SONS OF TEMPERANCE

The Order Has Made Satisfactory Progress the Past Year.

ST. GEORGE, May 19.—(Special) —The semi-annual meeting of the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance, which was held here, was brought to a conclusion at noon today, and this evening the delegates dispersed to their homes. The gathering has been a most satisfactory one in point of numbers, in the encouraging nature of the reports presented, and the enthusiasm displayed.

The reports of the officers, which were submitted, showed great progress in the work of the order. Rev. C. W. Hamilton, G. W. S., reported that during the last six months 618 new members had been added and 247 names struck off the roll, leaving a net gain of 371. There are now 53 sub-divisions of the order in this grand division with a membership of 2201. This is an increase of thirteen divisions over the previous year.

This was especially pleasant, as the previous year had showed a decrease

of 11 divisions and 241 members. During the past six months seven divisions had their charters suspended for not reporting, and seven others were relieved.

The report of Treasurer Stark, showed the finances of the order in very healthy standing and that there is now a balance of \$400 on hand.

At this morning's session the committee appointed on the Tilley Memorial reported that in 1896 the Grand Division had voted a grant for a memorial which it was proposed at that time to erect. Personal subscriptions were also taken and some of these were collected and the proceeds are still in the bank. The meeting decided to revive the original grant and to hand over this sum to the funds in the bank to the general committee as soon as required.

The rest of the session was devoted to a general discussion of the work of the order. The gathering was then adjourned to meet again in October.

MONCTON BUDGET.

Y. M. C. A. Road Race Discontinued --The Hub a Dry Town.

MONCTON, May 19.—(Special) —The Y. M. C. A.'s annual ten mile road race has been discontinued, owing to objections from several leading contributors to the association, who claim that the distance is too great, and the effects of the race injurious, especially to the younger athletes.

The race was established as an annual affair two years ago, a cup for annual competition being donated by

a Montreal firm. This may now be handed over to some local organization.

Bottle peddling seems to be about the only method by which the Scott Act is broken in Moncton at the present time. George Gallant, who was arrested for this offence yesterday, was given a month's imprisonment, and Jack Weir same sentence for a similar offence.

H. H. ROGERS DEAD.

Well Known Standard Oil Magnate Expired Suddenly Today.

NEW YORK, May 19.—(Special) —H. H. Rogers, the Standard Oil capitalist, died at his residence in this city about seven o'clock this morning. He arose about six, and about half past six he began to feel ill, complaining of numbness and nausea. Before anything could be done he sank and died. He went on Friday last to his country place at Fairhaven, Mass., and returned yesterday.

Mr. Rogers was for many years one of the most prominent financiers of the country. He took a leading part in all the enterprises undertaken by the Standard Oil company, of which he was president up to the time of his death. He also was interested in a number of railroads.

The news of his death came as a surprise to Wall Street. Mr. Rogers was at the office of the Standard Oil company yesterday, and appeared to be in good spirits.

RESULTED FATALLY.

Boy Accidentally Shot at St. Andrews Died from His Wounds.

ST. STEPHEN, N. B., May 19.—(Special) —Wm. Baxter, the young man injured at St. Andrews yesterday by the accidental discharge of a gun and brought here last evening, died in the Chipman Memorial hospital at four o'clock this morning. On his arrival he was too weak from the shock and loss of blood to permit an operation and though stimulants were administered he never regained sufficient strength. He was twenty-five years old, unmarried, and belonged to Eastport, Maine.

BIG DAY'S WORK.

Parliament Passed Thirty Millions of Estimates on Tuesday.

OTTAWA, May 18.—The commons, by dint of long and hard work today, practically cleared off the order paper and paved the way for prorogation tomorrow. The balance of the estimates, aggregating some \$30,000,000, were passed, nearly the whole day being spent in supply.

Haughton Lennox, one of the most faithful of Sir James Whitney's "watchdogs" at Ottawa, delayed supply for a couple of hours in order to call attention to the judgment of the Ontario court of appeal in the Florence Mining Company's case, making it the basis of an attack on the minister of justice, whose denunciation of the provincial legislation closing the doors of the courts to a test of the case on its merits, had rankled in the minds of the Conservatives since it was uttered earlier in the session.

Mr. Lennox sought to draw the comforting conclusion that the judgment completely disposed of the criticisms of the minister of justice and the Liberal press, but he was quickly disillusioned, for far from modifying his opinion of the Ontario government's action, Hon. A. B. Aylesworth was more scathing in his condemnation than before. "I can find no words in the English language too strong to denounce the iniquity of this legislation," was the final comment of the minister of justice.

An attempt was also made to justify the action of Hon. Dr. Reaume, Ontario minister of public works, in publishing a confidential American draft of the proposed new international fisheries regulations in boundary waters and representing it to be regulations actually agreed upon between Canada and the United States. Mr. Brodeur, who severely criticized on Thursday last the action of Dr. Reaume, pointed out that as a result of the publication of a confidential document by the Ontario government, diplomatic negotiations with

the United States had been hampered. He believed, however, that a satisfactory agreement would be reached between the Canadian and American commissioners.

