M'GUIGAN TO MOVE?

Reported That He Is New Presi-
dent of Superior Co.

AT A SALARY OF \$25,000

English Directors Are Said to Have
Persuaded Man Who Is Building
Hydro Electric Transmission Lines
to Take Charge of Soo Interests
—The Company Intends to
Push Its Railroad Policy.Montreal, Aug. 9.—It is understood
that within a limited period F. H.
McGuigan, formerly manager of the
Grand Trunk Railway, and now of the
F. H. McGuigan Construction Co.,
which is building the Ontario Gov-
ernment power line from Toronto to
Niagara Falls, will become president
of the Lake Superior Corporation,
that industry having of late come un-
der the control of a group of London
capitalists who have been looking
around for a man to take charge and
reorganize the enterprise.In the person of Mr. McGuigan,
the holders of the controlling interest
in a capital amounting to near forty
millions believe they have found the
right man, for that gentleman has
not only the reputation of being a
very able railway man—a desirable
necessity since an energetic railway
policy is to enter into the company's
plans—but is, besides, a powerful
administrator.It is stated that before the ex-
change of the Grand Trunk would
entertain the proposition, which was

submitted to him by an important
group of old country capitalists, he
demanded a free hand to a very large
extent, and especially as regards the
new railway policy of the Lake Su-
perior Co.These concessions, it appears, have
been freely given Mr. McGuigan, who
will enter upon the undertaking with
a salary at least of \$25,000 per annum.
Besides exploiting the pulp and pa-
per industry and the great ore bodies
within reach of the works, the steel
rail industry will be carried on very
largely.It is understood that a progressive
railway policy has been decided upon,
which will embrace the extension of
the Algoma Central, now the property
of the Lake Superior Corporation,
away north to the transcontinental,
thus opening new deposits of iron ore,
and bringing the products to within
easy distance of the Canadian side of
the Soo.It is said that Mr. McGuigan has
already sent engineers over the road,
and sufficient data has been secured
to justify an energetic policy being
pursued when the new president's
plans are matured.

'Phone Service in Pekin.

New York, Aug. 9.—The tinkle of
2,500 American telephones installed by
New York company will be heard
in the heart of Pekin, China, within
a year. The Chinese Government has
signed a contract with a New York
company for the installation of a
complete telephone system in the cap-
ital city at a cost of \$150,000. The
plant will have an ultimate capacity
of 20,000 lines.

Domestic Drowns.

Gananogue, Aug. 9.—Catherine Mac-
Donald, of Toronto, was drowned here
Saturday morning. The girl is em-
ployed in the home of Clarkson
Jones of Toronto, who has his sum-
mer home here. She came here about
a month ago. The girl had gone in
bathing and got beyond her depth.

Two Drownings.

North Sydney, N.S., Aug. 9.—Two
drowning accidents occurred here on
Saturday evening, the victims being
Charles Long, aged 30, while bathing,
and George Leroy, a boy of 8, while
fishing. A younger brother of his died
a week ago from injuries sustained
from falling downstairs.

Toronto Firm Get Contract.

Port Arthur, Aug. 9.—The contract
of the new Canadian Northern hotel
has been let to the Imperial Construc-
tion Co. of Toronto. The work will
cost about \$250,000. Messrs. Mont-
gomery and Grantham, the heads of
the construction company, will be here
on Wednesday next.

Alabama Prohibition.

Montgomery, Ala., Aug. 9.—The
drastic Carmichael prohibition law
was passed by the Senate, 28 to 2,
and now awaits the signature of Ala-
bama's prohibition governor to be-
come a law. The bill forbids the sale
of drinks containing more than 1 per
cent. alcohol.

INDIANS NOW WEALTHY.

Dokis Tribes Get Money For Land and
Squaws Are Very Popular.The distribution of the first instal-
ment of the million dollars which
the Dokis Indian tribe are to receive
for their famous pine limit took place
at Sturgeon Falls a few days ago,
and was exceedingly interesting.The first Indian to get his share
was the young chief, Alex. Dokis,
whose late father, the old chief,
during his lifetime refused to sell the
limit.Romance pictures the young chief
taking up his father's policy at the
grave of the aged chieftain and reso-
lutely fighting the battles of the dead
to the brink of his own last resting
place, with a fine scorn refusing to
look upon the plunder gouged from
the slaughter of the forests, but stern
fact shows the son of his father eagerly
advancing to the lodge of Indian
Agent Cockburn and cheerfully ac-
cepting the share of his family,
amounting to \$5,625 on the first pay-
ment.The sum of \$52,000 was paid the
band, which represents a part pay-
ment only of the ten per cent. allowed
them according to the terms of the
surrender of the pine timber on
the reserve. Another distribution will
be made of the cash payment to the
band after the limits are paid for in
full by the purchasers. The first
payment was at the rate of \$625 per
head. Chief Dokis, with a family of
nine, received \$5,625, while Henry
Dokis, whose family roll call num-
bers ten, received \$6,250.The distribution was made at Stur-
geon Falls by Indian Agent Cock-
burn and the tribe was fully rep-
resented by heads of the following
families: Dokis, Restoule, Metegem-
ens, Kisseeo, and Ennewick, to the
number of 84 men, women and chil-
dren, who will draw interest on the
capital amount, which will mean to
some families \$3,000 per year.The Indians listened solidly to the
explanations of the Indian agent that
the piece of paper each received
meant that a large sum of money
was in the Quebec Bank to their
credit, which could be obtained when
required. A short lecture on banking
and the beauties of the savings de-
partment followed, after which the
Government checks marched solemnly
to the bank in the firm grasp of
the Indian recipients, and each one
drew the face value of the check, and
burdened with wealth, returned to the
presence of the Indian agent, where
each Indian piled his money up on
the table and joyfully regarded the
stacks of greenbacks.One Indian insisted on having his
money translated into bills of small
denomination, and was loaded up
with a mountain of greenbacks, five
dollars and under. With a Longboat
grin he staggered into the office of
the Indian agent, money bulging out
of every pocket. Slowly unpacking
himself, he piled his treasure on the
table, making a bigger display than
any of his red brothers, which afford-
ed him the greatest satisfaction.The braves could hardly be per-
suaded to refrain from their deter-
mination to pack the money back to
the reserve, twenty miles across Lake
Nipissing, but finally, after making
generous purchases and paying their
bills, nearly all deposited their wealth
in the bank.The timber was sold for \$871,000.
The dues on saw logs is \$2 per thou-
sand feet, and on square and waney
timber \$50 per thousand cubic feet.
After deducting the 10 per cent. cash
payment to the Indians, the bonus
and the dues on the timber after it
is all cut will give the band a capital
of about one million dollars, which
they will draw interest upon.An interesting result of the sudden
acquisition of wealth by the Dokis
band has been the frequent and pro-
longed visits of young bucks from
other tribes, who are finding new
attractions among the maidens of
the Dokis families, and the matri-
monial market has taken quite a
boom. One wedding has already
taken place, and indications are
favorable for many more in the im-
mediate future, as every Dokis maid-
en represents a cash value of about
\$1,000 and a yearly income of \$300.
