A TORY THREAT.

A correspondent, who is evidently pretty close to the Hazen government publishes a long and abusive letter in the Standard, in which the following passage appears:

"The supporters of the Hazen government who are 'Conservative' in their tendencies are putting up with much they have no need to put up with but there is such a thing as carrying the joke too far, and in return the war may have to be carried into Africa. I can name many who have not been disturbed in their positions, who deserve decapitation, but Mr. Hazen is not that sort of a political headman unless he be driven to do it."

It is beginning to look as if the reverse the Hazenites recently suffered in St. John County is to be followed by the decapitation of more Liberal officials. The whole Hazen combination is nothing but a joke and the bye-election record would seem to indicate that the electors have no intention of carrying it too far. If Mr. Hazen intends to dismiss more Liberal officials he should lose no time over it as his tenure of office is likely to be a brief one. It will be only natural for him to continue to "pile up wrath for the day of wrath."

CURRENT COMMENT.

Evelyn Nesbitt Thaw seems to have the faculty of appearing in two places at one time. A few days ago we were told by despatches to the St. John papers that she had arrived at Campbellton, purchased a quart of champagne and had then started on a fifty mile trip to the Kedgewick Stream. Yesterday she turned up in court at White Plains, N. J., and listened to evidence in the case of her husband, who is endeavoring to secure his release from the Matteawan Asylum for the criminal insane. Mrs. Thaw is certainly a remarkable woman.

Woodstock Press.—The St. John Valley district has suffered very much for want of a railway. First one farmer leaves a parish, then many others follow. All the valley counties have been depleted of their inhabitants. Schools and churches are only partly filled with scholars and former attendants. Loneliness and discontent settle like a pall over the once prosperous community. In the early days farmers were satisfied to till the soil and merely get a living from the results of their labor. Now it is different. They will not remain on a farm many miles from railway facilities.

Years ago when Canada was younger and when the future was a matter of doubt, Sir Charles Tupper made the prediction that he would live to see the day when the Canadian west would be producing 100,000,000 bushels of wheat annually. This prophecy was greeted with derision by his opponents who, if they were in earnest, thought that the west would remain a wilderness. Sir Charles turned out to be correct.—Sackville Post.—If our memory serves us right Sir Charles was not nearly so modest in his predictions as the Post would have us believe. The prophecy he made years ago was to the effect that the Canadian west would by the year 1990 produce six hundred and forty million bushels of wheat per year. However, the output has doubled in the past thirteen years and another twenty-five years of Liberal rule may witness the fulfillment of Sir Charles' prediction. Sir Charles Tupper is a remarkable man and a great statesman, but he was always a little over sanguine in his predictions, especially at election times.

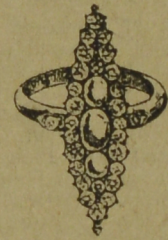