In supply on the fisheries estimates, Mr. Jameson asked for the establishment of a dogfish reduction plant in the Bay of Fundy or else that compensation should be paid to fishermen who had met with considerable loss on account of the prevalence of dogfish.

Mr. Brodeur said the matter would be considered.

The senate today showed its independence by throwing out a government bill. This was the exchequer court act allowing appeal in minor cases to provincial courts of review. This was objected to on the ground that it was undignified to allow an appeal from a federal to a provincial court and because there would be confusion of jurisdiction. On motion of Senator Power, the bill was thrown out by the committee of the whole resolving not to report it.

Another government bill was considerably amended. This was the criminal code. It was proposed to amend the provision against prize fighting by classing as such contests with gloves in addition to contests with fists. On motion of Senator Power this was thrown out and the law stands as at present.

The new bill provided a penalty of a year's imprisonment for the keeper of a bawdy house, and six months for any inmate. It was objected that the social evil would continue and the penalty against any one found in such a place would lead to bad results by spreading it through places where it did not now exist. It would lead to blackmail. On motion of Senator Loughheed the clause relating to an inmate was struck out, while the provision against keepers was retained.

TONGHI'S FISTIC BOUT.

Champion Johnson and Jack O'Brien In a Six Round Go.

Philadelphia, May 18.—Interest increases as the time approaches for the six round fight at the National Athletic Club in this city between Jack Johnson and Jack O'Brien. Both men ended their hard training today, and will indulge in nothing more than light exercises tomorrow. They will enter the ring about 10.30 o'clock tomorrow night.

There is very little betting in this city on the fight, and it is not expected that any very great amount of money will change hands. This is probably due more than anything else to the fact that local laws forbid decisions being given in boxing bouts.

The house has been practically sold for the event. The club management claims that the receipts will be \$22,000, the largest ever taken in this country for a six round fight. Johnson has a guarantee of \$5,000, while O'Brien will receive thirty per cent of the gross receipts. If the receipts reach the amount predicted by the management, O'Brien's share will be larger than Johnson's.

A visit to the respective training quarters of the two fighters late today found both men in good condition and each equally sanguine of the result of tomorrow's battle. O'Brien in particular was delighted at the opportunity of meeting the big colored fighter. He said:

"I have no fear of the outcome of tomorrow night's battle with Johnson. I had an opportunity yesterday of viewing the pictures of the recent Johnson-Burns fight in Australia and believe me if Johnson adopts the same tactics against me as he did in the Australian battle, there will be a different story to tell. I am heavier and much faster than Burns and yet I took Johnson fourteen rounds to accomplish the Canadian's downfall. In my twenty-round fight with Burns in California, the latter could not defeat me, and yet I failed to train properly. For this fight with Johnson I have trained more conscientiously than I ever did in my life and have taken on weight instead of reducing."

While Johnson's course of training has not been so severe as that of O'Brien, his manager claims he is fit to make O'Brien go six rounds. The colored man is not in such perfect condition as O'Brien, but the immense difference in weights will be used by Johnson to great advantage in the clinches. Johnson will enter the ring at close to 200 pounds, while O'Brien will tip the scales at about 170. Johnson said tonight that

the bout would not go the limit and that he would be returned the victor.

Both fighters will remain at their training quarters until tomorrow afternoon. The largest crowd that ever witnessed a fight in Philadelphia will be at the ringside when Keefe McGuigan calls the men to the centre of the ring.

HARVEY STATION.

May 18.—A special school meeting was held in the school house on Saturday morning at the call of Inspector Hanson, to make arrangements about the division of the district. The Board of Education granted the petition of about three-fourths of the ratepayers, but final arrangements had not been made satisfactorily. The attendance was very large, and Inspector Hanson was present and explained that the meeting held last summer, at which money was voted, was not legal, it having been held in the evening instead of the morning. After some discussion it was agreed that the upper or southern part of the district in which the old school house is situated, keep the old school, and that the sum of three hundred dollars be assessed on the district and paid to the Station or eastern part of the district, which is to be formed into a new district, this money to be used on the new school house, which is to be built at the Station. The Station people thought that they should have four hundred dollars, but were defeated by one vote, the vote standing 19 to 20. The division of the district will go into effect after the annual school meeting. A new school house will immediately be built at the Station, and it is expected that it will be ready for occupancy about the last of August.

MR. McNICHOLL'S VISIT.

Mr. D. McNicholl, vice-president and general manager of the C. P. R., is expected to reach St. John today on an official visit. Tomorrow or Friday he will visit Fredericton and while here will be waited upon by the railway committee of the Board of Trade. No doubt some improvements in the train service in this section will be suggested.
