MUST PROTECT HERSELF.

The drastic regulations against the admission of undesirables which Canada has put into force within the past year have naturally provoked considerable anger among those people in England whose chief business in life seems to be to remove those who are a burden upon the public of England and transport them to Canada or some other portion of the Empire. The London Daily Chronicle voices this indignation when it says:

"The facts are indisputable. A recent survey of the work of the emigration agencies in London confirms the force of the general statement. There is a mighty slump in emigration, especially with that Elorado of the booking agents, Canada. We have poured half a million of our population on its broad acres during the last five years—good, bad, and indifferent human material, but in the making of its nationhood Canada has less cause of complaint in this respect than America had in the early days when it was all the rage to go there. At the worst, Canada has had British blood. It has not had to contend, as did the States and many of the Colonies, with the vile effects of shiploads of our scum and the scum of Continental nations. Then, on account of internal and external circumstances, Canada is no longer prepared to receive emigrants that are indiscriminately selected."

The fact seems to be that only the best of Britain's population now have a chance to emigrate. The migration of forty or fifty workmen under the care of the Church army, the Salvation Army, or other organization is care of the Church army, the Salvation Army, as compared with the action of the Scotch and English agriculturists who purchased between them last week over 8,000 acres of land in Alberta at a cost of \$200,000. "The present conditions," says the Chronicle, "are one-sided, selfish, and unworthy of a people living under one flag. A new situation has arisen, and one that can only be properly handled by statesmen who consider the interests of the Empire as a whole and not those of England or Canada in particular." Those who are thus complaining in Great Britain against the restrictions imposed by the immigration authorities of this country argue that while Canada is admitting only the thrifty and industrious immigrants from the Mother Country, the latter is getting no equivalent material satisfaction—that Canada's gain is Great Britain's loss.

MR. CROCKET AGAIN.

(The Evening Times.)

There was great joy in the Standard office last night. Mr. O. S. Crocket was delivering a speech at Fredericton, and the usual worry about finding matter to fill the columns of the organ subsided the very moment the news came from the capital. Mr. Crocket and his photograph were good for seven or eight columns, with lots of black type interspersed. Hence the staff of the Standard got their feet on the desk and smoked in peace. It is true that Mr. Crocket did not say anything new or interesting. He was a little more violent in his abuse of Dr. Pugsley and Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and a little more reckless than usual in his statements concerning the Liberal administration. He appears to remain either ignorant or oblivious to the fact that even by the members of his own party he is merely rated as a Big Noise. The Gleaner and the Standard have no choice but to report his speeches and print his pictures. The party has no choice but to accept him as its spokesman. It is worthy of note that the Hon. George E. Foster, who came in on the Montreal train yesterday, did not turn aside at the Junction to join in the tribute to Mr. Crocket at Fredericton. Neither did Mr. Foster join Mr. Crocket when the latter rushed headlong to his own humiliation in the Commons a few weeks ago. Mr. Foster has lucid intervals. Mr. Crocket is less fortunate. His self-complacency is proof against all humiliation. His party would gladly welcome his withdrawal from the stage, but unhappily must go on applauding him, and sighing over the memory of days when it had something to applaud. The once powerful Conservative party has been reduced to grave extremities.

The speech delivered by Mr. O. S. Crocket, M.P., at the Tory club rooms on Wednesday evening, furnishes a very good explanation as to why the Tory representation from this province at Ottawa was reduced almost to the vanishing point at the last federal election. The people have no use for small bore politicians and scandal mongers.

Mr. J. King Kelly, a commissioner appointed by the Hazen government, has found that Mr. Alex Rogers, registrar of deeds for the county of Albert, took part in the local election of March 1908, and on the strength of his report, the government has decapitated Mr. Rogers, and given the position to Mr. C. A. Peck, a Tory. Mr. Rogers formerly represented Albert in the Dominion parliament, and has been a most capable official. His removal will not make any friends for the Hazen government in Albert county.

The Hon. Absalom Duncan Thomas, manager of the only Fredericton institution that flourished under the Tory national policy—the Municipal Home—is credited with having made the following observation in his curtain raising speech at the Tory banded on Wednesday evening: "Before Mr. Crocket's first election the grand old county of York was represented by a man who did not do it honor, but who sat dumbly in his seat and voted as a tame follower." It is positively cruel of Mr. Thomas to cast reflections upon the memory of the late Mr. Thomas Temple, M.P. If Mr. Temple did not do the county of York honor, why did Mr. Thomas support him?

RESTIGOUCHE TORIES.

To Meet in Convention to Chose Candidates Who Will Control Patronage.

Dalhousie, N. B., June 3.—The notice given in a local paper that a convention will be called soon in Restigouche county by the local government to select candidates to contest this county at the next general election, who will handle the patronage, justifies the charge that was made during the session by William Currie, M. P., that the sheriff of Restigouche should not advise the executive with regard to appointments, etc. It will be very interesting to watch the action of the party leaders here, and who will be chosen to improve the situation, which is very discouraging to the Conservative rank and file on account of the bad judgment used by those who have handled the patronage since March 3, 1908.

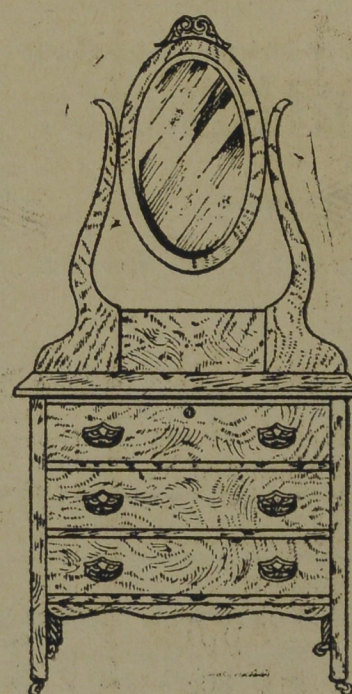
