WILL DO HER SHARE.

Canada Willing to Expend Millions for Naval Defence.

OTTAWA, May 28.—A naval matter has not been finally settled by military expert will accompany Canada's representatives to the imperial defence conference in London. The date of the conference has not been finally settled, but it will be held some time during the month of July. Sir Frederick Borden will be accompanied by General Sir Percy Lake, chief military advisor to Canada, and Hon. L. P. Brodeur will have as his advisor Rear Admiral Kingsmill, commander of the Dominion fishery protective fleet. It is understood that the Canadian representatives will take to London a definite proposal in the form of a tentative program for making a beginning with the Canadian navy. The government has been approached for torpedo boat destroyer orders by Hawthorne, Leslie & Co., of Newcastle-on-Tyne. They have built extensively for the British government, the well known destroyer "Viper" being one of their craft.

CANADIAN COLORED COTTON.

President Morrice Reports Falling Off in Sales Last Year.

MONTREAL, May 28.—The annual meeting of the Canadian Colored Cotton company was held today. The report of the directors was presented, giving the result of the operations in connection with the business of the company for the year ending March 31, 1909. Mr. D. Morrice, the president, stated that on account of the dull condition of trade, and rather than accumulate goods, the entire plant of the various mills controlled by the company, was idle 22 per cent of the time. The shipments of goods to the trade for the year amounted to \$2,354,608, as against \$2,967,338 for the previous year, showing a shrinkage of sales to the extent of \$612,730. The company, however, after paying bond interest and a dividend of 4 per cent, was able to carry an amount of \$14,366.53 to the credit of profit and loss, after writing off the usual amount for repairs and betterments. The president reported that business had not yet returned to its normal condition, and hence the company was still curtailing production—a policy which would be continued until conditions warranted the running of full time. It was also stated that on account of keen competition from England and the United States, prices at which goods were sold were exceptionally low, particularly in view of the fact that raw cotton was held at an exceedingly high figure. The company has in operation 3,110 looms, 113,600 spindles and employs over 2000 hands. Their wage account last year amounted to \$633,000. The report of the directors was adopted and the old board was re-elected namely: D. Morrice, Sir George Drummond, Sir Edward Clouston, Theophilus King, Senator F. L. Beique, George Caverhill, D. Morrice Jr., A. A. Morrice and A. O. Dawson. At a subsequent meeting of the board, the following officers were elected: D. Morrice, president; Sir George Drummond, vice-president; among the shareholders present were D. R. McCuaig, A. Bruce, E. J. Lichtenstein, A. G. Watson, W. J. Morrice, L. H. Archambault, R. MacDonald, James A. Ogilvy, J. J. Pangman, Hugh N. Watson and A. Haig Sims. (The cotton mill at Marysville is owned by the Canadian Colored Cotton Company.)

At Sussex, beginning June 29—8th Hussars, 19th Battery, C. F. A., Corps of Guides, No. 8 detachment, Royal Canadian Regiment, H. Co., 71st Regiment, 73rd Regiment, 74th Regiment, each one company; signaling corps, No. 8 section, Canadian army service corps, No. 7 company; permanent army medical corps detachment, No. 8 field ambulance, Canadian ordnance corps, No. 8 detachment.

At Woodstock, June 29—10th Battery, C. F. A.; Canadian Engineers, 1st field company; 67th Regiment, one company.

At Newcastle, June 29—12th Battery, C. F. A.

At Digby, N. S., June 02—7th Regiment C. G. A., No. 2 battery.

CARLETON ELECTION CASE

(Telegraph.)

Before His Honor Judge McLeod in chambers yesterday the Carleton Co. election case again came up. A. B. Connell, K. C., appeared on behalf of the petitioner, Wm. J. Owets, the defeated government candidate at the local bye-election in Carleton county, and Hon. W. P. Jones, K. C., for George W. Upham, M. P. P. the respondent. Mr. Connell applied for an order to have the date of the trial fixed.

Mr. Jones opposed the granting of the order on the following grounds:

1.—That there was not sufficient publication of the petition as required by law. The act requires that the petition shall be posted in the office of the registrar of deeds and in this case it was posted in a recess outside the door of the county building. The county building contains, besides the registry office, the chambers of the county court judge and a number of offices of county officials.

2.—That even if the posting was sufficient it was too late as it was not done until twenty-seven days after the petition was filed, and the law provides that it shall be posted forthwith. At the conclusion of the argument his honor overruled the objections, saying that he thought the provisions of the act had been reasonably carried out. On Monday afternoon at 3.30 o'clock the date of trial will be fixed.

Mr. Connell has taken out a summons calling upon the respondent to show cause why date for trial should not be extended. This matter will be argued at 2.30 p. m. of the same day.

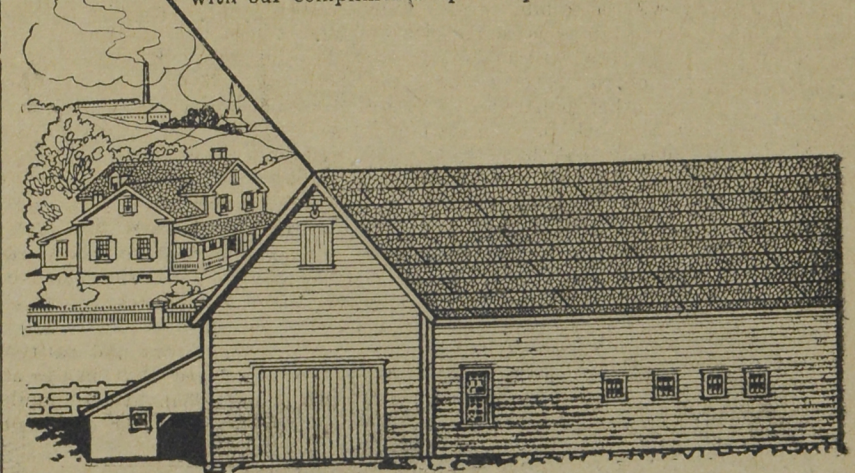
