ANOTHER DISMISSAL.

Lovers of fair play will not admire the means employed by the Hazen government to get rid of the services of Mr. Thomas A. Peters, the deputy commissioner of agriculture. No charge has been preferred against Mr. Peters, which would justify his dismissal, so it has been found necessary to abolish the office of deputy commissioner of agriculture, and appoint a secretary to perform precisely the same duties. The office is to go to Mr. W. W. Hubbard, not because he is any more capable of doing the work than Mr. Peters, but as a reward for political services. Mr. Hubbard was slated for the job before the Hazen government took office, and would have had it months ago, but for the fact that the government was afraid to depose Mr. Peters, because of the danger of antagonizing supporters on King's county, where he formerly lived.

The announcement that the change is to be made in the way of reorganizing the department, is a miserable subterfuge, characteristic of the combination now misruling the province. Mr. Peters has been in the employ of the department twelve years, and has performed his duties in a satisfactory manner. He is in no way deserving of such scurvy treatment as is being meted out to him by the Hazen government, and his friends will surely resent it at the first opportunity.

In regard to Mr. Hubbard, his virtues and qualifications, are fully set forth in an article in the St. John Standard, evidently written by himself. One would think to read of Mr. Hubbard's achievements that a wonderful find had been made by the Hazen government, and that agricultural interests in this province are at last coming to their own. As a matter of fact Mr. Hubbard has been in the employ of the provincial agricultural department off and on for nearly twenty years, and what has he accomplished? True, his work has been largely of a theoretical nature, but the farmers have evidently not availed themselves of his advice, and there is no reason to believe that he will set the world on fire now.

Mr. Hubbard takes credit to himself for being instrumental in establishing a creamery at Kingsclear, and operating it as an experimental station. Some of the stockholders of this concern reside in Fredericton, and they, with the farmers of Kingsclear can bear testimony to the mournful fact that it never got much beyond the experimental stage. Some of his other ventures may have been more successful, at least we hope they were. Mr. Hubbard has done good work in his capacity as a journalist and official reporter of the legislature, and his friends look for him to accomplish great things for the cause of agriculture in his new position. He has youth, energy and ability on his side, and we trust his friends will not be disappointed in him.

A NOBLE WORK.

The following interesting information in regard to the work of the Children's Protection Society of Ontario, is gleaned from a report made by Supt. Kelso, at the conference of Characters in Buffalo:

"The main feature is a happy combination of benevolent activity with official direction and supervision, the great aim being kept in view of protecting every child from neglect or cruelty. There are sixty branch children's societies in Ontario, representing a volunteer working force of over one thousand of the best men and women in the country. In consequence of the frequent meetings held and the great publicity given to the movement, child-neglect is soon noticed, warnings are given and in extreme cases guardianship is applied for. The system is constantly being perfected so that greater attention may be given to neglect in its incipency, recognizing that prompt action may save the ruin of young lives, and possibly prevent the breaking up of the home. In sixteen years, over fifty thousand children have been indirectly benefited by the kindly intervention of the society's, and over five thousand have been received under guardianship and placed in foster homes. These have been regularly visited, and at any time a change is advisable there are sheltering homes ready to receive them back. Less than one per cent of the children sent to country homes have since drifted into crime, and the majority of those returned are eligible for replacing after slight medical attention or the selection of a home more suited to their temperament or ability. In addition to its regular work of looking after the neglected the society does much educational work, such as the advocacy of playgrounds, medical inspection in schools, fresh air funds, abolition of sldm conditions, etc."

Almost daily the papers contain accounts of experiments in aerial navigation. As is well known, a number of interesting experiments are now being conducted in Germany, one of the latest being a trial of wireless telegraph instrument. The apparatus was installed in an airship, and the experiment lasted for some hours, while the craft manoeuvred over the city of Berlin. An effort was made to communicate with wireless land stations. The outcome of the experiment is not known as those in charge declined to make a statement as to the results of the test.

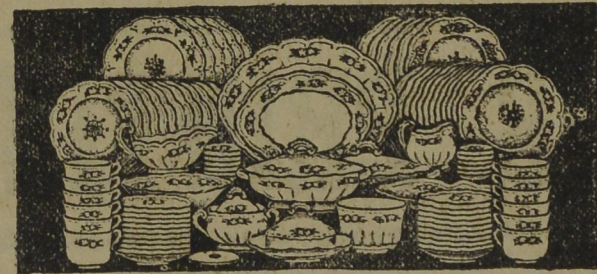
