

A LAW

TO PROVIDE FOR PERMANENT
STREETS AND SIDE-
WALK PAVEMENTS.

Be It enacted
by the Mayor
and
Aldermen
and
commonalty
of
Fredericton
as
follows:

1.—The city council of the City of Fredericton may at any time by resolution order and direct that any street or streets or portion of any street, or any sidewalk or portion of any sidewalk, within the city, be paved with suitable material and in such a manner as shall so far as possible ensure the permanency of such pavement; and upon the adoption of such resolution the work so ordered shall be proceeded with at once under the supervision of the city engineer, a committee thereof or some person appointed by the council for that purpose by the council, or the council may enter into a contract with any person for construction of such work.

2.—The cost of such street pavement or sidewalk pavement shall be borne partly by the owners of the properties fronting on the street or the sidewalk so paved, and partly by the city as follows:

STREET PAVEMENTS.

(a)—In the case of freehold or leasehold property owners or holders not assessed for general purposes in the city and owning or holding property fronting on the street so paved, such owners or owners, holder or holders of property shall pay to the city one-half of the total cost of such street in proportion to their respective frontages thereon.

(b)—The City of Fredericton shall pay the balance of the cost of such street so paved.

SIDEWALK PAVEMENTS.

(c)—In the case of freehold or leasehold owners or holders of property not assessed for general city purposes, and owning or holding property fronting on the sidewalk so paved, such owners or holders shall pay the total cost of such sidewalk in proportion to their respective frontages thereon.

(d)—In the case of freehold or leasehold property owners or holders assessed for general city purposes and owning or holding property fronting on the same side of the street as the sidewalk so paved, such owners shall pay one-half of the total cost in proportion to their respective frontages thereon.

(e)—The City of Fredericton shall pay the balance of the cost of such sidewalk.

3.—(1)—Whenever any such work is ordered by the city council, the city engineer shall make a plan of such street or sidewalk or portion of street or sidewalk as the case may be, so to be paved, showing the frontage thereon of each property, and the name of the owner or holder of each property, and immediately upon the completion of such work, the city engineer shall make a list of the owners or holders of such properties with the frontages of each property and the amount due in respect to each property and sign and file such plan and list in his office, and upon such plan and list being completed, signed and filed as aforesaid, the same shall in any action or proceeding be conclusive evidence of the liability of every person named therein in respect to each property of which he is stated to be the owner or holder for the amount stated in respect to each such property.

(2) Any such plan or list may be amended from time to time by the city engineer, and any such amendment shall in like manner be conclusive evidence of the facts stated therein.

(3) The engineer shall furnish to the city treasurer with a copy of every list and amendments thereof with the date of filing in the office of the city engineer endorsed thereon.

(4) The amount specified in any such list as payable in respect to any such property shall be enforced and collected in the same manner and at the same time, with the same rights and remedies as other city rates and taxes, as provided by the Fredericton Assessment Act, 1907.

4.—(1) The total amount for which any person is liable in respect to any property shall be divided into twenty equal instalments, the first of which shall be due and payable at the same time the next city taxes become due and payable after the said list has been filed in the office of the city engineer, and such amount and any unpaid instalment or instalments shall continue to be a charge against the property and succeeding owners or holders thereof until the same has been fully paid.

(2) To each of said instalments shall be added interest at the rate of five per centum per annum on the amount of principal then remaining unpaid.

(3) A notice stating the amount of such instalment and interest shall be served upon the owner or holder, or the succeeding owner or holder, each year in the same manner as other city tax notices are served.

(4) Any owner shall be at liberty to pay the whole of said instalments at any time with interest to date of payment.

(5) If any property is sold by the city for failure to pay rates and taxes, the city treasurer shall retain from the proceeds of such sale the whole amount due in respect to such land for any street or sidewalk pavement constructed under the provisions of this law.

5.—A law passed the third day of August, 1886, entitled "A Law for the making and repairing of pavements and flagging and assessing the proprietors of real property benefited thereby," is hereby repealed.

Doubted Premier's Check.

Two Mattawa men who came to Ottawa recently to show Sir Wilfrid Laurier a work of woodmen's art in the shape of hand-carving had the unfortunate experience of being jailed in Hull for a few hours owing to suspicions aroused when they attempted to pass a check for \$25 bearing the Premier's signature. The two shantymen, by name Lecompte and Nault, were kindly received by the Premier, who proved himself a true patron of art by giving them a check for \$25 in exchange for the result of their long hours of labor as self-taught woodcarvers. But when they came to cash the check at a Hull butcher store the police were communicated with and the innocent neophytes of art were locked up on a charge of forging the name of the Prime Minister to the check. Explanations followed two hours later from Sir Wilfrid, and the men were released.

Homestead Entries.

Figures compiled by the Interior Department show that during the first ten months of 1903, 31,578 homestead entries were recorded in the west, an increase of 6,273 over the same period in 1907. Americans headed the list with 1,485 entries and English came second with 725.

CANOEIST DROWNS

Chas. Chapman of Trader's Bank
Loses Life at North Bay.

TWO OTHERS ARE RESCUED

Canoe Upsets in Lake Nipissing
While Two of the Young Men Are
Going to Their Cottage and One
Drowns—R. G. Parker Rescues
the Others at Imminent Risk
of His Own Life Yesterday.

