SUICIDE IN RIVER.

Unknown Woman Leaps From Ferry at Windsor.

Windsor, Aug. 12.—In full view of a hundred passengers on the ferry boat Excelsior, an unknown woman committed suicide at noon yesterday by throwing herself from the upper deck into the river.

The tragedy occurred as the boat neared the Canadian side, and in a place where the current runs very swiftly. Several women who saw the act became hysterical.

The boat was quickly brought to a stop and life preservers gotten ready but the body never reappeared. All that remained on the surface where the woman sat, a pocketbook containing some money was found.

Charles McKay, a Toronto traveler, says the unknown made no attempt to grasp a chair thrown to her, and that she sank almost immediately.

I.O.O.F. Affairs.

Ottawa, Aug. 12.—At the first general business meeting of the Grand Lodge, I.O.O.F., yesterday reports were presented by the grand officers. Grand Master McBride reported a total membership of 40,437, being a net increase to June 30, 1909, of 1,255. The secretary of the relief association reported that the revenue for the year was \$363,824, and the expenditure \$246,450. The disbursements or mortuary account were \$191,854. The amount transferred to the surplus fund was \$124,000. The net assets of the order now stand at \$724,102.

Canadian Coasting Trade.

With regard to a recent announcement citing the terms of an order restricting the coasting trade of Canada to British vessels from Jan. 1, 1910, we are officially informed that applications have been made to allow the ships and vessels of certain foreign countries to participate in the Canadian coasting trade to a limited extent and for a temporary period, pending the acquisition of suitable British ships. The Governor-General has consequently ordered that the order be amended in such manner as to permit steamships of not less than 1,500 tons gross tonnage each, of Italy, Germany, the Netherlands, Sweden, Norway, Austria-Hungary, Denmark, Belgium, the Argentine Republic, and Japan to engage in the coasting trade of Canada in the carrying of goods and passengers coastwise between any port in the province of Nova Scotia and any port in the province of Quebec and vice versa on the same terms and conditions as are applicable to Canadian vessels until Dec. 31, 1911.
