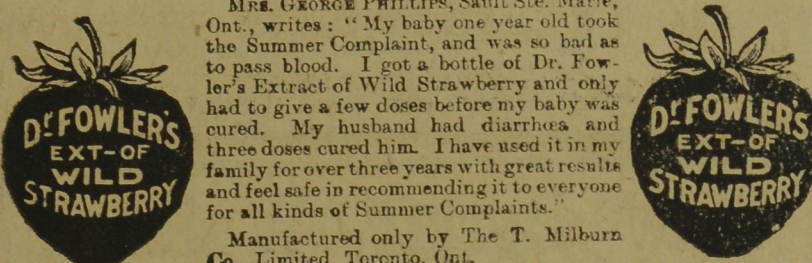

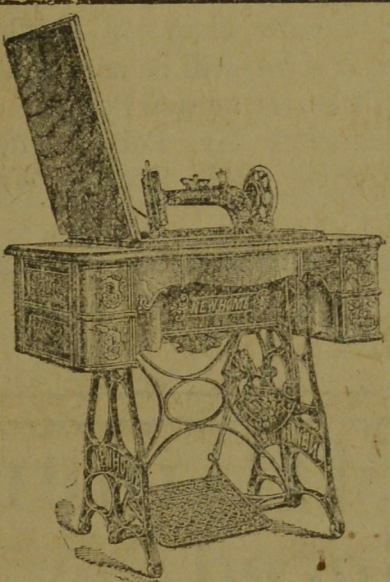

Hamilton Pair Accused.

New York, July 29.—Lester Frank-
lin Barry, and his wife Theresa Mil-
ler Barry of Hamilton, Ont., were
arraigned in the Yorkville Police
Court here yesterday, on a charge of
attempted blackmail, brought by Sam-
uel Meyers, a former deputy sheriff
of Schenectady, N.Y.

Four letters alleged to have been
written by the couple, in which money
was demanded from Meyers, form the
basis of the complaint.
According to Mr. Meyers, who is
78 years old, he met Mrs. Barry, who
is only 20 years old, in Broadway
about five weeks ago. He saw her
several times within the next few
days. Then letters came to Meyers,
purporting to be from Mrs. Barry's
father, demanding \$10,000. Barry and
his wife were held in \$3,000 bail for
examination on Friday.

memorial to the late Sir Oliver Mowat.
The building will be two storeys and
cost \$12,500.

TERROR IN BARCELONA.

Spanish City Is In Throes of Big
Insurrection.

Madrid, July 29.—The revolution in
Catalonia has reached a serious stage.
There is much bloodshed, and artil-
lery has been employed in the streets
of Barcelona to quell the outbreaks.
The city is terror-stricken. The revo-
lutionists are reported to be fighting
desperately behind barricades. The
troops include mounted artillery and
the defenses of the rebels have been
ruled with shot.

The greatest iniquity exists in
Madrid.

King Alfonso was closeted until a
late hour with Premier Maury, and
an official note was issued, saying
that the situation was exceedingly
grave, and that the rebellion must be
repressed with an iron hand, as the
Catalonians were struggling to end
all Spanish revolutionists.

The armored cruisers Amador
Carlos V. and Prince de Asturias, and
three destroyers have been ordered to
Barcelona.

From Pro-Boer to Premier.

Hon. John Merriman, whose Privy
Counsellorship heads the recent list
of Birthday honors, is one of the most
prominent figures in Cape politics. He
was one of the strongest pro-Boers at
the time of the South African war,
but in spite of this was made Premier
of the Cape last year. No one can
deny his brilliant ability, and Somers-
setshire—the county of his birth—has
good reason to feel proud of him. His
father was the Bishop of Graham's-
town, known as the City of Saints, on
account of its many churches. It was
there that Mr. Merriman received his
early education, afterwards coming to
England and entering Oxford Univer-
sity.

THE VALUE OF A SPLIT LOG.

If the government statistics are de-
pendable there are in the United
States about two million miles of
earth road, or enough to encompass
the earth eighty times. The problem
of keeping them in an ever-recurring
one and not in many places has, it
been satisfactorily solved. In search-
ing for a remedy we sometimes fol-
low the trail of empiricism so eager-
ly as to overlook the simple relief
that all the while confronts us. It
may be so in this case, and if one
of misplaced confidence the govern-
ment must bear a large share of the
responsibility, because it has issued
a bulletin commending what is called
the "split-log drag" and describing
its proper construction. Any indi-
vidual or community desiring a copy
can get one free by applying to the
local congressman.

This simple device is not new. Its
virtue has been proclaimed before,
but it is comparatively unknown in
this part of the country. Some
years ago a Missouri farmer, named
Batterton, with an enthusiasm for
road making, was accustomed to hitch
a drag of this construction to his
wagon when he drove to town. It
took him but a little more time to
make the trip with this "split-log
drag" and in a few months he had
that was better than most of the
rock-bedded kind. It naturally at-
tracted attention, resulting in a
"brotherhood of good road drag-
gers," which recently held a celebra-
tion, with a parade half a mile long
to give emphasis to its achieve-
ments. The Legislature of the State has
passed a resolution proposing to sub-
mit to the people the question of
leaving a tax of half a mill on
each dollar of assessed valuation to
set apart and apportioned to each
county for road dragging. In a dif-
ferent way the Legislature of Wis-
consin has made provision for a sim-
ilar service.—Boston Transcript.

WHOLE TOWN ARMS

Michel, B.C., Confronted by Black
Hand Threats.

SEVERAL UNDER SUSPICION

Letters Demanding Money Are Re-
ceived by Several Residents and
Extra Police Are Sworn In—Ita-
lians in Town Stop Work and
Carry Weapons to Fight Des-
peradoes in Case of Trouble.

Vancouver, July 29.—Michel, B.C.,
one of the larger coal mining towns
in the Crow's Nest district, was an
armed camp yesterday because of the
activity of the Black Hand Society.
Great excitement has prevailed since
Sunday, when five leaders of the for-
eign miners and business men were
threatened with instant death by the
Black Hand unless they paid \$200
each. In the letters received places
for deposit of the money were desig-
nated, one of them being alongside a
large rock, which is a landmark at
the rear of the Roman Catholic
Church.

Tuesday night the threatened men
turned over the letters to the police
and Provincial Constables Stevenson
and Bulger immediately made an in-
vestigation. The time set for deposit
of the money was between 10 o'clock
Tuesday night and 2 o'clock Wednes-
day morning. Several men were posted
at the designated places and fake
parcels were placed in the hiding
places by the recipients of the let-
ters, but no attempt was made by
the Black Hand gang to claim the
bounty.

Everyone in town is armed and the
Italian people are out to assist the
police in protecting the lives of the
threatened men.

No number of the big colony of
Italian miners is working. Three hun-
dred and fifty armed Italians held a
meeting yesterday afternoon and dis-
cussed the situation. The police force
is being doubled by the swearing in
of specials. Several Italians are un-
der suspicion. They are being closely
watched and any attempt to leave the
city will result in their immediate
arrest.

Calgary, Alta., July 29.—The clos-
ing session of the Union of Munici-
palities of Canada was held here yester-
day morning. Lieut.-Governor Bul-
ger welcomed the delegates, and in
the course of his speech predicted
that owing to the universally good
crops, the west will experience one
of its most prosperous years.
