

BOND LOST A SEAT.

Returns in From Only Two Newfoundland Constituencies.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 9.—With only two single man constituencies thus far heard from and no prospect of further returns until tomorrow, the interest in the outcome of the parliamentary elections yesterday remained at fever heat today.

The uncertainty as to the general result of the election is greatly increased by the curiously divergent results in the two constituencies which announced returns yesterday, Carbonear and Brigus. The adherents of Sir Edward Morris, the acting premier, are jubilant over their capture of the Carbonear seat which has been a Liberal stronghold continuously for twenty years, but this surprising overturn was offset in a measure by the fact that they narrowly escaped losing Brigus.

The Brigus constituency has returned a Conservative majority for sixteen years, but yesterday the majority was reduced to a narrow margin. On this circumstance the supporters of Sir Robert Bond, the former premier, are building hopes that some districts which were carried by the Morrisites by small majorities at the election last November may report Bond victories this time.

Among these close districts are Harbor Main, Bay Devered and Ferryland with two seats each. It is expected that the polls will be declared in these districts tomorrow.

HALIFAX, N. S., May 9.—(Special)—The counting of two constituencies in Newfoundland took place on Saturday night after the balloting closed. They were Brigus and Carbonear. The vote shows that Sir Edward Morris holds Brigus, which returned one of his supporters in the general election seven months ago and he has captured Carbonear, which in the previous contest returned a member to support Sir Robert Bond.

The counting of ballots will continue for a week before all are finished. The boxes from some of the more distant districts not being able to reach St. John's before the end of the week. Carbonear and Brigus have one member each. There will be no further announcement of results before Monday.

MORRIS GAINS A SEAT.

Returns From Newfoundland Elections Show One Turnover Already.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 10.—Only two constituencies have yet returned the results of the polling in Saturday's general election in Newfoundland.

One of these, Carbonear, elected Goddison, a supporter of Sir Edward Morris, the acting Premier, by 44 votes to the seat which he lost by 23 votes at the last election in November.

In Brigus, Warren, a Morrisite, retains his seat by a majority reduced from 174 to 24. The uncertainty as to the general result of the election is greatly increased by the curiously divergent results to the two constituencies which announced returns, Carbonear and Brigus.

Dock Hands Strike.

Owen Sound, May 7.—The truckers and laborers employed at the C.P.R. docks, went out on strike yesterday afternoon. They are being paid 15 cents an hour, and are asking 17 1/2 and 20 cents an hour.

The Assiniboia is expected to arrive to-day from Port William, when the strikers may make a demonstration if any attempt made to unload her by strikebreakers.

Castro Still Roving.

Santander, Spain, May 10.—Senora Castro, wife of the deposed President of Venezuela, arrived here yesterday on the steamer Guadeloupe from the West Indies. She was met by her husband, who came down from Paris. Senor Castro and his wife left Bordeaux March 26, ostensibly for Port of Spain, Trinidad.

Bought by Gould Interests.

Richmond, Va., May 6.—At a receivership sale yesterday the various city railway properties were bought in by the bond committee, representing the Gould interests, for \$8,100,000.

Smallpox In Teddy's Camp.

Nairobi, British East Africa, May 10.—The Roosevelt expedition is still in camp on the ranch of Sir Alfred Pease. It is reported that two more cases of smallpox have been discovered among the porters of the expedition.

STEAMSHIP IS LOST

Adelia Shores Believed to Have Sunk With 21 Persons.

NORTHLAND SEES WRECKAGE

Steamer Bound From Michigan to Duluth With Salt Is Six Days Overdue and Sailors Report That She Is Lost With All Hands—Was Caught in the Severe Windstorm of Last Week.

Duluth, Minn., May 8.—Advices received last night are to the effect that the steamer Shores, six days overdue at Duluth, went down off Whitefish Point in Lake Superior with all on board. The crew and passengers numbered twenty-one.

News of the probable destruction of the steamer Shores off Whitefish Point in Lake Superior was brought to Duluth last night by sailors of the steamer Northland. They say as the Northland was passing that point they discovered wreckage strewn all over the lake. In their opinion, it belonged to the Shores.

The Adelia Shores belongs to the S. O. Neff Transportation Co. of Milwaukee, Wis., and was bound from Michigan with salt. Rumors say that her passengers and crew numbered 21, but this cannot be verified. The ship was under command of S. Holmes, the engineer is R. S. Nott.

The gale in which the ship is thought to have foundered last week sent down the Aurora, the Russia and the Nestor. The wind gained a velocity of seventy miles an hour. A violent snowstorm also prevailed for three days, making navigation extremely perilous.

Will Ask Accounting.

ST. JOHN, N.B., May 8.—W. B. Wallace, K. C., has been instructed by Hon. William Pugsley to begin proceedings in equity for an account of expenditures and appropriation of all moneys received by the present and past directors of the New Brunswick Coal & Railway Co. from the Dominion and local Governments.

Mr. Wallace has had the summons issued against all the persons now living and all the persons concerned. When the summonses have been returned with the necessary affidavits of service, Dr. Pugsley will then file a bill in the court, and in reply defendants will be forced to file an account showing what disposal was made of the moneys received. The matter will come before Chief Justice Barker, probably in St. John.

Drowned While Canoeing.

