## CURRENT COMMENT.

We are told by the Parliamentary Companion that our illustrious representative, Mr. C. S. Crockett, M. P., was chairman of the committee which purchased and installed this statue. This is a world of surprises to be sure. Had the monument been erected by the Dominion government and become defective, what a howl Mr. Crockett and his newspaper organ would have set up. They would have made the air blue with charges of graft and the bumptious M. P. would have had ample material for another five hour speech. When great and wise men like Mr. O. S. Crockett can be taken in on a \$5000 transaction there is surely some excuse for the ordinary mortals in the Dominion government who expend millions of dollars every year on public works.

## BRIEFS FROM THE WIRES.

Cleophas Deagan was killed by a fall at Hull, Que.

A negro anti-tuberculosis league has been organized in the Southern States. Spencer Westover, a Belleville carpenter, is under arrest on a forgery charge.

An Italian navy was probably fatally shot in a drunken brawl near Beechwood, N.B.

James Stevenson, ex-M.P. of Peterboro, was in Toronto yesterday. He lunched with Senator Cox.

A Washington magistrate has declared that boys who play marbles "for keeps" are guilty of gambling.

Premier Ward of New Zealand says he feels sure his people will not agree to compulsory military training.

Frank Crane, aged 30, an Australian, was killed by a falling stone in the Temiskaming mine at Cobalt.

The civic authorities of Paragould, Ark., may make it unlawful to be on the streets between midnight and 4 a.m.

Fred Somers was electrocuted by a 60,000 volts current in the power house at Syracuse, N.Y. His body was burned.

The International Tax Association, which met in New York last year, will fight the corporation tax at the Louisville meeting this month.

Summer residents along the St. Lawrence River are objecting to the use of soft coal by the river steamers, factories and hotels, as damaging to property.

After a ministry of 16 months Rev. C. R. Duncan has resigned his charge of the Baptist Church at Sherbrooke, Que. to continue his college course at McMaster University, Toronto.

## Elevator Falls; Man Hurt.

Toronto, Aug. 10.—Because something went wrong with the elevator in the Stewart, Howe and Meek building, at King street and Spadina avenue, Morris Jackson, who was running it, is now in St. Michael's Hospital in a critical condition.

The accident occurred yesterday afternoon. Jackson had taken some of the employees up to the sixth story. When they got out something broke and he fell with the cage to the basement. Several ribs on both sides were broken, and he also sustained a depressed fracture of the skull and a scalp wound about four inches long. The doctor's have not much hope of his recovering. He was still unconscious up to a late hour last night. As he is a new employee the firm does not know much about him.

## Cool Wave Sweeps Toronto.

Toronto, Aug. 10.—The temperature got down to 85 degrees yesterday in Toronto, but the high percentage of humidity was oppressive and made the air seem much warmer. With evening came a cool wave, which will continue to temper the air making it cooler than yesterday.

The Maritime Provinces had some thunderstorms and parts of the west received a similar visitation, while others languished in heat.

Medicine Hat, Saskatchewan, was the hottest place in Canada last night, with the thermometer standing at 92.

## Woman Grapples With Mad Dog.

London, Ont., Aug. 10.—Six little children were playing in the yard when Mrs. William Land noticed a collie snapping its paws and frothing at the mouth. She hurried out, and was putting a rope about its neck when it snapped at her. She held on and succeeded in winding the rope around a cherry tree.

Mrs. Land had to go some distance to get a neighbor with a rifle, and seven shots were fired before the brute died. A veterinary pronounced the case unmistakably rabies.

## Union Typos In Session.

St. Joseph, Mo., Aug. 10.—The fifty-fifth convention of the International Typographical Union convened yesterday in the Coliseum, St. Joseph's big convention hall. Addresses of welcome were made by Mayor Clayton, President Burnham, of the local typographical union, and others, and a response by President Lynch of the International Typographical Union.

The reports of President Lynch and Secretary-Treasurer Hays show great progress made by the union during the last year.

## Canada's Mexican Trade.

Ottawa, Aug. 10.—Although general Mexican trade figures show decreases for last year, the trade of Canada with Mexico increased by \$95,000, while that of Mexico and Canada grew by \$48,000. The chief loss has been in the trade with the United States, which fell off by \$16,500,000.

On Oct. 1 next, a direct parcel post system will be put into operation between Canada and Mexico. At present all parcels are sent via Great Britain.

## Big New Assaying Plant.

Cobalt, Aug. 10.—Mr. Deyssner, representing European capitalists, has purchased 20 acres on the lake shore, near Port Cobalt, and will establish an assaying plant, which will embody radical ideas in the business of separating metals from ore. His engineer is now on the way from Seattle, Wash. The plant, which, it is claimed, will revolutionize mining in the camp.

## Murdered In Cemetery.

Rochester, Aug. 10.—Anna Schumacher, a 17-year-old girl, whose body was found yesterday morning crudely buried in Holy Sepulchre cemetery, was choked and beaten to death after being criminally assaulted. She had gone to strew flowers on her father's grave. There is a suspect for whom the police are looking.

## Priest Supports Strikers.

Sydney, N.S., Aug. 10.—Rev. Father Fraser, the parish priest, Sunday, in the course of his sermon, exhorted the Dominion Coal Co. strikers to stand firm, and vigorously denounced the coal company and the P.W.A.

## Chinese Won't Pay.

Kingsford, Aug. 10.—The Chinese laundrymen have refused to pay the increased fee, from \$5 to \$50, and will be prosecuted. They have engaged counsel.
