of rural conditions.

"Dr. Robertson has done more than any man in America toward the improvement of rural schools and conditions, said President Harvey in introducing the principal speaker, and he is attracting the attention of the world by his work for Canadian rural education."

Following are a few extracts from Dr. Robertson's address:

"Farming is not breaking clods, it is the gathering up of the sunshine into cornstalks and grass and trees and saving it for the race."

"People who live on the land are partners of the Almighty in making homes while they are getting something to eat."

"Many of us could devote less attention to the Greek root aim more to the corn root."

"Man began life in a garden, and for all time for every successive genera-

tion, the best starting place will be a garden where the children can play in the grass and plant flowers and gather apples."

"It may be that Christ could have taught without manual training; I don't know as to that, but he did not."

"To belittle teachers is national suicide, for belittling them means belittling the children of the nation which is its hope."

"The people who dwell on farms are the ones that rear the children that rule the nations. Anything that makes for the improvement of their education and conditions makes for the improvement of the race. For 30,000 years we have been making efforts to secure a better home for the child, of whom the Master said 'of such is the kingdom of heaven.'"

"Rural education is not concerned chiefly with the growing of a bigger stalk of corn or a bigger steer, but with the training for life in the locality and for the present."

"Man is helping God by helping to make the land a cleaner and better place for homes, not in building great temples, great waterways or coal mines, but homes."

"One of the greatest hindrances to rural education is the fact that farmers and the schools are not in sympathy. Too much attention is paid to making the curriculum fit that of the high schools and teachers forget that their work is the helping of making a life rather than making a living. The idea that a rural school curriculum is for the purpose of making every boy believe that he has the opportunity to become a college president is a humbug."

"Life, home and the school are the three great realities and teaching is the greatest thing on the face of the earth."

Dr. Robertson has since been speaking at other places in the American west, at the convention of the Dominion Educational Association at Victoria, B.C., and is now returning through Canada speaking at Vancouver, Calgary, Edmonton, Regina, Saskatoon and Winnipeg. Some of the addresses will be delivered under the auspices of the various provincial governments; others under those of the Canadian Clubs.

Yesterday being a nice warm day, the hay makers took advantage and a great streak of hay was done. Today the air is filled with the odor of new mown hay.

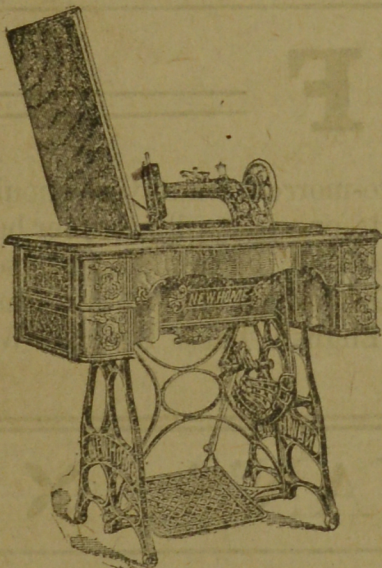