Galt, May 8.—Carl Stahlschmidt, son of William Stahlschmidt, of the Canadian Office & School Desk Furniture Co., Preston, and Clarence Goodfellow, Galt, were out canoeing on the river. When opposite the northern point of the island above the bridge, the boys attempted to set sail and the canoe upset. Stahlschmidt could not swim but his companion, an expert swimmer, tried hard to save him and went down twice in his efforts. Stahlschmidt sank in ten feet of water, fifteen feet from shore and young Goodfellow was so weak he had to be pulled ashore.

Both the boys attended the collegiate institute. The body probably will be swept down stream by the current.

Election Protests.

Ottawa, May 8.—Sixty-two members of Parliament will have to face the election courts after the session. Except in Quebec and Manitoba, each party has an equal number of protests. There are two in Prince Edward Island, 35 in Quebec, eight in Ontario, eight in Manitoba, six in Alberta, one in Saskatchewan, and two in British Columbia. In Nova Scotia and New Brunswick there was a say-off all round. The session has prevented any trial on the merits, and what proceedings have taken place have been in respect of preliminary objections. Many protests will not reach the trial stages.

Two Boy Marksman.

Toronto, May 8.—Galen Hagarty, son of the principal of Harbor College, Inglewood, has been selected by Inspector Hughes to go to England to compete for the Prince of Wales' medal. This is in response to an invitation from England for Canada to send two cadets under 16 years of age to compete. The other will be from Ottawa. Galen Hagarty had to leave for Montreal last night with practically no notice.

Lightning's Havoc.

St. Catharines, May 8.—During the severe electrical storm which passed over this district a house on Maitland street, Thorold, owned by Thos. Schnell, and occupied by a number of Italian laborers, was struck by lightning. The Italians escaped injury, although a portion of the blanket covering two of them was burned.

CARE OF MONUMENTS.

Much Needed Step Is Being Taken by Ontario Official Regarding Relics.

The Historiographer of the Education Department of Ontario has issued a circular which is being sent out to the historical societies in the Dominion, asking for more complete information as to statues and monuments erected in Canada and illustrative of Canadian history. In connection with this movement it is interesting to note that The London Spectator, in its current issue, refers to a movement along similar line in Great Britain. It says:

"The appointment of a royal commission to make an inventory of the historical monuments best worth preserving in Britain is one of those tardy but welcome acts which, we hope, will eventually bring our system of caring for the relics of the past abreast of those of most western nations. France, Germany, Italy, and other countries are all ahead of us. The inventory which is ordered will, perhaps, be formed on the French model more than on any other, for the 'classement' of monuments historiques is the feature of the French laws, which, however, are too highly centralized. The only objection we know of to the creation of a formal catalogue is, as we have pointed out before now, that by implication it sanctions a certain carelessness in the case of monuments not catalogued. The state, as it were, publicly withholds protection from objects not on its list; yet many of them, if they are near the dividing line, may be almost quite as well worth preservation as those which have been exalted to the honors of the catalogue. This danger may easily be exaggerated, and it could not become serious unless one is to assume a considerable lack of common-sense or the presence of ill-will somewhere. Indeed, if no other danger than this exists, it is obvious that there is an overwhelming case for the making of the inventory. We hope that it will be produced without delay, and will not err on the side of scantiness. The limitations will be strict enough in the nature of things, because no monument is to be considered which is dated later than 1700. We can think of a great many buildings later than 1700 which could not be removed without national disgrace, even if we look no further than some of the churches by Wren or founded on Wren's designs."

"BLIND PIG" METHODS

NEW ONTARIO IS EL DORADO OF ILLICIT LIQUOR SELLERS.

Bad Whisky Is Shipped Into the North In All Sorts of Innocent Guises and Carried About on Its Deadly Work by Pedlars With Cans Strapped to Their Bodies or Sold In Dives—Huge Profits.

Why a shebeen, or whisky dive, should be called a "Blind Pig" is difficult to ascertain, there being a certain amount of ambiguity about the name. Perhaps it is because certain places eminently respectable in appearance are so conducted as a blind, for the illicit sale of liquor.

The blind pig thrives and fattens in New Ontario, a fact well established by the list of convictions, and the readiness, ease and bravado with which the offender pays up \$100 fines. You can occasionally hear one of the fraternity openly boast that "he pulled \$6,000 out of such a place," or that "it is easy to pay a small amount like \$100 for the risk of such a rake-off."

The sources of supply are in Ottawa, North Bay, Toronto, and towns nearer the places of consumption, where there is a demand. It is an easy matter to secure means to obtain the stuff. The supply and the number of means taken to secure its safe arrival at the distributing point are as varied as the means taken for its disposal. Here are ten cases of nice fresh eggs, some innocent-looking boxes of macaroni, cases of tomatoes, quite a lot of soft cases of groceries with the tag of a respectable storekeeper tacked on as a blind, a barrel of apples, a keg of sweet cider which turns out to be low grade whisky, coal-oil barrels with smaller casks tightly packed inside, barrels of pork, rolled oats, tea chests, trunks filled with whisky and well packed with saw dust, pack bags with an innocent looking axe standing out at the side as a hall mark of respectability, which always passes the contents, unless a frail irritating straw should by chance prick its way through the canvas, and give the game away. 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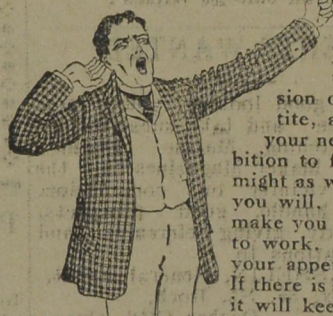
