ORCHARD MEETINGS.

Mr. G. H. Vroom, Middleton, N. S., and S. B. Hatheway, Fredericton, returned from Keswick Ridge, Saturday evening where they completed a series of orchard meetings for the N. B. Fruit Growers' Association. At the down river meetings they were accompanied by Mr. W. McIntosh, of St. John, who discussed the question of insect pests. The meetings were well attended and much interest was shown in all the demonstrations. The association was able to hold these meetings by the aid of a government grant and its members feel that the money was wisely spent. The people of the St. John river valley have a good thing, but few of them know it, in apple growing. We trust that a much larger amount may be granted next year for the continuance of these orchard meetings.

PERMANENT PAVEMENTS.

Contracts Awarded to Mr. R. S. Low and also to Simmons and Maxwell.

The city council met on Monday afternoon and opened tenders for placing permanent pavement on the streets. Three tenders were submitted from Messrs. C. J. B. Simmons and J. Brown Maxwell of this city, as follows:

A cement street at 981 cts. per square yard, making a total of \$3,960 for the job 50 cts. per lineal foot for curbing and gutter, or \$1,143 additional for that work. A brick street at \$3.10 per square yard or a total of \$12,100 with the same price for curbing, and a third tender of 65 cts. per square yard for a McAdam street which would come to a total of \$2,600 plus the same price for curbing. They guaranteed the cement street for seven years, the brick one for twenty years and the McAdam street for twelve years.

J. H. Hage, St. John, tendered at \$5 per square yard for a Scoria street, and at \$3.50 per yard for a granite one, but they submitted no guarantees with their tenders.

Mr. R. S. Low also made three tenders. His first was for Hossem cement at \$2.30 per yard and gave a ten year guarantee. He also tendered on compressed asphalt at \$3.90 per square yard and a brick street at \$4.00 per square yard, giving a five year guarantee on the two latter.

The road committee of the council after retiring and considering the tenders reported to the council recommending that the tender of R. S. Low for the Hossem pavement be accepted and that this pavement be put on Queen street from Regent to Carleton St. This is the same pavement that Mr. Low will construct on Carleton street from Queen street to the highway bridge.

The tender of Maxwell and Beck with to place McAdam pavement was accepted and they will be asked to put the pavement on King St. between Carleton and Westmorland streets.

The work in both cases is to be proceeded with without delay and in the case of Mr. Low's contract the same conditions of payment will be arranged as was made with that gentleman when he constructed the sidewalk past the government property on Queen street.

A VISITING MAYOR.

Hon. John T. Hurley, Mayor of Salem, Mass., arrived in the city last evening, accompanied by his cousin, Mrs. John T. Belyca, of the same place. They registered at the Barker. The Mayor visited the City Hall this morning and was received by Mayor Chestnut, City Clerk McCready and the aldermen who were present. He chatted quite pleasantly with the group and seemed much pleased with what he had seen of Fredericton.

UNDERGROUND WIRES.

It is understood that before the permanent pavements are laid the telephone wires along Queen street will be placed in underground conduits. A survey of the street for this purpose was made about ten days ago and the matter will come up before a meeting of the board of directors which will meet at St. John tomorrow. If anything in this line is to be done it will have to take place before the permanent streets go down, otherwise it can't be done for several years.

I. O. F. DELEGATES.

At the regular meeting of Court Brunswick No. 52, Independent Order of Foresters held at Chatham Monday evening P. Campbell Johnson and W. E. Bernard were elected delegates to the high court which meets in Fredericton July 13th and 14th. Inspector Hanson and W. L. R. Weldon were elected alternates.
