TWO FATALITIES.

A Van Buren despatch says that two employees of the St. John Lumber company lost their lives by accident at that place on Friday.

Joseph Berube of Edmundston, N. B., was drowned while running logs at the sorting gap of the company. He was 35 years old. His body was recovered.

Another employee, named MacAlber, died tonight from injuries received in the mill today. He was 20 years old and lived here.

POLICE COURT.

Two girls, who were arrested yesterday for running the street, were before the police magistrate this morning, and were remanded until Tuesday next, when they will be dealt with. One of the girls, whose name is Irene Nelson, was before the court early in the week. The other girl's name is Donnelly, and the Salvation Army officers are trying to arrange to have the latter young woman sent to the Salvation Army home at St. John. Both girls are about seventeen years of age.

A drunk from Marysville was fined three dollars and costs or five days' jail, and went to jail.

A NEW COURT HOUSE.

The contract for building the court house at Woodstock was awarded by the building committee on Friday to R. A. Corbett, St. John, for \$21,930, which includes repairs to the record office. A forest fire, which at one time looked as if it might attain to serious proportions, has been burning on land at Meductic, owned by Mr. W. S. Tompkins. It was set by a neighbor who was clearing land. A force of fifty men were fighting all day Friday. Chief Fire Warden Dean left for the scene on Friday evening. Forest fires are also burning at Fredericton Junction and other points, but it is believed that the rain will be the means of stamping them out.

MAY BE MURDER.

Woman Assaulted by Taxi Man Expired Suddenly.

Halifax, N.S., May 28.—Percy Wallace, a young man of 32, will likely stand trial on a charge of murdering Mrs. Samuel Harrison tonight. He is a prisoner and is held for the crime, pending the report of the coroner who is making an investigation.

The assault, which ended in the death of the woman, was most brutal. Mrs. Harrison had been working in the upholstering apartment of the Nova Scotia Furnishing Company's factory, till 10 o'clock, and as she was emerging from the door, Wallace came along, caught her round the throat and forced her back through the door, throwing her to the floor.

Screams brought help and Wallace was put out but he got back, made a second attack on the woman, cutting her face and digging his fingers deep into her neck. The police arrived and Wallace was taken in charge and the woman in the brief moments of life that remained was able to identify Wallace as the man who assaulted her. Then she fell back dead.

Wallace was drunk and shortly before had tried to force an entrance into a nearby house. He will come up for examination tomorrow. The woman's body was taken to an undertaker's room whither her daughter had been summoned. She said her mother was 50 years old.

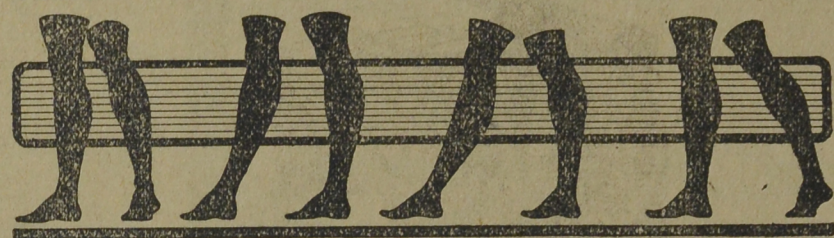
VALUABLE CLAIMS.

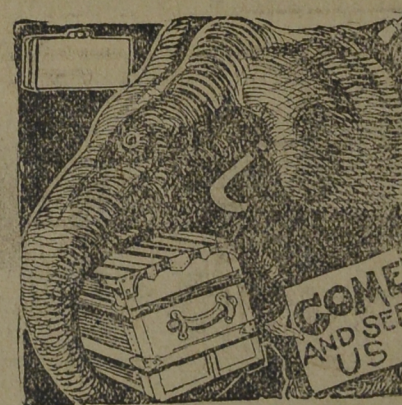
