HANDS ARE WANTED

The Wheat Crop Will Need 23,-
000 Men This Year.

CROP IS ABOVE AVERAGE

It is impossible, however, to say
What the Yield Will Be, Says Win-
nipeg Correspondent—Manitoba
Alone Needs 15,000 Men This
Year—Waiting For Eastern
Hands—Change of Dates.

Winnipeg, Aug. 10.—Regarding a re-
port sent out from here yesterday
that the crop of Western Canada will
be only an average one, and less than
last year's, it is clear that there is
here a terminological inaccuracy, for
the crop of last year was below the
average.

It is impossible just now to figure
on what the general average of the
wheat yield over a country a thousand
miles long and half as deep will be,
but it seems clear that a good average
will be maintained, unless we get
some very early frosts.

To talk of 140,000,000 bushels of
wheat from this country is quite as
absurd as to say that it is a poor,
or even weak, season. It should be a
mighty profitable year for our farmers.
Setting aside alarmist reports, it yet
seems clear that the total damage to
the crops by hail will exceed the aver-
age year, and will really affect the
general average yield per acre. In
some districts, authentic reports state
that hail has been more widely distrib-
uted and more devastating than in
any recent years.

Indeed, it is already evident that
not only has hail damage been wide,
but that it has cut a clean swath in
many districts.

There is, of course, always a ten-
dency to exaggerate hail losses and
districts that in previous years have
been reported at this season as com-
pletely hailed out have often shown
up well, if not brilliantly, at threshing.
Farmers think that a little "knock-
ing" of crop just now may bring them
better cash prices so soon as the rush
of new wheat begins. But even thus
discounting damage reports, enough
certainly remains to show that the
crop as a whole must suffer severely
by hail losses.

Talk of rural storms have been ac-
companied by great heat and warm
showers, bringing the grain along at a
surprising rate so that the season,
after opening so late, can now hard-
ly be described as backward.

Cutting in a Week.
Toronto, Aug. 10.—A hurry-up call
for harvesters was received by the
C.P.R. last night from their western
crop experts, who telegraphed that
cutting will be general next Monday.

The advisability of moving the har-
vesters' excursions ahead a few days
from the dates originally set will be
discussed by the railway and western
Government officials this morning.
The first excursion has been set for
Thursday, the 19th inst., but it is pos-
sible that a few train loads of helpers
will be rushed off within a week.

Manitoba is calling for 15,000 men.
The other provinces, Saskatchewan
and Alberta, have yet to be heard
from officially, but careful estimates
of their needs, show that work for
from 7,000 to 8,000 outsiders will be
offering in those provinces. This
means a demand on the east for about
23,000 of her experienced farm hands.

James Hartney, Toronto, agent for
the Manitoba Government, has just
returned from a visit to Eastern On-
tario, where he stirred up interest in
the western excursions. He reports
that while a large number of people
are manifesting an interest in the ex-
cursions, he believes the lateness of
harvesting here will hold a great num-
ber back and result in an unusually
small contingent for the first excur-
sion. Harvesting in Ontario he found
will not be over before Aug. 20 at the
earliest, and therefore thousands of
farm helpers will not be at liberty to
leave prior to that date.

Last year about 7,000 left Toronto
with the first excursion, making up
five or six trains, but the indications
are that a less number will embark
for the western grain fields next week.
Mr. Hartney points out that the great
bulk of outside help is required to
carry on the threshing, cutting being
done by the farmers and their sons. With
the work of horses and steam. With
a few thousand helpers on the scene
early to man the reapers, the grain
will not suffer damage if threshing
does not commence for a week or two
later, providing that continued rain
and snow storms did not make their
appearance.

New Fruit Company Build Cannery.

St. Catharines, Aug. 10.—J. B. Ber-
ry, Winnipeg, has formed the Ontario
and Western Fruit Co., provisional di-
rectors being James Marlow, Grims-
by, Geo. W. Keyes and W. H. Hough,
St. Catharines, and A. N. Harris, Port
Dalhousie, who will act as president.
E. T. Hern, Port Dalhousie, is secre-
tary.

The company contemplates erecting
a large canning plant.

Jailed for Use of Net.

Brockville, Aug. 10.—Josh Calhoun
was arrested at Grindstone Island by
Game Officer Northrup for the use of
nets, the offence having been com-
mitted on the American side of the river,
he was tried and sentenced to 40 days
in the Watertown, N.Y., jail. Several
other parties have recently paid \$10
fines for catching pickerel and having
them in their possession under 20
inches long.

Lovelorn Youth Shoots Himself.

Harrisboro, N.S., Aug. 10.—Because
a lady friend refused to go walking
with him, Wm. Henwood, aged 18, at-
tempted suicide at West Bay yester-
day, by shooting himself in the breast.
He will die.

Montreal Children Succumb to Heat.

Montreal, Aug. 10.—Due to warm
weather, there were 125 children, un-
der five years of age, who died last week
out of a total of 194 deaths in the
city.

TURKS ARE DETERMINED.

Are Bound to Prevent Greece From
Annexing Island.

Washington, Aug. 9.—Turkey will
stand by what she regards as her
rights in her controversy with Greece,
over the island of Crete. Such is her
attitude as communicated to the United
States State Department and to the
European powers. She is determined
there shall be a return to the condi-
tions preceding the Turko-Grecian
war of a dozen years ago, when four
of the powers of Europe, England,
Russia, France and Italy, landed
troops and despatched ships to pacify
the Cretans.

The decisive policy of the Turkish
Government is ascribed to the pro-
gressive and determined attitude of
the new regime in that country as
contrasted with the apparent indif-
ference of the administration of Ab-
dullah Hamid, which made no serious
effort to bring about a settlement of
the anomalous conditions existing in
Crete.

Turkey Delivers Ultimatum.

Athens, Greece, Aug. 9.—The Tur-
kish Government has communicated to
Greece an urgent note asking that she
express her disapproval of the annex-
ation agitation in Crete, and formally
declare that Greece has no ambitions
regarding the island. Otherwise, the
note adds, diplomatic relations will
be severed.

Turkey Determined.

Berlin, Aug. 9.—German Govern-
ment circles regard the situation be-
tween Turkey and Greece as being in
a most acute stage. Germany has
made representations to both Constan-
tinople and Athens, urging the neces-
sity of a peaceable settlement of the
Cretan question.

BRIEFS FROM THE WIRES.

The Kaiser escorted the Czar
through the Kiel Canal on Saturday
night.

A bill for the appointment in Lon-
don of a high commissioner has been
introduced in the Australian Parlia-
ment. The salary is \$20,000 inclusive.

Mary Dunn, an eight-year-old girl
living in Brockville, was terribly burn-
ed on the body and arms by her
clothes igniting while playing with
matches.

Dulmer, the five-year-old son of
Azor Northey of Lakefield, who was
missed during the afternoon Saturday,
was found drowned at the dock yester-
day morning.

George Kirkendale, a farm laborer,
of Aldershot, Ont., was run down by
an engine in the Stuart street yards,
at Hamilton, last night and injured
so badly that he died in the ambu-
lance.

At meetings in London, England, of
the bond and coupon holders of the
Imperial Paper Mills of Canada and
the Northern Sulphite Mills of Can-
ada, the joint sale thereof was sanc-
tioned.

During the temporary absence of
her nurse, Mrs. H. Akery, 28 years
of age, of Port Greville, N.S., who
was recovering from typhoid fever,
committed suicide yesterday by drink-
ing carbolic acid.

The remaining survivors on board
the British steamer Maori, which ran
on the rocks the night of Aug. 4, off
Slang Bay, South Africa, were rescued