North Bay, June 3.—A drowning accident occurred at 8.30 last night, when Charles Chapman, accountant in the Traders' Bank branch here, lost his life in Lake Nipissing, not one hundred feet from shore, about one mile below town. With two companions, G. R. Harris and A. Borrowman, employees, he had paddled down to their cottage on the lake shore yesterday afternoon in a canoe, making preparations to occupy it for the summer. Returning to town in the evening the canoe upset. R. G. Parker, another bank clerk, observed the accident from shore and immediately swam out to where the boys were clinging to the upturned canoe, the water being still very cold from the winter's ice which moved out only two weeks ago. Parker succeeded in bringing the frail craft with Harris and Borrowman to shore, but poor Chapman released his hold and sank. Parker was assisted in his heroic deed by H. Tilley, who waded out until the water reached his chin. Chapman could not swim and the other lads could swim very little.

Chapman was a son of Rev. Mr. Chapman, rector of the Anglican Church at Ailsa Craig, was 25 years old, unmarried, and a talented musician, being organist of St. John's Church, North Bay. He was acting manager of the bank this week in the absence of Manager Thomas Packer, whose wife is very ill in Toronto. The body has not been recovered.

Didn't Have a Fighting Chance.
London, June 3.—(C.A.P. Cable)—R. J. E. Hanson, secretary to Lord Roberts, states that the Toronto cadets only arrived 24 hours before the competition for the Princess of Wales' trophy started. They were quite unfit to participate in the contest and were reluctantly followed to shoot. The winners were F. W. Chandler, King Edward VI. School, Surrey, with 284; Victor Black of the Great Yarmouth School, 270; Harry Grove of the Sir John Cass School, 269, out of the possible 300.

MINISTER OF LABOR.

Hon. W. L. McKenzie King Sworn Into Office.

Ottawa, June 2.—The commandant of the New Brunswick military district, Colonel G. Rolt White, and the commandant of the Prince Edward Island district, Colonel F. S. Moore, have both reached the age limit and are to be retired. This however, will not be done until autumn.

The youngest cabinet minister in the history of Canada, Hon. William L. Mackenzie King, M. P., C. M. G., M. A., LL.D., assumed office as Minister of Labor and Privy Councillor this afternoon at three o'clock. In company with Sir Wilfrid Laurier and in the latter's automobile, Mr. King drove to Government House, where before His Excellency, Earl Grey, he took the oath of office.

Tonight the new minister left for his constituency, North Waterloo, where he will remain for some time. He will take a house in Berlin. The writ for the ensuing bye-election will be issued without delay and it is expected that Mr. King will be re-elected by acclamation.

Born at Berlin on Dec. 17th, 1874, the grand-son of William Lyon Mackenzie, Hon. Mr. King enters the cabinet at the age of thirty-four, the youngest cabinet minister who ever entered the government.

After a distinguished university course at the universities of Toronto, Chicago, Harvard and abroad, he became first deputy minister of labor on the establishment of the department in 1900, and since then as a public official, undertaking many important missions for the government as royal commissioner both in Canada and in Great Britain, his career has been one of unvarying and splendid success.

In Ottawa, where he is best known his elevation to cabinet rank is hailed with hearty approval, irrespective of party predilection and the minister of labor was tonight the recipient of many messages of congratulation.

Hon. W. S. Fielding leaves the capital tomorrow for England in connection with Canada's financial interests in British and European money markets. He will be absent for the greater part of the summer, and on his return will take part in the proposed conference next autumn respect to reciprocal treaty agreement with British West Indies.

HILL CASE HELD OVER.

Accused of Libelling Sir Fred Borden Admitted
to Bail.

Halifax, June 2.—The case of King against Walter H. Carruthers of Kentville, who was committed for trial shortly after the last Dominion election on the charge of having published in Kings County during the election campaign "Eyeopener," a newspaper which contained a libel on Sir Frederick Borden, Minister of Militia, goes over until the next term of the court.

The case came before the grand jury at the June sitting of the supreme court at Kentville.

Mr. Justice Drysdale, who presided, called the attention of the grand jury to certain portions of the publication which he said contained libel and after a short deliberation a true bill was found against Carruthers.

FORMALLY ARRAIGNED.

This afternoon Carruthers was formally arraigned and a lengthy written plea in answer to the charge was read and filed on his behalf by Ritchie, K. C. The

effect of the plea was first, that he was not guilty, and secondly, that the libels complained of were true and that they were published in the public interests. To this plea replication was read and filed by H. H. Wickwire, who was acting for the crown, denying the facts set out in the plea of accused and asking permission, to further prosecute the indictment.

When the case was called for trial, Mr. Wickwire on behalf of the crown intimated to the court that in consequence of the importance of the matter and lengthy nature of the plea which had been filed the crown would not proceed to trial until the next term of the court in October next.

Judge Drysdale replied that this was the crown's right and admitted Carruthers to bail himself in the sum of six hundred dollars and two sureties of three hundred dollars each, to appear at the next term of court and stand his trial.

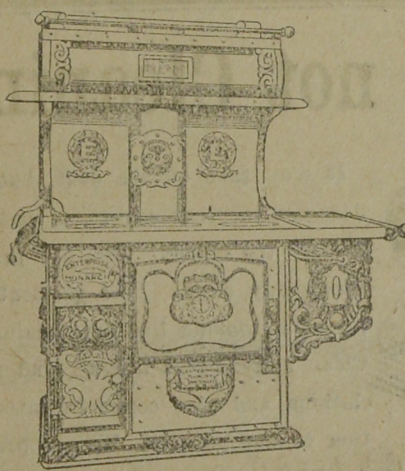
