PUBLIC UTILITIES.

Important Subject Discussed by American Municipalities League.

Montreal, Aug. 26.—(Special)—An other civic problem with which Montreal and many other cities have had much experience was discussed this morning at the convention of the league of American municipalities. This was the control of public utilities in cities by boards created by the State. The discussion was introduced by Robert Brennan, city attorney of Des Moines, Iowa, who declared that a national organization worked with the object of securing indeterminate franchises in cities without the consent of the municipalities concerned. Mr. Brennan, Mr. Barty Mahool, Mayor of Baltimore, reported that the people of this city were in favor of a public service commission but he emphasized the need of protecting civic home rules.

Mr. Harry P. Nichols of New York, engineer in charge of the bureau of estimates, then spoke. He dealt with the financial aspects of the problem, and said that the chief objections to the commission in New York rose out of the power of the commission to collect its costs of maintenance, against the will of the city, which pays the largest share of the expense. In connection with the franchise question he stated that New York had home rule in that regard, except for the rapid transit underground. He declared himself in favor of commission government, provided the city mission be kept out of politics.

WITNESSES FROM MONCTON.

Will Testify at Preliminary Examination of B.uce McDougall.

Moncton, Aug. 26.—(Special)—There will be witnesses from Moncton to attend the preliminary examination of Bruce McDougall in the St. John police court. Already summons have been received by Postmaster Crandall, Canadian Express Manager Newman and Chief Rideout, who will go to St. John tomorrow morning.

P. E. I. TO SUPPRESS IT. Charlottetown, Aug. 26.—(Special)—Acting on the advice of the attorney general, Mayor Prouser has instructed Marshall Cameron to seize any copies of Free Speech, offered for sale, and to arrest the vendors. The names of correspondents are in the possession of authorities, who are contemplating action against them.

AN INHUMAN ACT.

Colored Man Fined Ten Dollars for Brutally Killing a Cat.

At the police court this morning a colored man named Tyler Hudin forfeited \$10 for cruelty to animals. This is the first case of the kind to come before the Magistrate. Hudin was at the circus grounds yesterday afternoon. He picked up a cat which was wandering around the grounds and wheeled the animal over his head, holding it by the hind legs. He then kicked the unfortunate animal to death and wound up his brutal performance by striking at some bystanders with the lifeless body of the feline. He was arrested but made a deposit of ten dollars and was released.

At the police court this morning Ald. Winslow, counsel for the S. P. C. A. and Mr. James Roberts, the society's representative here, were present but the cat-killer did not show up. The police magistrate in speaking of the case stated that it was most inhuman. In future the laws against cruelty to animals will be strictly enforced, and cases of over-driving lame horses and similar acts will be severely dealt with.

One man was sent to jail for five days for drunkenness and another made a deposit.

A PECULIAR CASE.

Toronto, Aug. 26.—(Special)—An extraordinary occurrence happened at 127 John street yesterday when Mrs. Mary Pearson gave birth to a child while under the influence of an epileptic convulsion to which she is subject. When the woman regained consciousness she found the child had died. The coroner after an investigation decided an inquest unnecessary.

THE JURY DISAGREED.

They Stood Six to Six in Free Speech Case at St. John.

St. John, Aug. 26.—Before Judge Forbes in the county court yesterday afternoon the jury disagreed in the case of George Merisses, the Greek indicted for circulating Free Speech. The jury divided equally, six for conviction and six for acquittal. Judge Forbes regretfully discharged the jury, claiming the disagreement was a disgrace on the citizens of St. John.

Mr. Hazen refused to allow the prisoner to go and moved for a new panel. Merisses will be retried today at 2.30.

Mr. Mullin started to address the jury at 4 o'clock. He said that Merisses had been the object of a trap laid by the police. The paper had been sold in the city long before Merisses had anything to do with it. They had allowed Merisses to sell for more than seven weeks without molesting him. In view of the circumstances it was only fair that the accused should have been warned. The boy was earning an honest living selling this paper along with others, in many cases getting more for the sale of the others than he was from Free Speech. Lucas, said Mr. Mullin, went to the store in a quiet, casual way and said the paper was immoral. If he had gone then and said, this paper is immoral and if you persist in the sale of it you will be prosecuted, the matter would have been different.

The question is, Mr. Mullin said, were the paragraphs sufficiently brought to the knowledge of the accused. The word obscene was no in the charge brought in the police court when the officer's mind was fresh in reference to the conversation, but it had been put in afterwards. Mr. Mullin made a strong plea for the acquittal of the accused. Attorney-General Hazen said that sympathy was all right in its place but it was nobler in this case for a jury to rise above sympathy and give a true verdict according to their oaths. If sympathy ruled juries things would soon be in a state of chaos.

Lucas went, said Mr. Hazen, on July 31 and read the articles to the accused. The prisoner said, "It is all right; they are true." He was desirous of the law and it was the officer's duty to take measures to enforce it. The prisoner, said the attorney-general, contradicted nearly every witness. Who are you going to believe?

The attorney-general called upon the jury from the standpoint of justice to weigh the evidence carefully and give a verdict accordingly. Judge Forbes charged very strongly against the prisoner. He said the prisoner had been here for years, which will be used today may help most of that time in business, and freshen his recollection with respect there was no reason why he should to the identity of some of those not be as amenable to the law as who helped in the correspondence.

Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 26.—(Special)—Hon. T. M. Daley, police magistrate has often advocated the lash for wife beaters, but yesterday was the first time he imposed it. He sentenced F. Rich to twelve lashes and three months in jail.

YACHTS HELD FOR DUTY.

Toronto, Ont., Aug. 26.—(Special)—Amelius Jarvis and George Gooderham whose yachts were held for duty as they were American yachts sailing in Canadian waters, will appeal to the customs board. The amount involved is about \$12,000.

St. John, Aug. 26.—(Special)—In the cricket match up till 2 p. m. St. John in the first inning scored 35 runs while Fredericton with only three wickets down made 50 runs.

NORRIS AND ROWE'S CIRCUS.

Big Tent Well Filled at Afternoon Performance--Short Change Artists Were Busy.

The Greater Norris and Rowe circus gave two good performances here on Wednesday. The main tent was well filled at the afternoon performance, and the audience was well satisfied. The show was a good one and clean. Some of the features were among the best ever seen here, and all were well above the average. There were a number of very good acts in the ring, the bicycle and tight wire stunts, and gymnastic features being particularly good. The acrobatic feats of the Schenick family on the elevated stage was also good. The menagerie is well selected, and the animals, although the variety is not large, were good specimens of their kind. The show carried a number of particularly fine horses.

A heavy downpour of rain interfered somewhat with the success of the evening performance, and the attendance was not large. The museum attracted quite a number of people during the afternoon, and appeared to be quite up to the average. The "Salome" dance was prohibited by the police, much to the disappointment of some local sports, who were quite willing to put up the necessary cash to see it.

Some rascally ticket sellers worked the "short change" game to good advantage during the afternoon and early part of the evening. This is one of the oldest gags in connection with the show business, and although it has been frequently exposed, the crop of suckers does not appear to diminish.

In the afternoon a man from the country who obligingly changed some money for a ticket seller at the latter's request, was separated from the game on a local lumberman and a sausage manufacturer, evidently mistaking them for farmers, but they refused to be taken in. In a number of other cases, however, the game was successfully worked.

The circus train, which consists of twenty-seven cars, left late last night for Woodstock by way of McAdam Junction.
