HARRIMAN RETURNS

Sick Magnate Reaches New York After Trip.

HE IS STILL VERY FEEBLE

Railroad Napoleon For Whose Arrival the Stock Markets Have Been Marking Time Will take a Rest Before Launching on Another Campaign of Expansion—Gone to His Summer Home.

New York, Aug. 25.—Edward H. Harriman, genius of finance, leader of men, and master builder of railroads, came back to the United States yesterday, while the financial world stood on its tiptoes in anxiety and expectancy.

He came back as he left on June 1st last, a sick, tired man, seeking health.

Last night, surrounded by his family and physicians at his magnificent, though uncompleted summer home at Arden, on the Hudson, he has begun the "after cure," which he needs after the exhausting baths and dietetic treatment he underwent at the Austrian resort, Bad Gastein. How long he will remain in seclusion, how long it will be before he resumes the active direction of his vast railroad interests, depends solely upon his health.

He arrived yesterday feeble, face gaunt, and voice weak. "And I have come home," he said, "for a cure and not for work."

Many great Americans have returned to their country's shores under extraordinary circumstances, but never has there been a more remarkable home-coming of a private citizen than E. H. Harriman's.

Great stock market operators paused as his ship drew near, the stock itself marked time, and the industrial world turned its eyes seaward, as it were, eager for a glimpse of the face of the man whose illness abroad has furnished much material for stock market rumors.

Contrary to expectations, the financier did not leave the Kaiser Wilhelm II. down the bay, but remained on board until the vessel docked at Hoboken. Then, after being assisted ashore, he boarded a Southern Pacific tug and was taken to Jersey City, where he was again assisted to his private car. From there the trip was quickly made up the Hudson to his mountain home at Arden.

Then, reclining on a couch, pale and enfeebled, but with his usual optimism and tenacity of mind, he talked to an audience of more than a score of newspaper men before leaving for Arden.

Turning to railroad matters, one of the first questions asked concerned his reported option on a controlling interest in New York Central stock, an option which would give him with his other railroads, an unbroken line of steel east and west from coast to coast.

"That is an easy one," said the financier, smiling, "but I would not tell you if I had."

"Do you mean to put the surplus earnings into the roads rather than to turn them over to the stockholders?" he was asked.

"Yes, that's about it," he said, "that is my plan—construction and development—and I guess the public and the press are convinced now that I am not a speculator; it was a hard three years. I wish I could wipe them out, but I am through with that now."

Mr. Harriman would not say just what new undertakings he proposed, "but," said he, "it is in my mind to open up new territory and to build new tributary lines. This means new settlements and more people."

Gramophone Can't Be Stopped by Law.
Kingston, Aug. 25.—Robt. Lipman, owner of the Princess Theatre, was in court yesterday for infraction of civic ordinance recently for running his gramophone to the disturbance of citizens. The council thought it had the matter clinched, but the magistrate after hearing the evidence decided that the noise was not unusual and dismissed the complaint. He said the whistling by steamers in the harbor might be disturbing, but it was not unusual, and the same applied to gramophones.

French-Canadian Congress Postponed.
Ottawa, Aug. 25.—The French-Canadian Educational Congress, which was to have been held in Ottawa next month, has been postponed till some time in November. Over 400 delegates are expected in the city for the Congress and some very prominent figures in French-Canadian political, professional and religious circles will attend.

Launch Afire; Occupants Saved.
Montreal, Aug. 25.—A yachting party had a narrow escape from death near Sorel. They were on board the gasoline launch, Alfred, belonging to Alfred Pelouin, when the boat took fire, and before the boat could be headed for an island and the people saved by jumping into the water, several had been severely burned.

Saved By Heroic Mother.
Kingston, Aug. 25.—Unable to swim a stroke herself, Mrs. C. I. Baltic, wife of an employee of the Royal Military College, last night leaped into 16 feet of water to rescue her two-year-old son, Charlie, who was sinking for the last time. Mrs. Manning, a neighbor, saved both lives by extending a long pike pole.

WRECKED IN PACIFIC

Australian Liner Brings Story of Terrible Sufferings.

Victoria, B. C., Aug. 25.—Few more tragic tales of the sea are on record than that brought by the steamer Makura this morning from Australia of the wreck of the Norwegian bark Brorot, which struck the Middleton Reef June 18, and the sufferings of the survivors.

Five remained of 22 when they were rescued, so emaciated from thirst and starvation that they had to be carried.

The Makura brings detailed stories of their vain struggles to find water on the reef, their unsuccessful search for a cache of provisions and a lifeboat maintained there prior to 1892 and which the sailing directions stated to exist, their abandonment of hope and subsequent delirium.

Captain Anderson and the second mate drowned while building a raft, while his wife and children looked on, and finally after others had succumbed and the remainder were weak from starvation, the captain's wife drowned her four children, aged from one to eight, under the impression that the five survivors were planning to resort to cannibalism, and she followed the children into the waves.

Patrick Palmer, one of the survivors, in relating his story, said: There was another wreck on the reef and we thought it was a store ship. We boarded it, but found nothing to eat. It was musty, old and all it held was a bottle with about two gills of water that must have been there for years by the horrible taste it had.

"I and the carpenter drank that. We afterwards found some more water, and although it was in a bad state, we drank it. We then decided to build a punt from the wreckage, and while we were working at this we lived on shell fish."

MAY BE ANN ODELIA

New York Priestess Thought to Be Mme Diss de Bar.

Windsor, Aug. 25.—The "Flying Rollers" here, the remnant of what was a flourishing colony, are agog over the operations of a self-styled occult priestess, who is holding forth in New York, and claiming to furnish the long sought Elixir of Life by which its devotees may live forever.

She is thought to be none other than "Mother Elinor," or Ann Odelia Diss de Bar, who for a time assumed charge of the Flying Rollers here. She is aided, too, by a young man she calls David, whose description is like that of David McKay, with whom the priestess eloped from here two or three years ago.

Thirteen women and four men attended her first meeting, according to a writer in a New York newspaper. On a throne, under an artificial rubber plant, they found a large woman dressed in silk robes, who in a speech informed the flock that the cardinal dogma of the faith was that any who followed its teachings might live forever.

"Mother Elinor" had a sensational career. She left New Orleans some years ago with Theodore Jackson, with whom she went to England and was sentenced to seven years for teaching immoral living. In the Old Country she came in contact with "Prince Michael," leader of the Flying Rollers, and came to Windsor to become queen of the colony here, but her exposure followed soon after, and she disappeared.

Babe Smothered in Carriage.
London, Ont., Aug. 25.—While in a carriage on the veranda yesterday afternoon, the 5-months-old son of P. H. Scott, 751 Richmond street, rolled over on its face and smothered to death. The mother had left it for only a few minutes.

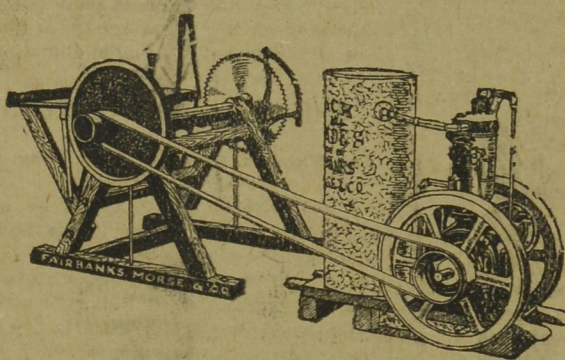
