MANY STRANGE DISCOVERIES.

Deposed Sultan of Turkey Had Strange Devices for Protecting His Life.

According to the Paris correspondent of the Temps, on Monday, the fallen Sultan Abdul Hamid, is beginning to get accustomed to his new life in his prison villa at Salonika. He was very nervous at first, but now seems interested in the simple things which surround him, sometimes going for a walk in the garden, and asking the names of the flowers. Of the women of the harem who have accompanied the master, two girls, aged fourteen and fifteen years respectively, are installed as his favorites.

In the meantime extraordinary discoveries have been made in Yildiz Kiosk, and go far to prove the many stories told of Abdul's strange devices to protect his life and wealth.

To get the safes open a clever locksmith was brought from Pera. As soon as he began to work on one of them he warned all present to stand away, as he feared an explosion. As soon as the door began to turn on its hinges detonations were heard, came from pistols placed in the safe, which were fired automatically when the safe was tampered with.

The eunuch Nadid, from whom information is being extracted, concerning the Sultan's secrets, was taken through the apartments of the palace with his hands fastened and soldiers all around him, all the advances being made with the utmost precautions, because it was well known that there were all kinds of traps and ambushes which the eunuch alone knew, and into which he could let those accompanying him fall.

In that part of the palace where the Sultan resided there were found rooms with doors hidden in the wall, hidden rooms, moveable planks in the

floors, with pits full of spikes, and other kinds of diabolical inventions. These were also lay figures found representing Abdul Hamid and admirably made. They were used to hide his presence in one part of the palace, being placed so as to give the idea to people outside that he was reading in a certain room or sleeping.

In the cellar of one of the greatest palaces were found innumerable elephants' tusks. The strong box, containing the silver, jewellery, account books, and bank books referring to deposits in foreign banks, that in the Deutschebank, amounting to £2,000,000, was transferred to the Minister of War.

One of the reports made by the parliamentary committee taking the inventory of Yildiz Kiosk mentions the discovery of a number of foreign and Turkish bonds in the clothing of Prince Kalim, the son of Abdul Hamid, who accompanied his father into banishment. The clothes were searched because they were being forwarded for the use of the prince at Salonika.

Another find consisted of numerous papers and reports contained in a large sum in 500 round notes, which were scattered about between papers, strong-room, among which was a telegram from Belgrade published in Vienna on Monday Prince Burhan-ed-Din, son of the ex-Sultan, Abdul Hamid, intends to organize a rising in Albania, and to march on Salonika at the head of an Albanian army to set his father free.

SEA LORD TO RETIRE.

Admiral John Fisher to Sever Connection With British Navy October 1st.

London, May 27.—It is reported that Admiral Sir John Fisher, senior naval lord of the Admiralty, will retire in October, at the completion of five years as First Sea Lord. It is an open secret that the Admiral has been very much annoyed by the recent criticisms of his administration. The Mirror says it is able to confirm the report, and declares that Vice-Admiral Sir Arthur Wm. Moore, commander-in-chief of the China station, will succeed him as senior naval lord of the Admiralty.

Sir John Fisher, who was appointed First Sea Lord of the Admiralty in 1904, has been in the British navy for 55 years, and is now 68 years old, having been born in 1841.

Sir John is famous for many things, but perhaps his name will most be remembered in the future for his membership of the famous "Committee of Three"—the others being Lord Escher and Sir George Clark—who produced the scheme on which the army is now being reformed. Admiral Fisher, the son of a captain in the old 78th, is the strongest man of the British navy, which, indeed, he practically created, for he was controller in some critical years and always kept his end up. Once he and Mr. Brodrick were guests at a city dinner, and he politely but firmly contradicted the whole theory of the function of the army which the then War Secretary propounded.

He entered office as a reformer, and one of the first results of his presence at Whitehall was the new scheme of strengthening the fighting force and the intellect of the navy.

For the past few years Sir John and Lord Charles Beresford have been the storm centres in a controversy on matters of naval policy, and both sides had their following in high official circles. Lord Charles was recently retired from his command, and in view of his advancing years it seems but a matter of a short time when Sir John would have to make way for younger blood.
