STOOD 2,000 VOLTS

Grand Mere, Quebec, Man Has
a Miraculous Escape.

WAS GLUED TO IRON PIPE

Etienne Lefebvre Seizes a Metal Pipe
Heavily Charged With Electricity
and is Forced to Hang on Until
His Shouts Bring Employees to
His Assistance—Power House
Had to Cut Off the Current.

Montreal, Aug. 10.—To receive a shock of 2,000 volts and live to tell the tale is the record of Mr. Etienne Lefebvre, proprietor of the Windsor Hotel, Grand Mere, Que.

With the successful amputation of his right foot and arm, Mr. Lefebvre has more than a fighting chance of recovering, and the surgeons at the Notre Dame Hospital are sanguine that he will soon be able to leave his bed. The operation, which was performed yesterday morning was entirely successful.

About ten days ago Mr. Lefebvre, while taking a last look around his hotel and outbuildings, saw sparks and flashes proceeding from what he thought was his shed. The illuminations seemed confined to the vicinity of a short metal pipe, and he seized it to pull it out of the ground and throw it into vacant space, where it could do no damage. No sooner had his hands closed on the pipe, when his form became rigid, and thus imprisoned, he was held to the electrically-charged post until his shouts sent the hotel employees in search of him.

Realizing that their chief was being electrocuted, one of the men rushed to the telephone and advised the power company what had happened and they immediately cut off the current.

Lefebvre was unconscious and his hands were burned nearly to the bone. For three hours two physicians worked over him.

Ashes Consigned to Sea.

Chicago, Aug. 10.—A metal box containing the incinerated body of Mrs. Ross Payton was sunk in Lake Michigan from the deck of an excursion steamer, while passengers looked on with bared heads and the steamship orchestra played a dirge. Twenty-nine years ago the husband of the steamer Alpena, and the widow wished that her ashes be thrown in the lake near the place of the wreck.

McGuigan Denies It.

Toronto, Aug. 10.—F. H. McGuigan, who is building the Hydro-Electric Commission power line from Niagara Falls to Toronto, denied yesterday the rumor that he has been offered \$25,000 a year to become at the instance of London financiers.

No Flight at Petawawa.

Will Not Stop Traffic.

Toronto, Aug. 10.—Any traffic arrangements the C.N.R. may make with other roads to secure the movement of their freight westward will not be allowed to retard or interfere with the construction of a C.N.R. connecting section between Selwood and Port Arthur. President Mackenzie said yesterday that the C.P.R. was handling the C.N.R. freight between Sudbury and Port Arthur, from which point it was being picked up by the C.N.R. again, but that was an arrangement very common among railways and would not weigh against the completion of an all C.N.R. line at the earliest possible date.

A stretch of line forty miles long from Selwood north towards Port Arthur, Mr. Mackenzie said, was being rushed along now and would be completed before the end of the year.

The president added that satisfactory progress was being made by a gang of surveyors in the readjusting of the route of the Niagara-Ottawa line, which will be started this fall.

Russian-Chinese Entente.

Vancouver, B.C., Aug. 10.—"Russian influence in China is steadily regaining the ground which it temporarily lost after the war, and in a short time the Muscovite will be stronger than ever in Pekin. On the other hand, Chinese antipathy to Japan is becoming increasingly bitter. The Chinese feel that Japan has broken every international rule by her conduct in relation to Manchuria. I have no doubt that the next great war in the Far East will see China and Russia in coalition against Japan."

This interesting statement in regard to international politics in the Far East was made by E. Backus, adviser to the Chinese Minister of Internal Affairs. Mr. Backus has been home to England for a brief holiday.

"The majority of Chinese statesmen feel that the Japanese occupation of Manchuria has been a great breach of faith on the part of the Mikado's empire," continued Mr. Backus, "and in this opinion most Europeans living in the Far East heartily concur."

Girl Charged With Embezzlement.

Brookville, Aug. 10.—The crown only got part way through with the preliminary hearing of the charges against Miss Grace Henderson of Gananoque, of embezzling from the Thousand Island Railway Co. of Gananoque, in whose offices she was employed until January last. Previous to that time shortages had been found, and almost the entire staff was dismissed with. Recent expert investigation of the books led to Miss Henderson's arrest. Yesterday she was committed for trial on a charge of having cashed and applied to her use a check for \$500.

Testimony was introduced to show that she sent a messenger to a bank with the check and that he, after receiving the money, deposited it with the defendant, who was working under the general cashier, John Marshall, who has since left the country. The books show no record of the receipt of the cash.

Canada Wants Own Navy.

London, Aug. 10.—(C.A.P. Cable.)—Sir Fred Borden and Hon. Mr. Brodeur yesterday met Hon. Mr. McKenna, Sir John Fisher and other Admiralty officials in order to discuss certain technical points in regard to Canada's scheme of assistance in Imperial naval defence.

Canada is of the opinion that the Dominion should have a self-supporting navy, which should form an integral part of the Imperial navy in time of emergency, and the other dominions are inclined to the view. That a direct subsidy to Imperial defence should be provided.

Fine technicalities are now being discussed by the committee of experts, and at the close of their deliberations the report will be submitted to the full conference.

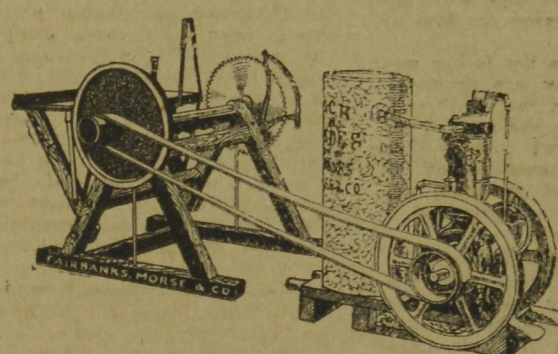
