THAT SNAP VOTE.

The attempt to attach significance to the smallness of the majority on the division on Mr. Crothers' motion is the veriest childishness, says the Toronto Globe. It is hinted that disapprobation of Dr. Pugsley was the reason for the reduced Liberal vote. Of course not a Conservative has any such notion. They know better. The course of a debate in parliament is invariably a matter of arrangement between the Whips. That of Thursday had been finally arranged at five o'clock that afternoon. Three men were to talk on each side. Under that arrangement the debate would have been going to all hours of the night. Relying on this, a number of the Liberal members and one or two Conservatives went about other business.

Mr. Turgeon was the last speaker on the Liberal side. The Conservative who was to follow refused to do so, and the debate collapsed. The absent Liberals could not be summoned in time for the division. The ovation which greeted Dr. Pugsley's return to the chamber was swelled by the atoning plaudits of the absentees from the division.

Mr. Foster indulged in an uncalculated sneer at Mr. Turgeon's speech. He said that was the government's best answer to Mr. Crockett's five-hour oration. There was more in two or three sentences of Mr. Turgeon's remarks than in the long-drawn-out arraignment of the member for York. Mr. Turgeon asked why the legislature of New Brunswick allowed the Commission's report to lie on the table for thirty days without taking action on it—without even adopting it. The report has never been adopted by the legislature. Mr. Foster may hold Mr. Turgeon's effort in small esteem, but he is invited to supply a satisfactory answer to that one clause of it.

FOSTER'S GOOD MEMORY.

An Ottawa correspondent of the Telegraph has the following reference to Mr. O. S. Crockett's five-hour harangue on the Central Railway charges:

"Yet in spite of all the preparation his speech was a poor one, even for Crockett. He picked out those bits of evidence here and there which, read without context or the cross examination, seemed to condemn the Central Railway directors. He made the most extravagant statements, and began to rehash and repeat so much of what he had said that the members grew weary and wandered from the chamber. His disappointment at the outcome is said to be intense. His leader and Mr. Foster did not even back him up. It is said of Mr. Foster that he never forgets, and his memory of the days when he was a candidate in York and 'Ossie' Crockett—then a Liberal—used to follow him to his meetings night after night, would not need much burnishing as he listened to the uncomfortable voice of York's representative behind him assailing the Minister of Public Works."

It was Mr. Foster who told Mr. Crockett on one occasion on the hustings here that he "strained at a knot and swallowed a camel, legs and all." Mr. Crockett is evidently still given to that sort of thing.

COLD COMFORT.

The Tory opposition tried to secure a little cheap party advantage by terminating the debate in the House of Commons on the Central Railway report sooner than had been expected. By this action several Liberal members, who had relied on the arrangement made between the whips of both parties, were unable to cast their votes against the resolution moved by Mr. Crothers, one of the opposition members. Conservative papers have since been trying to extract some comfort from this, declaring that some of the Liberal members did not wish to oppose the opposition resolution. This is a ridiculous misrepresentation. Twenty-three of the Liberal members who were, in consequence of the opposition's trickery, debarred from voting signed a resolution strongly endorsing Hon. Dr. Pugsley, and congratulating him on his complete vindication.—Moncton Transcript.

CURRENT COMMENT.

There is one Virginia man who doesn't believe in race suicide. He has had three wives and 30 children, of whom 11 are now living.

Col. Sam Hughes wants Canada to contribute five Dreadnoughts to the British navy. And Dreadnoughts are ten millions a piece. Couldn't Col. Sam make it four and a half?

The Toronto News finds fault with Hon. Dr. Pugsley for accepting a salary while attorney general of New Brunswick, and then making charges for professional services. Whether this principle is right or wrong it has been adopted by Attorney General Hazen, and no Tory paper has yet taken him to task for it.

Toronto Globe: The Minister of Public Works has lost no time in asking the Supreme court of New Brunswick to clear up the question, what became of the money granted by the Dominion and provincial governments to aid in the construction of the New Brunswick Coal & Railway company's line? The method is the filing of a bill in the court against the directors, who will be under the necessity of making replies.

The use of rat skins in various industries has created a demand in London alone to the amount of nearly \$200,000 a year, states a British publication. They are used among other things for book-bindings, photograph frames, purses and for the thumbs of ladies' gloves. A new branch of work is likely to increase the consumption largely, and as much as 75 to 90 cents a day has been earned by the unemployed in Denmark last year, when the rat act passed. The damage done by rats in England alone is estimated to amount to many millions of dollars per annum, and their capture already occupies a large number of persons.

Says that fine old crusted specimen of high Toryism, the Saturday Review, in discussing the bye-election in Stratford-on-Avon: "Altogether, the whole business is a muddle, from which it is impossible to say who will emerge victorious. Captain Kincaid-Smith will undoubtedly take away a certain number of Conservative votes, so that a blatant Colonial barrister, well versed in the corruption of Canadian provincial politics, might slip in. Unfortunately, the Conservative candidate is not so popular as might be." (The blatant Colonial barrister referred to is Mr. Joseph Martin, who was so frequently quoted by Mr. O. S. Crockett and other Tory candidates during the recent Dominion election campaign. He failed of election by about 2,000 votes.)

JAPS SEEM UNPOPULAR.

Vancouverites Split Over Reception to Battleships.

Vancouver, B.C., May 10.—The celebration of the visit of the Japanese cruisers Aso and Sayo on May 17 is likely to be a badly mixed affair, as is shown by the marked opposition to the celebration arrangement in civic quarters. The civic finance committee by very decided majority have turned down a recommendation of Mayor Douglas for \$1,000 donation to the militia officers in aid of parade and entertainment expense.

Ald. McMillan declared, when the military deputation presented its request for the appropriation, that Vancouver ought rather to show the Japs "how well prepared we are to shoot them." Four aldermen out of five voted with McMillan, despite the protests of the military men that their action was against Imperial ethics, and that Vancouver should cultivate trade relations with Japan. The Trades and Labor Council have also officially decided that no labor organization should take any part whatever in the celebration. This is all in the face of a published appeal of the mayor to the citizens to make the celebration a success.

Kinrades Move to Toronto.

Toronto, May 10.—The Kinrade family, whose movements have been so prominently before the public for weeks, arrived in the city last night about 9 p.m. and were driven by cab to their apartments at 23 Homewood avenue.

It is believed that they will take up residence in Toronto for the summer at least, as Mr. Kinrade does not intend to resume his duties as principal of the Canon street school until September.

Geo. T. Blackstock, K.C., and the provincial officers and medical specialists have made their reports to the Attorney-General, and what further action, if any, is to be taken rests with the Department.

Sentenced to the Chair.

Norwich, N.Y., May 10.—Earl B. Hill, aged 19, who was convicted of murder in the first degree in the Supreme Court here on Thursday, was yesterday sentenced to be electrocuted at Auburn Prison during the week beginning June 20.

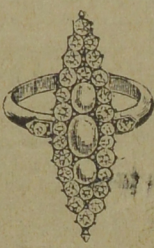
